

> tion of state school aid because county tax rolls favor rural areas.

Certianly it should be recognized that there are schools, supporting only a handful of students, that should consider consolidation with neighboring districts; certainly it should be recognized that tax inequities, favoring some rural districts.

But we submit that arbitrary elimination of our rural schools and the resultant decay of thousands of rural communities, and the many complex problems arising from the establishment of county-wide and multi-county school districts, is not the answer. Voluntary consolidation should be encouraged, but mere bigness is no guarantee of qual-

We also submit that the tax proposal, that will result in tax lls to our state's rural resitents - farmers and ranchers who live on their land and make their living from the land - increasing two, three and four times in size, is certainly as inequitable as is now claimed by the committee on behalf of citizens of metropolitan centers. The old saying that two wrongs don't make a right certainly seems appropriate in this

It would appear much more logical and practical, then, while encouraging voluntary consolidation of many of our smaller schools, to seek new ways to improve and upgrade the curricula of these schools and to spend our tax money to help accomplish this goal: to bring advanced and improved educational opportunities to the students rather than forcing them to travel many additional miles per day for their education, and to keep control of our schools where it always has been and always should be - in the hands of our local citizens and taxpayers.



() AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the City.

Section 5. That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06. Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th, Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote: but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. 

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
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








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
