## Former Coach Named To Hall Of Fame

Former Knox City coach and Midwestern University all-American O'Neal Weaver was among five inductees into the Texas High School Basketball Hall of Fame in recent ceremonies in Athens, Texas.

The other four inducted included ex-Texas A&M great John Beasley, Joe Fortenberry, Red Sledge and Jim Bond. "O'Neal must be considered one of the best players ever for MU," Dr. D.L. Ligon, MU sports information director, said. "His passing ability from the post position was unequalled. He possessed all the shots in the book with either hand and could have scored almost at will. He often chose to pass to a teammate, even though he himself had an open shot."

After attending Tyler JC, Weaver cast his lot with Midwestern in 1951 and ended his collegiate career in 1955-56 after a two-year hitch in the army. He is the fifth leading scorer in MU history with 1,599 points.

Weaver was the first player for Midwestern to be named to the NAIA all-American team (1956) and he continued to star for years with various AAU teams. He was also named to the Army all-star team during his stint in the service.

Weaver has been a teacher in Canton (Texas) High School for the past several years and at present is coaching the girls' basketball team.

Clyde Graham, a 1935 graduate of Knox City High School was chosen as this year's homecoming honoree and will be honored Sunday, July 6, at the Community Church Service climaxing the 1975 Homecoming. The service will be held at the First Baptist Church beginning at 11:00 a.m.

Clyde, son of Mr. and Mrs. L.W. Graham, is a former state conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service in Temple. He is married to the former Dorothy Hunter of Valley View and they are the parents of three children, William, Susan, and Janet.

He received a B.S. degree in agricultural engineering from Texas A&M University in 1943 and a master's degree in public administration from Harvard in 1958.

Graham was first employed by the Soil Conservation Service in 1946 as an engineer in Sweetwater and Rotan; was area engineer, watershed planning staff leader and watershed conservationist in Brady, San Saba, and Brownwood in 1948-1955; budget analyst in the Washington Office in 1956-57; assistant state conservationist 1958-63; deputy state conservationist 1964-65; director of watershed planning division in Washington in 1966-68; and returned to Temple in 1969 as state conservationist where

he served until May 1972 when he was promoted to director of the South Regional Technical Service Center at Fort Worth. In this capacity, he also served as the Administrator's field representative for the southern eleven states.

Clyde is presently consulting engineer for firms introducing the new drip irrigation process.
