O'Brien Boys and Rochester Girls Win Tournament

The O'Brien boys edged the Bulldogs to the victory, accounting for 25 points.

Rochester won the girls' division with a 52-32 decision over Haskell.

The O'Brien boys reached the finals with a 40-39 victory over Rochester. Lancaster and Matura were high scorers for the winners with 13 and 11 points. In the other semi-finals game Haskell defeated Woodson, 53-40.

The Rochester girls beat Knox City in the semi-finals, 70-57, with Myers scoring 36 for the winners. Sammie Darr hit 32 for the Knox City girls. Haskell girls gained the finals with a 47-46 win over Munday.

Rule beat Hamlin, 36-23, in the consolation finals of the girls' division.

In the boys' consolation finals, the Knox City "A" team edged out the Knox City "B" team, 59-52. High scorer was the B team's Bobby Driver, who accounted for 29 points. Other scorers on the B team were Ladell Driver 9, Rip Collins 2, Billy Yarbrough 3, David Perdue 6, Hoyt Lovelace 1 and Martin Lewis 2.

Scoring for the A team were Jimmy Leach with 15, Millard Lain 4, Shelby Bishop 26, Bobby Day 9, Ross Lankford 2, John Trawek 1 and Joey Watkins 2.

First-round games in the boys' division of the tournament Thursday night saw Haskell beat Knox City, 52-41; Woodson beat Rule, 54-39; O'Brien swamped the Knox City B team, 65-37; and Haskell "B" lost to Rochester, 53-26.

In the girls' division Rule lost to Rochester and Knox City beat Woodson.

In the lone boys' game Friday night, the Knox City B team advanced in the consolation bracket by beating Haskell B, 49-36, with Bobby Driver scoring 36 points for the winners.

In the girls' games Munday beat Hamlin, 40-23, and Haskell snowed Throckmorton under, 46-34.

In Saturday games, the Rule girls advanced in the consolation bracket by beating Woodson, 35-30 and Hamlin moved up by defeating Throckmorton 27-26. Knox City girls bowed to Rochester, 70-57. Barbara Myers was high scorer for the winners with 36 points, while for Knox City Sammie Darr scored 32, Florence Reeves 16 and Rowena Helms 9.

In semi-finals of the consolation bracket the Knox City A boys beat Rule 48-30. Bishop scored 15 for the winners. Leach 14, Kenneth Day 6, Bobby Day 6, Lankford 2, Lain 2, Jerry Anderson 2 and Trawek 1.

Baylor Hospital to Use Atomic Energy in Cancer Treatment

Atomic energy is to be put to work for the benefit of mankind at Baylor University Hospital in Dallas. Charles R. Moore, Chairman of the Dallas Executive Committee of the Baylor Board of Trustees, announced this new advance for the treatment of cancer today. Mr. Moore stated that plans have been completed for installation of a new "Theratron" Cobalt 60 Beam Cancer Therapy unit at Baylor University Hospital.

The Cobalt Therapy Unit is a new type of giant X-ray-like machine which utilizes radiation from atomic energy to penetrate the skin and retard or destroy the growth of cancerous tissue. In discussing the new unit Dr. J. E. Miller, chief of the Department of Radiology at Baylor University Hospital, said: "The principle of X-ray therapy has been used in the treatment of cancer for a long time, but the new Cobalt machine makes possible deeper penetration with less harm to normal tissue than was ever possible before." The installation of this advanced machine will place Baylor University Hospital among the leading centers for treatment of cancer in the United States.

The installation of the unit was made possible by a gift from Reserve Life Insurance Company of Dallas, in honor of the company's president, C. A. Sammons. The building and facilities, which will be valued at \$150,000, will be known as "The Charles A. Sammons Radiation Therapy Center."

Local Minister's Mother Dies Jan. 8 In South Dakota

Funeral services for Mrs. Jacob P. Becker, mother of Rev. Emil V. Becker of Knox City, were to be held in Marion, South Dakota, today (Thursday).

Mrs. Becker, about 84, died Saturday, Jan. 8 at 5 p. m. after being ill for several months. She was born in Russia.

Word of his mother's death reached Rev. Becker while he was on an evangelistic crusade in Jamaica, B.W.I., and he left Jamaica by plane Monday morning, arriving in South Dakota Wednesday morning.

Rev. Becker is pastor of the Knox City Baptist Church.

Directors Elected By Water District

Grady Chapman and Lloyd Griffith were re-elected to the board of directors of Knox County Water Control and Improvement District in a special election at Benjamin Tuesday. Chapman received 30 votes and Griffith 29, according to W. M. Hertel, Benjamin city secretary.

Benjamin residents will vote in the latter part of February on a water rate increase anticipated when the water district starts selling water to the city, Hertel said.

Members of the district, which encompasses the Benjamin school district, will probably vote about the same time on a \$135,000 bond issue to finance a new water system, he added.

City Hall Moved To New Location

The new City Hall—the former Citizens State Bank building—was occupied this week by city officials and employees, and all city business is being transacted in the new location, Mayor Guy Glenn said Wednesday.

The jail remains at the old city hall for the present time, as do the fire trucks. Plans for remodeling the building at the rear of the new city hall, also owned by the city, to house the fire trucks are not complete.

According to City Secretary L. C. Teague, the spacious lobby of the new hall has ample room for the tax records, water and sewer department and other city business functions, and for the justice court. "The new building will be much more efficient and comfortable than the old," Teague said, "and will be more convenient for citizens who have business with the city."

"When the jail and the fire trucks are moved to the new location, the change will be even more satisfactory."

Farm & Ranch Notes
By W. J. Bryan, County Agent

Plans are coming along good for the annual FFA and 4-H Junior Livestock Show, which will be held in Goree this year on Saturday, Jan. 22. The show is expected to be one of the largest ever held in the county, with boys and girls from all communities exhibiting their projects. Projects are to be in place at 10 a. m. and the judging will start at 1:30 p. m. The Goree fire department is making plans to furnish the noon meal for all exhibitors. About 130 animals are expected to be shown, including 100 head of lambs, 18 head of beef steers and 14 fat barrows. Research at A&M College has shown that malathion can be used safely to control fleas on dogs. In preliminary tests several dogs were dusted and sprayed with different malathion concentrations. Two days after treatment no fleas were found on the once-infested animals. The new phosphorous insecticide will control many DDT-resistant insects and the tests were started to determine whether malathion might be used in sufficient strength to kill fleas and still not harm the animals. A five-tenths (.5) percent spray or four percent dust of malathion will give the longest control. A 2.5 percent spray or four percent dust will eradicate the pests in garages and other infested areas. Do not use malathion on cats, as more than two percent is fatal to them.

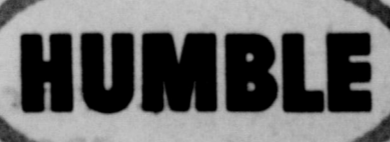

LITTLE CHANGE EXPECTED IN LIVESTOCK FEED PRICES

All range feed in Texas is reported at 64 percent condition now as compared to 63 percent a month ago with the 10 year average being 75 percent condition for this time of year.

Livestock feeds are generally expected to cost about the same in 1955 as they did this past year, however there will be marked difference in prices of individual feeds, according to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Prices of high protein feeds will probably hold steady and the cost of cottonseed meal probably will rise through the winter and continue higher in 1955.

Hay supplies for the nation as a whole are above last year, but supplies in all of the Southwest are short and shipments will continue to Texas at slightly rising prices.

The 1954 corn crop does not meet total requirements and later in the marketing year prices probably will rise above those of a year earlier. Sorghum grain, oats and barley are at near record supply and with a normal growing season in '55 prices probably will not improve.

UNDENOMINATIONAL CHRISTIANITY

Although every denomination teaches some things that are true and is filled predominately with good people, there are some essential qualities that denominationalism lacks.

Denominationalism lacks A TRUE CONCEPTION OF THE WORTH OF THE CHURCH. The church that Jesus bought with his blood (Acts 20:28) is not on a level with any denomination. Neither can it be true that the Lord's church is divided into the hundreds of warring sects that we know as denominationalism today.

Denominationalism lacks, at least to some extent, TRUTH IN DOCTRINE. It is elementary that contradicting ideas cannot both be true. Therefore if immersion is the only scriptural way to baptize, those who teach sprinkling are wrong. The same applies to a multitude of other doctrines.

All of them cannot be the gospel which is "the power of God unto salvation" (Romans 1:16). All of them cannot be the truth which makes men free (John 8:32).

Denominationalism lacks UNITY OF PRACTICE. The only religious division ever authorized by God was that between the Jew and the Gentile which was broken down by Christ. Jesus prayed that his followers might "all be one" (John 17:20,21). Paul begged Christians to "all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions" (1 Corinthians 1:10). Yet today walls and partitions by the hundreds divide religious people. Our prayer is that these narrowing lines may be removed.

Our plea, in the name of Christ, is that all might shed their human names, discard their man-made creeds, and fill their hearts with the pure gospel of Christ.
