

Democratic Workshop Slated Here

W. Stenholm, of the Texas Democratic Party, is the chairperson of the Affirmative Action Participation Workshop of the Texas Democratic Party. The workshop, which is being held Thursday at the Country Club here, is designed to help all Democrats to effectively participate in the Democratic Party delegate selection process, so that their viewpoints can be heard in selecting the Democratic presidential candidate. It is an expanded program

to also bring all participating Democrats up to date as to the new rules and techniques to be utilized in the political process this year. As a consequence, all county chairmen and precinct chairmen are invited to attend.

Voter Registration Deadline March 31

According to state law, voters can register up to 30 days before an election, and in the event a person has not received his voter registration certificate by mail, he should register with the county tax assessor no later than March 31 if he wants to vote in the Saturday, May 1 election.

Knox City's Al Bateman turned in a double win Saturday in the 100-yard dash and the long jump as the favored Greyhounds raced to a 21 point margin of victory in the seventh annual Albany Relays.

Coach Jimmy Rogers' Greyhounds had 102 points with their closest threat being Rochester with 81 points.

Bateman peeled two-tenths of a second of his season's best sprint with a 10.0 clocking. In the long jump, he leaped 19 feet and nine inches, two inches farther than he's done so far in 1976.

The 440 relay team of Flint Richardson, Charlie Flye, Jimmy Lynn and Al Bateman lowered their best time by four-tenths of a second with a 44.4.

Other wins for the Hounds included 120 high hurdles - Jerry Eaton fourth and Tim Whitten fifth; 100 yard dash - Flye second and Richardson sixth; 440 yard dash - Billy Bob Reynolds fifth; 330 intermediate hurdles - Eaton third and Whitten fourth; 220 yard dash - Flye third and Richardson sixth; mile run - Eddie Martinez third; mile relay - Whitten, Lynn, Reynolds, and Bateman fourth; long jump - Lynn third and Flye fourth; pole vault - Reynolds fourth.

Saturday the Hounds will compete in the Olney track meet.
