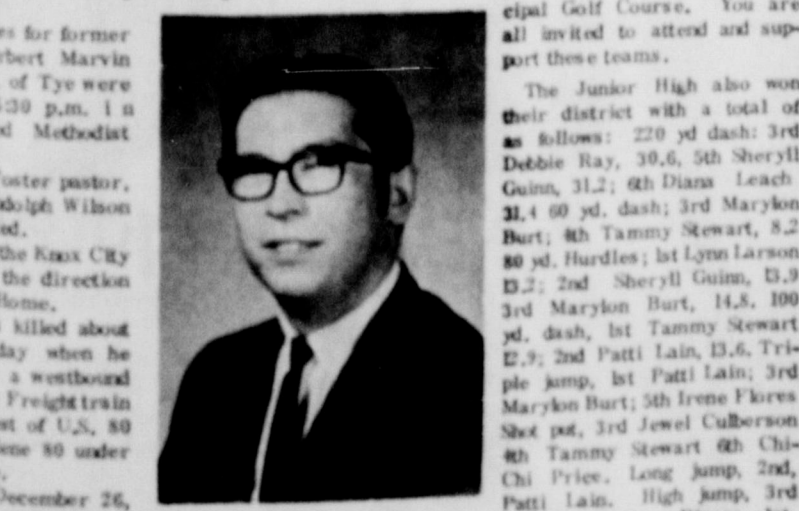

Salt Pollution Control Plan Is Presented Lions

Knox City Lions Club members and guests hear a presentation of the proposed Natural Salt Pollution Control Plan by John K. Dixon, chief of planning for the Brazos River Basin at their regular noonday luncheon last Wednesday. His presentation also included slides showing activities in which the Corps of Engineers is involved.

Mr. Dixon explained to the Lions that he appreciated the opportunity to publicize the plan as much as possible.

The Corps of Engineers is an agency of the Department of the Army responsible for planning, design, and construction of military and civil works projects as may be directed by the United States Congress.

The Southwestern Division of the Corps of Engineers covers the five-state area of Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arkansas, and New Mexico. Five districts have been established within the division to manage civil works projects. The Fort Worth District is responsible for a major portion of Texas.

The river basins in the Fort Worth District, from east to west, include the Sabine, Neches, Trinity, Brazos, Colorado, Guadalupe-San Antonio, Nueces, and a portion of the Rio Grande.

Mr. Dixon said that responsibility for military-type projects within the entire five state area of the Southwestern Division rests with the Fort Worth District. Slides were shown indicating typical examples of military and civil projects in the Fort Worth District.

The guest speaker explained that a system of reservoirs developed by the Corps of Engineers has been authorized by Congress to initiate a basinwide review to resolve water resource problems in the Brazos Basin. After public meetings were held in March 1963 at Plainview, Waco, and Brenham an inventory of requests for improvements was compiled.

One of the requests considered most urgent was the solution of natural salt pollution originating in the upper Basin area. The natural salt sources in the upper Brazos Basin, consisting principally of sodium chloride

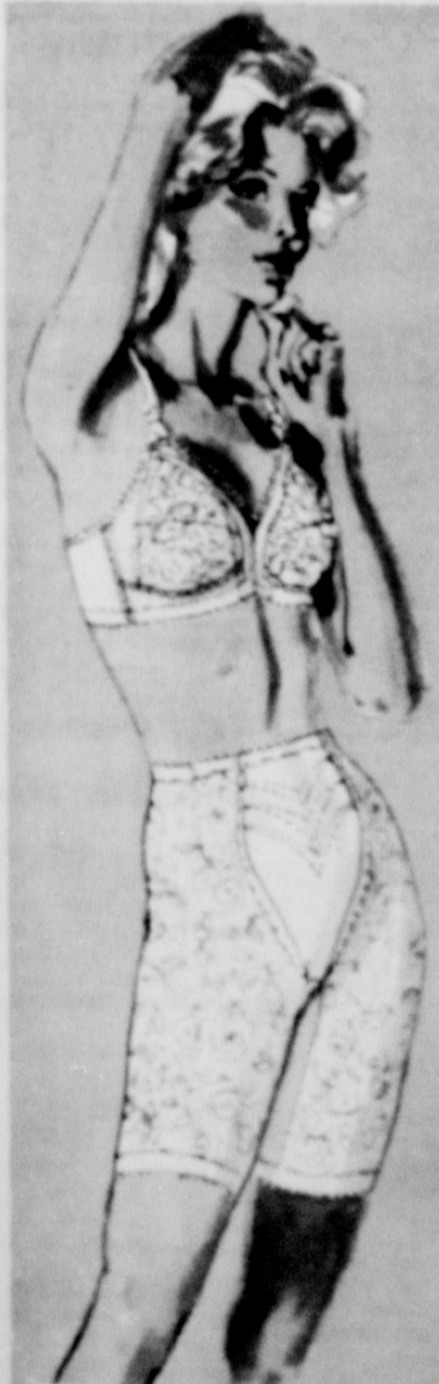

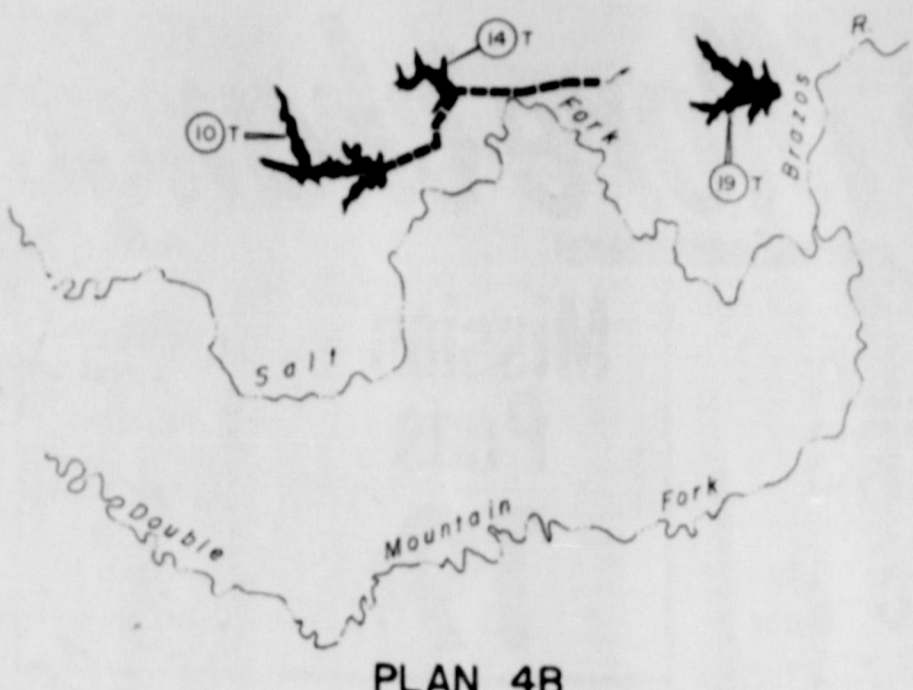

(Common table salt) and calcium sulfate (gypsum) have seriously degraded the quality of Brazos River main-stem flows throughout its 923 mile reach from Stonewall County to the Gulf of Mexico. Also, these flows have degraded waters of tributary reservoirs when released to the Brazos River for use in the lower Basin area and the contiguous coastal service areas. The natural salts are rendering an abundant and potentially valuable source of water virtually useless, Mr. Dixon said. The salts have prevented optimum use of Brazos River waters for agricultural, municipal, and industrial uses. Use of the Brazos main-stem water for municipal and industrial needs is very limited and can only be used during selective periods when adequately diluted with floodwaters or good-quality waters from tributary streams. "Why do we need natural salt pollution control?" Mr. Dixon reported that by the year 2020, the water resources of the Brazos River Basin will be urgently needed to meet expected water demands of 2,465,000 acre-feet per year, which includes those of the Brazos Basin and a portion of those in the contiguous coastal areas and does not include over 4,000,000 AF per year of water needed in the High Plains area for irrigation purposes. Thus, natural salt pollution control is essential to improve about 763,000 AF per yr. of the Brazos Basin water resources—over one-half of the total resources available to meet present and future water supply demands. According to slides presented, the study area showed where the major chloride and

sulfate salt loads originate, showing the major sources in the Double Mountain and Salt Fork areas. With the assistance of U. S. Geological Survey, over 300 sampling stations were established in the upper Brazos Basin in the Double Mountain, Salt Fork, and Clear Fork areas. After a study of quality improvement data and preliminary cost estimates, a four-reservoir plan (plan 4A) was tentatively selected as the most favorable plan and included Jayton Lake on the Salt Fork, Croton Lake on Croton Creek, Dove Lake on Salt Croton Creek, and Kiowa Peak Lake on North Croton Creek. After Plan 4A was presented at public meetings, more detailed economic studies revealed that, if constructed with the initial plan, the cost of Jayton Lake would exceed its expected benefits. In other words, it was not economically justified as one of the initial units, Mr. Dixon said. The recommended plan of improvement is known as Plan 4B and consists of Croton Lake, Dove Lake, and Kiowa Peak Lake. As in Plan 4A water impounded in Croton and Dove Lakes is to be pumped to Kiowa Peak Lake for permanent storage in order to keep minimum water levels at the two lakes. This is to prevent inundation of the salt flat, which if inundated over long periods, might result in leakage. Mr. Dixon said that although this recommended Plan 4B does not provide as much quality improvement as Plan 4A, we feel that the improvement to be provided would be quite adequate for the initial stage of development. According to the Environmental Protection Agency's probability scale, the water at Possum Kingdom Dam will be "Fair to excellent" about 82 percent of the time with Plan 4B in operation. Lions received handout tables show the quality improvement afforded by Plan 4 B. The speaker said that from an economic viewpoint, Plan 4 B is very desirable. The first cost of this plan is approximately \$60 million. The annual charges based on amortization of the first cost plus operation and maintenance charges would be about \$1.2 million. With estimated annual benefits at \$8.7 million, Plan 4 B would provide \$2.7 in benefits for every \$1 spent. Kiowa Peak Lake, which would be located about 15 miles west of Knox City is expected to provide some recreation potential for this area. At the estimated average pool, the surface area of the lake would be about 3,570 acres; the width about 0.4 mile; and the length about seven miles. Mr. Dixon said the Corps would provide access to this lake along with certain recreational facilities so that boating, swimming, picnicking, and other water sports might be enjoyed as long as possible. Plan 4 B was presented at a public meeting in Abilene on March 7 of this year. With the understandable exception of landowners around Kiowa Peak Lake and the expressed need for fresh water in the general area, Mr. Dixon said the plan met with generally favorable response. Upon completion of the report, which includes incorporating views expressed at the Abilene meeting, Mr. Dixon said the report would be submitted to higher authorities for approval—probably this summer. Thence—after Federal agency review at the Washington level and review by the State of Texas and Office of

Management and Budget—it will be transmitted to the U. S. Congress. The Congress will then consider the recommendation plan for authorization and funding, Mr. Dixon concluded. Mr. Dixon was accompanied by John Ball, district planning officer with the Corps of Engineers in Fort Worth. A Knox City man, Monroe Thomas, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Thomas, works with Mr. Ball in Fort Worth. Bruce Campbell Jr., a director of the Brazos River Authority, was responsible for the presentation to the Lions Club.

The groom's parents hosted a rehearsal dinner at the Coffee Cup Restaurant in Texarkana Friday night.

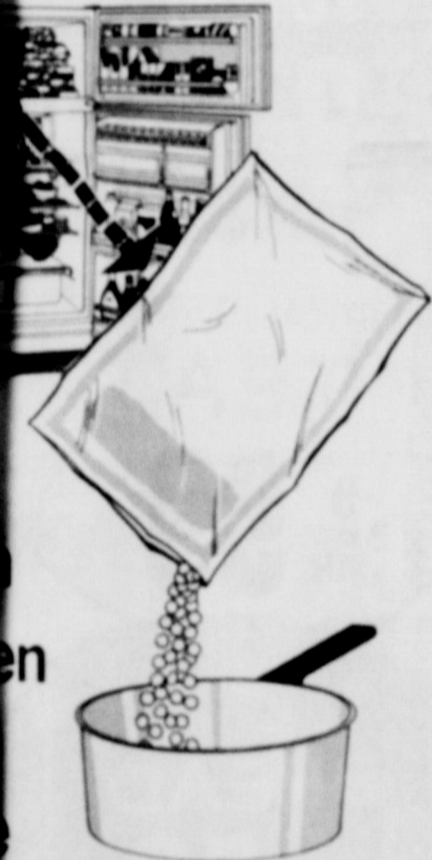
