Children born mothers suffering from this type of herpes can develop Neo Natal herpes which is most often fatal. Also, there appears to be evidence that women with herpes run a greater risk of developing cervical cancer.

Right now there is neither a certain treatment or cure for genital herpes. Although researchers feel that eventually a vaccine may be the answer, none is close to development.





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
