A Lay Witness Mission is a weekend experience in which a local church or community after proper preparation invites a group of team members, that is, a group of laymen like themselves from various communities, and they come together for a weekend of sharing and discussion and searching for some of the answers that the church or community is asking.

Team members are from a variety of denominations and from all walks of life. Dr. Robert Chapman, Coordinator for Knox City's Lay Witness Mission, is a Medical Doctor in Fort Worth. His wife, Marie Chapman, is also an M.D. and a team member. Thus far approximately fifty persons from all over the state have accepted invitations to participate in our community wide mission. These persons come at their own expense to share in an informal, conversational, every day level their experiences of the love of Christ in their lives.

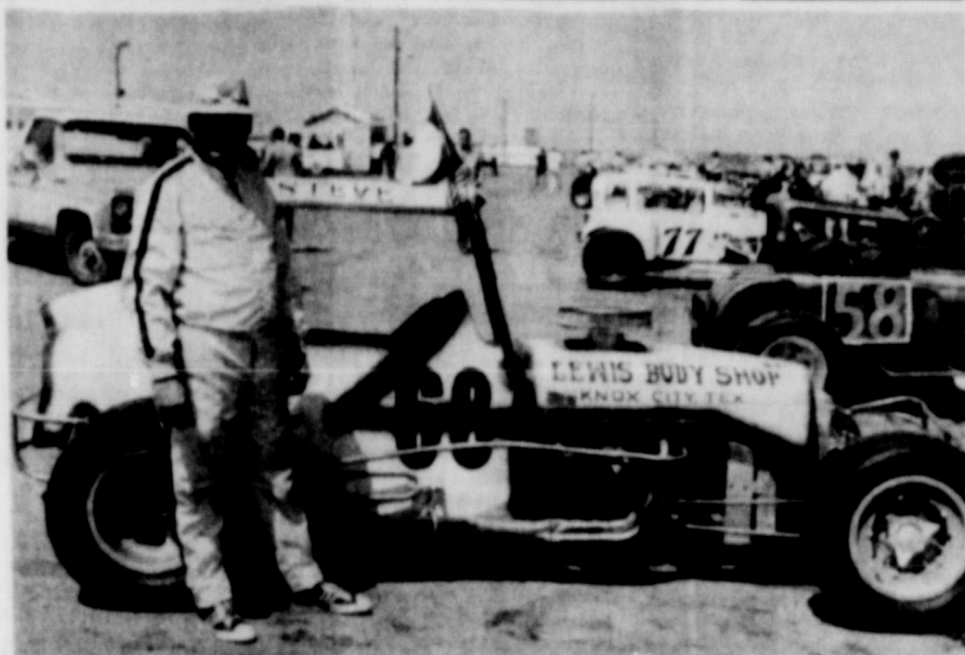
Communities which have cooperated in these missions have experienced deeper concern on the part of laymen

toward people in the community as well as an awakening to the will of God in today's world.

Witnesses are chosen by coordinators primarily because they are ordinary people who have the ability to share and discover new experiences of Christ's spirit for daily living. These team members do this within as normal a daily setting as possible in a community, without showy circumstances over the span of a single weekend.

Because these are the methods and types of people involved, it is essential that each person in the community make preparation for the Lay Witness Mission if it is to benefit Knox City. At Lockett Texas, where a similar community mission was held one person commented that participants, because of fellowship with their own community people, seemed to hold on to a new awakening of Christ in their lives rather than catching fire for a few days then having the fire dwindle out.

Your prayers and your concern will make the difference between a group merely visiting a community for a weekend and a team of fellow Texans helping to revitalize concern for each other in Knox City.

By Locally Sponsored Racer

KC Represented In Five States

A super modified stocker with a sprint car body, sponsored locally by Sterling Lewis of Lewis Paint and Body Shop and Glen Dell Large of Large's Garage, is making a name for Knox City in five states namely Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Kansas, and Louisiana.

The racer, owned by Steve Howeth, races every weekend and is currently being driven by Don Miller of Wichita Falls.

Howeth has been unable to drive in races since May 1 when he was hospitalized in the Texas Heart Institute in Houston following a heart attack.

The racer will appear in Saturday's rodeo parade and Howeth reported that he would be driving it only for the parade appearance.

Currently running in sixth place in the NCRA, circuit, super modified division, the racer won third in the heat race. Friday night at Wichita

Falls, second in the trophy dash, and second in the "A" feature.

Sunday night in Lawton, Oklahoma, the racer placed fourth in the feature, and was running fifth in the Cyclone 50 when the rear end tore up with \$1500 damages. Having to stop after 46 laps, the racer wound up with 10th place in the race.

Heavy Rains Damage Area Farms And Crops

Moderate to heavy rains fell in Knox City area Thursday night and Friday, causing some flooding and damage to small crops.

Replanting will be necessary on many acres that are now inundated, it was reported.

The wheat harvest, which had just begun last week, was halted due to the rain.

The Little Britches Rodeo scheduled for last Saturday and Sunday was postponed because of the muddy condition of the arena. The rodeo and parade has been rescheduled for Saturday, June 9 and Sunday, June 10.

Fields in the Rochester-O'Brien area were solid lakes of water Saturday after seven to nine inches of rain fell Thursday night, according to a report. Several farmers suffered heavy land damage as well as crop losses. One farmer east of O'Brien said the deluge of water Saturday was a run-off from farther south. He supposed the apparent change in the course of the water was probably due to land leveling, dams, and the construction of the farm-to-market highway from Haskell to Knox City.

A number of families were completely cut-off by the high water until Monday morning.

Farm editor Joe Brown of the Wichita Falls Time and Record News reported in the Sunday edition that Stanton Brown, manager of the League Ranch at Benjamin, said he has 3,100 acres of wheat and hadn't cut a straw.

Brown said he talked to about 15 farmers Friday night.

in Knox City and for every mile south of Benjamin and Munday, an extra inch of rain fell.

"One farmer told me at Weinert he poured four inches of rain out of a five inch rain gauge twice and then it rained some more."

Brown said water between Rule and Rochester was running across the roads two miles wide and was three feet deep in some places.

Herman Collier, Knox County agent, said runoff water was forming lakes in a number of fields and this would cause extensive damage to the wheat but high winds didn't accompany the rains.

"The south part of Knox County had four to five inches of rain where it borders Haskell County, but northward the rainfall dropped off to just about an inch," he said.

Mrs. Thomas Bevel of Rochester said her husband had

a number of fields of cotton that already had been planted twice and some even sprayed. These are gone completely and runoff water was pouring through the fields.

"My husband said he already had \$25 an acre invested in seed, labor, spray materials and now he has to start all over."

Herb Partridge of Munday said he had one field of potatoes which received 4 1/2 inches Friday, and there was danger of damage to the underground crop. "If it will drain off in 24 hours the potatoes will be okay, since we are a little late. But if the season had been normal and the potatoes mature, we would have had severe damage."

Partridge said he talked to another potato farmer, Gene Smith, who had started pumps in some of his fields in an effort to drain off the lake of water covering his crop.

Four Counties Receive \$16,667 Probation Grant

AUSTIN—Governor Dolph Briscoe has awarded a \$16,667 grant to Knox County to initiate a probation project serving the four-county 50th Judicial District.

The money will come from the Criminal Justice Council which administers the state's block grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Omnibus Crime Control Act.

Knox, Cottle, Baylor and King counties make up the 50th Ju-

dicial District.

A probation officer will be employed to serve both adult and juvenile probationers.

Knox County Judge Sam E. Clonts will serve as project director.

Grantee's contribution will include \$3,393 cash match.

The West Central Texas application was among 41 considered by the CJC Executive Committee May 11. Total funding requested was \$2,114,016.

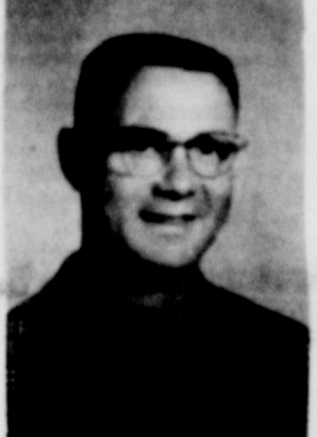
The regular playnight at Benjamin is cancelled for Saturday night in order for members to participate in the Little Britches Rodeo in Knox City.

Banners Visit Hodges Gardens

Hodges Gardens stems from a vast reforestation program and forest genetics research by the late A. J. Hodges in the early 1940's. 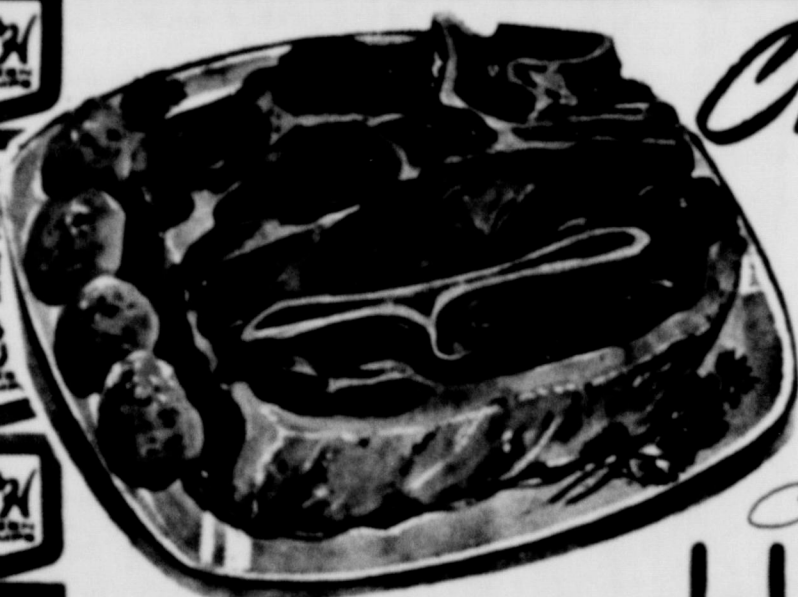

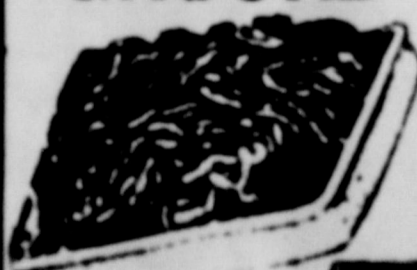

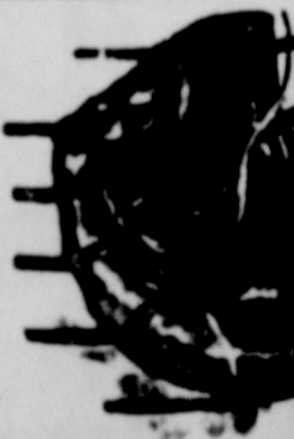
