"O'Neal must be considered one of the best players ever for MU." Dr. D.L. Ligon, MU sports information director, said. "His passing ability from the post position was unequaled. He possessed all the shots in the book with either hand and could have scored almost at will. He often chose to pass to a teammate, even though he




