opened many times that the lieutenant governor became the governor and filled the place more acceptably and with more credit than had his predecessor. For example, right here in Texas, the elevation of Will Hobbs following the impeachment of James E. Ferguson.

In the coming primary we have two candidates for lieutenant governor. One is Sterling P. Strong of Dallas at elderly ex-traveling salesman with no legislative background but only the record of having briefly attempted to win a seat in the United States senate as the enthusiastic champion of the Ku Klux Klan. The other is Edgar Witt of Waco.

Considering the circumstances, with its possible eventualities, Witt's nomination for second in command is significantly important. West Texas voters should line up with him in a body, for here is his legislative record:

He actively supported the legislation creating Texas Technological college.

He was a leader of the movement in behalf of the over-burdened common man and helped put over the act to re-value their loans. Senator Small's river-bed bills had his enthusiastic support, and he was one of the senators to vote for their re-passage over the governor's veto.

It was Witt, who, in the regular session of 1925, introduced the resolution asking congress to place an import duty of \$1 per barrel on crude oil; and he was one of the authors of the pipe line bill sponsored by independent oil operators of Texas before the last special session.

West Texas cotton farmer have not forgotten pink bollworm regulation. Witt supported the bill setting up appropriations to pay them for losses incurred in enforcement of the quarantine.

Witt's home folks are sold on him. He has been in the senate of Texas for 12 years. He was away, larry service, when his friends put his name up for his first term, and against a candidate who campaigned the district, he won by a seven-to-

one vote. He has been re-elected twice without opposition, and the primary of July 26 McLennan county endorsed his candidacy for lieutenant governor by a vote of 36,361 to 2,128 for all his opponents combined, the candidate nearest him receiving only 957 votes.

Senator Witt has been a member of all the important committees of the upper house, chairman of most of them at various times. He has the support of nearly every colleague in the upper house, is entitled to the place he seeks and is completely deserving of West Texas support.

Texas will never be ashamed by the type of candidacy represented in Edgar Witt.


