



## Knox County Boll Weevil Assn. Begins Plans to Control Weevils

The Knox County Boll Weevil Association's Board of Directors met Tuesday night in the Knights of Columbus Hall at Rhineland.

Vernon Zeissel, president of the association, presided. The purpose of the meeting was to

start implementing the plan to control boll weevils in the county by using the Diapause Control Program.

A representative of the Texas Department of Agriculture, Donny Arnold of Lubbock, was present and explained the workings of the plan and the success it had been in other counties of the state.

Arnold stated that the planted acres of cotton would be all that are sprayed, with three sprayings 10-14 days apart, starting sometime in September.

The total cost was estimated to be under \$1.75 an acre per spraying, depending on the bid price of the applicator, with the Texas Department of Agriculture sharing the cost on a 50-50 basis, providing funds are available from the legislature.

The Texas Department of Agriculture supervises the spraying and checks the equipment on the airplanes that are used by the applicator.

President Zeissel stated that a State Charter has been obtained for the non-profit organization and reminded producers to seed their \$6.00 membership dues in to the Secretary Treasurer, Maynard Moore, in care of Knox Prairie Seed Co., Munday, Texas or give their dues to their local gin manager.

Zeissel suggested that the producers check with their local directors from their own community for further details on the Diapause Program.

## Notaries Public Must File Between May 1 and May 15

Secretary of State Mark W. White Jr. announced that all presently commissioned Notaries Public desiring reappointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1973 and ends June 1, 1975, must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the County Clerk between May 1, 1973 and May 15, 1973, inclusive.

Secretary of State White further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the begin-

ning of the new term on June 1, 1973, should apply to the County Clerk before May 14, 1973. The required application forms may be obtained from the County Clerk.

Mr. White emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerk approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the application to the Secretary of State.

## Research Still Needed To Conquer Cancer

"We are entering the age of chemotherapy in the fight to conquer cancer," Mrs. Guy Robinson, chairman of the Knox City 1973 educational and fund-raising Crusade of the American Cancer Society which began here April 3, declared today.

"Step by step research—much of it supported by the American Cancer Society—is developing new drugs and methods for using them that have achieved dramatic results," she said.

"Encouraging advances have been achieved against the type of leukemia that hits children; in choriocarcinoma, a rare cancer peculiar to pregnant women; and Burkitt's lymphoma, the facial cancer prevalent among Central African children," said Mrs. Robinson. "Besides this, drugs are being combined with radiation against some cancers such as Wilms' tumor and Hodgkin's Disease."

The use of drugs to fight cancer really got underway in the early 1940's when nitrogen mustard, a variant of the World War I poison gas, was employed to treat leukemia," Mrs. Robinson said. "In 1947, Dr. Sidney Farber of the Boston Children's Hospital achieved temporary suc-

cess in arresting the leukemia in a 10-year-old boy by using a drug to interfere with the growing process of malignant cells.

Since then many scientists, including Dr. Charles Heidelberger, an ACS lifetime professor, have developed new anti-cancer agents which arrest the growth of tumors.

In 1964, the National Cancer Institute set up a special cancer drug program to coordinate the screening of thousands of chemicals and to test those that showed promise. At first, anti-cancer drugs were used singly, then it was found that used in combination and in varying dosages there were better results.

as long as 15 to 18, Mrs. Robinson declared.

Doctors are still baffled by the disease's eventual recurrence. One explanation is that somehow some of the malignant cells escape the chemicals' action and live to reproduce tens of millions of their kind, thus bringing back the disease.

"If this is the case the answer is more effective drugs," she said. "This is



(common table salt) and calcium sulfate (gypsum) have seriously degraded the quality of Brazos River mainstem flows throughout its 923 mile reach from Stonewall County to the Gulf of Mexico. Also, these flows have degraded waters of tributary reservoirs when released to the Brazos River for use in the lower Basin area and the contiguous coastal service areas.

The natural salts are rendering an abundant and potentially valuable source of water virtually useless, Mr. Dixon said. The salts have prevented optimum use of Brazos River waters for agricultural, municipal, and industrial uses. Use of the Brazos mainstem water for municipal and industrial needs is very limited and can only be used during selective periods when adequately diluted with floodwaters or good-quality waters from tributary streams. "Why do we need natural salt pollution control?" Mr. Dixon reported that by the year 2020, the water resources of the Brazos River Basin will be urgently needed to meet expected water demands of 2,465,000 acre-feet per year, which includes those of the Brazos Basin and a portion of those in the contiguous coastal areas and does not include over 4,000,000 AF per year of water needed in the High Plains area for irrigation purposes. Thus, natural salt pollution control is essential to improve about 763,000 AF per yr. of the Brazos Basin water resources—over one-half of the total resources available to meet present and future water supply demands.

According to slides presented, the study area showed where the major chloride and

sulfate salt loads originate, showing the major sources in the Double Mountain and Salt Fork areas.

With the assistance of U. S. Geological Survey, over 300 sampling stations were established in the upper Brazos Basin in the Double Mountain, Salt Fork, and Clear Fork areas.

After a study of quality improvement data and preliminary cost estimates, a four-reservoir plan (Plan 4A) was tentatively selected as the most favorable plan and included Jayton Lake on the Salt Fork, Croton Lake on Croton Creek, Dove Lake on Salt Croton Creek, and Kiowa Peak Lake on North Croton Creek. After Plan 4A was presented at public meetings, more detailed economic studies revealed that, if constructed with the initial plan, the cost of Jayton Lake would exceed its expected benefits. In other words, it was not economically justified as one of the initial units, Mr. Dixon said.

The recommended plan of improvement is known as Plan 4B and consists of Croton Lake, Dove Lake, and Kiowa Peak Lake. As in Plan 4A water imposed in Croton and Dove Lakes is to be pumped to Kiowa Peak Lake for permanent storage in order to keep minimum water levels at the two lakes. This is to prevent inundation of the salt flat, which if inundated over long periods, might result in leakage.

Mr. Dixon said that although this recommended Plan 4B does not provide as much quality improvement as Plan 4A, we feel that the improvement to be provided would be quite adequate for the initial stage of development.

According to the Environmental Protection Agency's potability scale, the water at Possum Kingdom Dam will be "Fair to excellent" about 82 percent of the time with Plan 4B in operation.

The speaker said that from an economic viewpoint, Plan 4B is very desirable. The first cost of this plan is approximately \$60 million. The annual charges based on amortization of the first cost plus operation and maintenance charges would be about \$1.2 million. With estimated annual benefits at \$8.7 million, Plan 4B would provide \$2.7 in benefits for every \$1 spent.

Kiowa Peak Lake, which would be located about 15 miles west of Knox City is expected to provide some recreation potential for this area. At the estimated average pool, the surface area of the lake would be about 3,570 acres; the width about 0.4 mile; and the length about seven miles.

Mr. Dixon said the Corps would provide access to this lake along with certain recreational facilities so that boating, swimming, picnicking, and other water sports might be enjoyed as long as possible.

Plan 4B was presented as the recommended plan at a public meeting in Abilene on March 7 of this year. With the understandable exception of landowners around Kiowa Peak Lake and the expressed need for fresh water in the general area, Mr. Dixon said the plan met with generally favorable response.

Upon completion of the report, which includes incorporating views expressed at the Abilene meeting, Mr. Dixon said the report would be submitted to higher authorities for approval—probably this summer. 
