The stranger escaped and Mrs. Frizzell managed to summon help from Columbia Hospital located within a block of their apartment. Frizzell was admitted to the hospital in critical condition and at present time his condition was improved.

### Poison Plants Are Plentiful

College Station - Two common poison plants, ivy and oak, cause severe skin inflammation and water blisters. Extension home economists at Texas A&M University suggest young and old learn to identify them. Common poison ivy grows as a vine or a shrub. It can be hard to detect when mixed with other plants. Leaves of the common poison ivy vary from smooth to lobed to toothed. But they all have three leaflets together. Poison oak also is plentiful. It commonly grows as an upright shrub with many small woody stems. Again, the leaves cluster in threes.

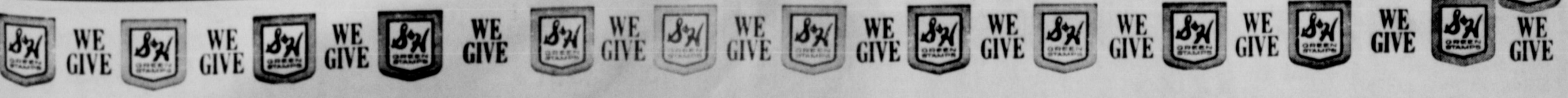

# Farm and Ranch News

## CONTROL HORN FLIES

Horn flies are a continuous problem on beef animals in Knox County during the warm months. These blood-sucking parasites frequently develop large populations in county beef herds. In addition to the direct damage through blood losses, horn flies cause tremendous annoyance and irritation to animals. The constant attempts to fight the flies is a continuing drain on the animal's energy and nutrition, and the cattle may be unable to graze normally. Days and weeks of such attack results in immeasurable losses by the animals.

Horn flies are easily controlled with modern livestock insecticides. Numerous insecticides and methods of treatment are effective and the producer has a wide range of choices to fit his individual operation. County agent, Herman Collier, invites all producers to call or drop by his office where a complete listing of horn fly control recommendations can be obtained.

Before purchasing an applying livestock insecticides, carefully read the label and pay particular attention to precautions and restrictions listed. Observe strictly the slaughter intervals as clearly stated on the label.

## Happy Hamburgers For 65 Years

Hamburger on a bun may be a 65-year-old food idea, but it's not about to retire from the American scene.

Hamburger alone has been around for centuries. However, it didn't catch up with the bun until 1904. That was the year that somebody decided to serve hamburgers on buns at the great St. Louis Exposition. Introduction of the hamburger on a bun shared the spotlight with another great American innovation, ice cream in an edible cone.

The hamburger's ancestry goes back as far as ancient Egypt when meat was minced for quicker cooking. Through the ages, men found that grinding meat was a good method of tenderizing it.

Exactly how ground beef came to be called hamburger is a bit obscure. However, it was probably named for the German seaport of Hamburg. In medieval times, traveling merchants from the city of Hamburg went to the Baltic lands. They saw the Tartars scrape raw meat and season it with salt, pepper, and onion juice to make what we now call "Steak Tartare."

This is the way the Hamburgers ate their beef until some cook decided to shape the raw meat into patties and broil them crisp on the outside, nearly raw inside.

German immigrants brought their rare hamburger idea with them to America. Here people of English-Irish-Scottish ancestry leaned more to the well-done variety of hamburger. In England it was called "Salisbury Steak" after physician, Dr. James H. Salisbury.

Dr. Salisbury had recommended to his patients that they eat such "steak" three times a day with hot water before and after each meal. It was his contention that such a diet would relieve an assortment of conditions from asthma and bronchitis to hardening of the arteries and gout.

Nevertheless, it was simply because the hamburger proved to be so easy, economical, and popular with everybody in the family that it became a regular item in the weekly eating schedule.

Today, the plump, juicy hamburgers are still sizzling on grills from coast to coast. Most often they're in the good company of fresh hamburger buns, thick slices of onions, tomatoes, mustard, and pickles or relish.

For more sophisticated appetites, the adventurous cook departs from the traditional hamburger and serves variations as simple as these. Try them in celebration of the hamburger's 65th year.

Top the cooked ground beef patty with:

Crisp bacon curls; a slice of grilled pineapple topped with toasted coconut; broiled mushroom caps, or sliced mushrooms and sliced water chestnuts; sauteed walnuts, almonds, or pecans; a few French fried onion rings; avocado slices with a few drops of garlic dressing, drained, chopped sauerkraut mixed with caraway seeds; sour cream mixed with chopped chives and dill, or with grated onion and black caviar. ## Gun Registration Seen As No Cure For Crime

New York - The people should not be misled into believing that the rising tide of violent crime in the United States can be curbed by more restrictive gun laws, the immediate past president of the National Rifle Association told members of the Association of The Bar of The City of New York tonight.

Harold W. Glassen, of Lansing, Mich., said "It is a terrible mistake to think that crime is going to be controlled and reduced by additional gun control legislation, for, significantly, less than 4% of major crime involves the use of firearms."

Referring to new Federal gun laws passed only last year, Glassen called for a waiting period, to see if that which has passed will accomplish the task for it, rather than pressing for additional restrictions on firearms ownership and use. He indicated that many who favor outright confiscation, or an end to private ownership of guns masquerade as reformers who pretend to want to tighten up on gun laws to a limited extent, while actually attempting to lay the groundwork for a step-by-step progression toward their ultimate goals.

"The 20 to 40 million hunters and sportsmen in the United States and the million-plus members of the National Rifle Association of America in particular are justly apprehensive of the aims and goals of the leadership of those proposing stringent anti-gun laws. Bold, bald statements by their leaders indicate their belief that there should be no private ownership of firearms and that they hope to bring this about through legislation. Spot Grain Sorghum Diseases Now - It is real important says Dr. Wendell Horne, Extension plant pathologist, that farmers make close checks of their fields of growing grain sorghum in order to spot diseases and make plans for next year's control. Downey mildew and maize dwarf mosaic are among the most damaging; however, headsmut, anthracnose and seedling diseases are also being reported. Local county agents have information on them, Horne said.

## "Melanie Meddles"

By Melanie Whitley

Contrary to popular opinion, the generation gap that we hear so much about these days, does not suddenly open up, like a chasm in the teenage years, but begins with a smooth downhill grade in childhood because of a lack of communication between parents and children.

In his book "Between Parent and Child" Dr. Haim Ginott proposes new solutions to old problems - problems that parents were supposed to correct before with such vague advice as "Give your child more love (or time, or attention)." Parents had to cope with every situation by using the natural, but overrated, parental instincts. You will recognize parts of yourself in his book as parents who have "reasoned" with their children by name calling, yelling, sarcasm and "because I said so."

Dr. Ginott states that the difference between the approach of our grandparents and ourselves in disciplining children is that grandfathers always, even when wrong, acted with authority. Whatever we do is done with hesitation and doubt.

I see this book as a blessing for young parents and feel that each home should have a copy for reference.

This new code of communication, popularly called "Childrenew," requires that (a) messages preserve the child as well as parents self-respect, (b) statements of Understanding precede advice or instructions. In short, put yourself in the child's shoes to understand what he is feeling and what he actually wants to know.

In praise or criticism, parents must remember to refer to the child's accomplishments or unsatisfactory task, and not

tear down his character and personality. A rosy, rosy compliment such as "You are the best boy in the world" or "You can paint better than anyone in your class" is nearly as bad because it causes the child anxiety that next time he may fall short of your idea of him.

The book shows how to recognize your child's dreams, even lies, as wishful actions. It shows how parents show their anger toward children and how you can get the most satisfying results by disciplining them correctly. It shows the wrongness of promises, sarcasm, threats. It shows how to channel a child's anger and jealousy and how to teach them politeness, politely.

In the area of responsibility and independence, Dr. Ginott says that children should be allowed to eat or not eat what is put before them; that parents should select several suitable pieces of clothing and let the child do the choosing; that homework should be strictly the responsibility of the child and his teacher; that allowances should be regular for the child to save or splurge, but never withheld as punishment or increased arbitrarily.

Space in the book is also devoted to musical practice, a child's choice of friends, jealousy, anxiety ("Never threaten to abandon a child" and "Always tell your child where you are going before you leave"), sex education, children in need of professional help.

Beg, borrow or (even) buy a copy of this book to see how you, as a parent, measure up in the field of communication. If you think it's too late for hope at your house, Dr. Ginott has out another book, "Between Parent and Teenager." If you get one new idea of approach from these books; if your child suddenly looks at you as though he heard something you said, it will be worth the price of the books.

## DPS School Wants Recruits

A call was issued today by the Texas Department of Public Safety for applicants to fill a recruit training school to begin in July.

Applicants must be between the ages of 20 and 35, a height of at least 68 inches, a weight of not less than two pounds or more than three and one-half pounds per inch of height, and be in sound physical condition. They must have completed high school or submit a certificate approved by the Texas Education Agency showing an equivalent educational background. They must be a citizen of the United States, and be of good moral character.

Those selected will take their basic training at the Texas DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin. This training period is approximately four months in length. Upon graduation, the patrolmen will be assigned to one of the four uniformed field services - Highway Patrol, License and Weight, Motor Vehicle Inspection and Drivers License.

Because of the short time remaining to test applicants, immediate inquiry is urged for young men to contact the nearest DPS office or patrolman.

## Tax Man Sam Sez

Back in the old days, most Texans lived in a rural area. A lot of us had maids and were probably liable for maid tax under the social security law. However, more than 3/4 of us live in metropolitan areas now. There are still some few that have a maid, but a more common tax problem is the yard boy problem. In the affluent society we end up paying a substantial wage to an enterprising young man from our neighborhood to do our yard work, and to keep the St. Augustine and the shrubs properly manicured. If you pay this young man more than \$50 a calendar quarter, you are due to get an employer's number and to withhold and pay social security on the wages he earns for the quarter. Keeping a few records and paying taxes may be an easier job than mowing the grass after all. Think it over.

## Flag Day Set For June 14

Washington, D. C. - June 14 is Flag Day. Much has been written about the history of the American flag and most of us are already familiar with its evolution.

John Paul Jones, the father of the American Navy, was a key figure in the history of our flag. It was Jones who hoisted the first American flag over an American man of war. The ship was the Alfred and the date was December 3, 1775. The flag was similar to our stars and stripes with some interesting differences. It had 13 red and white stripes, but instead of the familiar white stars on blue, there were the crosses of St. George and St. Andrew. The colonies had not yet declared their independence and the crosses were possibly a last reminder of the mother country.

Not only did John Paul Jones hoist that first flag on an American ship, he was a party to some other naval flag firsts as well. He was the first officer to fly the Stars and Stripes on the open seas aboard the Ranger on July 4, 1777. This ship received and acknowledged the salute of a foreign vessel for the first time on February 14, 1778.

In addition, Jones' ship was the first vessel to fly the flag during a naval battle. (Quiberon Bay off the coast of France). His resulting victory on April 24, 1778, enabled him to be the first man to hoist the flag over a captured enemy vessel.

The U. S. 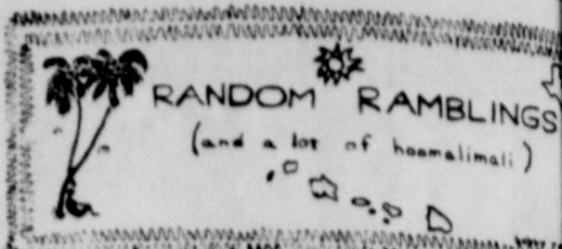
