

Some time ago we called your attention to the fact that the City faced an accute water shortage and we asked your cooperation in conserving our water supply. With the present heat wave, the situation is now critical and we are unable to pump water as fast as it is being used.

We are pumping the city well at full capacity until well past midnight each day and cannot keep enough water in the tower to provide adequate fire protection. We urgently reques that you use your water very sparingly and in the event a fire breaks out, please close so that we can build up a reserve as quickly as possible.

Your City Commission regrets that it is forced to ask you not water. We had much rather tell you to use all that you like and we sincerely hope that we will be able to say just that before another year has rolled around. In the meantime, we wil appreciate your cooperation and understanding. Respectfully submitted,
