On July 21, 1953, in Knox City, Texas, Mr. and Mrs. Buddy Angle became the parents of a baby girl. They named her Gwen.

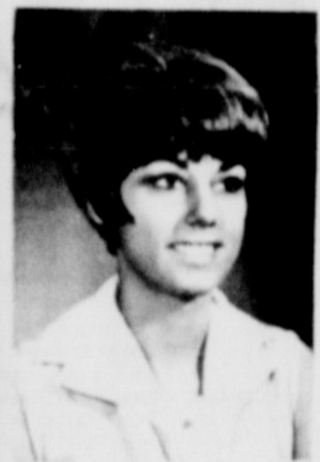
Gwen has lived in Knox City all of her life and has attended the Knox City Schools for twelve years.

Mr. Crowson was a West Texas Utilities sub station construction worker. He was rushed to Knox County Hospital in Knox City when the accident happened about 9:00 a.m., and was pronounced dead on arrival at the hospital.

W. H. Heatly Sworn In As New District Attorney

W. H. Heatly, a young Paducah attorney, was sworn in Tuesday, February 16, 1971, as new district attorney for a four-county area including Cottle, King, Knox and Baylor. Delivering the oath of office to the new district attorney was his own father, State Representative W. S. Heatly.

Young Bill Heatly's recent appointment by Governor Preston Smith to the district attorney's post was confirmed Friday, February 12 by the Senate sub-committee and affirmed Monday, February 15 by the entire Senate.

The elder Heatly, a well-known attorney himself, made a hurried trip home early Tuesday to swear his son into office and then he and his party departed again for Austin.

Mr. Heatly will maintain his law offices in the Heatly Building in Paducah. He succeeds Clyde Whiteside of Seymour as district attorney for this four-county area.

Whiteside resigned to accept Governor Smith's appointment as a member of the State Board of Pardons and Parole. He had been district attorney since 1963.

Young Heatly, a graduate of Baylor University and University of Colorado, is no newcomer to a district attorney's office. He was employed in the office of the Fort Worth "D. A." for nearly two years before coming to Paducah in 1969 to join his father's law firm.

Heatly's wife, Betty, and their one-year-old daughter, Karen, were present for the brief ceremony. The Heatlys also have a three-year-old daughter, Jonnie Green, who was not present.

Charlynn (Clarke) Beason Wins Betty Crocker Award

Charlynn Clarke Beason has been named 1971 Betty Crocker Homemakers of Tomorrow for Knox City High School. She was chosen on the basis of her score in a December 1 written knowledge and attitude examination for which 650,000 senior girls throughout the country were enrolled. From General Mills, sponsor of the annual education program, she will receive a specially designed award. Additionally, her selection makes her eligible for state and national honors, including one of 102 college scholarships totaling \$110,000.

The 1971 Betty Crocker All-American Homemakers of Tomorrow - the national winner - will be awarded a \$5,000 educational grant. She will be selected this spring from 51 senior girls representing each state and the District of Columbia during an expense-paid educational tour by these State Homemakers of Tomorrow - each accompanied by a school adviser - of Washington, D. C., and Colonial Williamsburg, Va. Second, third and fourth-place winners nationally will receive \$4,000, \$3,000, and \$2,000 scholarships. The other state winners will be awarded \$1,500 grants.

State judging centers on the performance of school winners in the December 1 test, with personal observation and interviews during the tour added factors in national selections. In addition to the awards for school, state and national Homemakers of Tomorrow, second-ranking girls in each state receive \$500 scholarships, and schools of State Homemakers of Tomorrow are

awarded complete sets of Encyclopaedia Britannica by Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc. All judging and selection of winners is done by Science Research Associates, Chicago, which also constructed and graded the written examination.

The only national scholarship program exclusively for high school senior girls, the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemakers of Tomorrow was instituted by General Mills in the 1954-55 school year to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. Since its inception, almost seven and three-quarters million girls have been enrolled, and, with this year's grants, scholarship awards will total in excess of \$1 3/4 million.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State,

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 15) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. (1) The State Ethics Commission is created as an agency of the State. The commission consists of nine members. Three members shall be appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas with the advice and consent of the Associate Justices serving on the Court, three members shall be appointed by the Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas with the advice and consent of the other Judges serving on the Court, and three members shall be appointed by the Chairman of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission with the advice and consent of the other members of the commission, no more than two shall be attorneys engaged in the active practice of law. In addition thereto there shall be two ex officio members, one from the House of Representatives and one from the Senate to be elected on the first day of each Regular Session of the Legislature by a majority of the membership of each House for a term ending on the first day of the next Regular Session. (2) With the exception of the initial appointees, each member shall hold office for a term of six (6) years and until his successor is appointed and has qualified. In making the initial appointments, each appointing officer shall designate one (1) appointee to serve a term of two (2) years, one (1) appointee to serve a term of four (4) years, and one (1) appointee to serve a term of six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. The membership shall designate one of its members to serve as chairman for a period of two (2) years. (3) The members of the commission shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. (4) The commission shall recommend the compensation, per diem, and mileage allowances of members of the Legislature and may recommend the salary of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Lieutenant Governor at an amount higher than that of other members notwithstanding any provisions to the contrary of Article IV, Section 17, of the Texas Constitution. (5) The commission shall promulgate rules of ethics to govern the conduct of all legislators, legislative officers and all officeholders, appointive or elective, of any office, department, district agency, commission, board or any governmental unit or branch established by or under the authority of the State of Texas and all persons who shall use any privilege of the floor in either House of the Legislature. The Texas State Ethics Commission shall further promulgate rules providing that each member of the Legislature and each of the hereinabove named officeholders upon election and any appointee to any of these offices shall file with the State Ethics Commission a statement under oath setting out a complete financial statement in detail within 10 days after being elected or receiving an appointment. This information shall be privileged information to the State Ethics Commission to be used only by them to determine if there exists a conflict of interests or if there is or has been a violation of any of the rules of ethics promulgated by the Texas State Ethics Commission or any laws of the State of Texas. The Legislature shall enact statutes dealing with unauthorized disclosure or misuse of said privileged information. (6) The commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet in Austin at least once each year to review existing rules of ethics, legislative compensation rates, mileage allowances and per diem rates, and to make any changes deemed necessary. (7) All rules of ethics, compensation rates, mileage allowances or per diem rates currently in force, as well as all changes and recommendations by the State Ethics Commission shall be promulgated before the convening of any session of the Legislature by filing a certified copy of the proclamation with the Secretary of State. (8) Each rule of ethics or change thereof made by the commission shall take effect on the 15th day of the legislative session following the promulgation unless disapproved before its resolution of either the Legislature.

Local PMC Manager Distributes Plants

Knox City Plant Materials Center manager Jake Garrison was in the Denton and Gainesville areas February 22 through February 25 to take numerous plantings where they were planted in various combinations for evaluation in wave action control. Included were 5,000 rhizomes of common reedgrass, 1,250 sandbar willow, and 1,450 indigo bush plants. Nine dam sites in the two areas were treated. Mr. Garrison said. Treatment consisted of placing a row of common reedgrass with a row of indigo bush behind it, setting up each structure with different combinations of plants. All of the plants used have a highly developed root system and produce a minimum of top growth. It is hoped that there will be enough top growth to calm the waves set up by wind on the lakes and that the root system will hold the dam in place by preventing erosion. Notes will be kept on survival and effect of each planting to determine which combination of plants is the most effective, he explained. During the 1970 growing season, 10,000 rhizomes of common reedgrass, 5,500 indigo bush, 1,250 sandbar willow, and 140 buttonbush plants were produced at the local center for the purpose of making trial plantings on the watershed structures for wave action control.

1946 Study Club Has Friendship Dinner

The Knox City 1946 Study Club met in the High School Library Tuesday night, February 16 for a very pleasant evening. Mrs. L. O. Newton and her homemaking girls served a delicious chicken dinner to 25 ladies. Mrs. Ervin King Jr. presented a most informative program on Plan A of the Knox-Haskell Consortium. This program involves early childhood development. Each five year old child is pre-tested to determine his ability to learn and comprehend. If the child shows to be chronologically below his actual age level, he remains with this special unit until he catches up, then he returns to his regular kindergarten work. This is especially beneficial for children with a language barrier, she said. Mrs. King told the group that a daily record of each child's every activity is kept, thus enabling the teacher to see his progress and gauge his activity accordingly. Also each child is given a prescription, which shows when and what he specifically should be helped with and how long the process should continue. The parents have access to this prescription and the teacher will be happy to confer with them and make suggestions that she feels will benefit their child, she explained. This week Mrs. King began her work with three and four year old students. This group starts after the five year olds complete their special help and are back in their regular kindergarten class. Knox City is indeed fortunate to have this pilot program. Only five schools in the state of Texas have this privilege and all of these are large schools with the exception of Knox-Haskell. Mrs. King paid special tribute to W. R. Baker, school superintendent, telling the ladies that had he not been alert and aware of the situation, Knox City would not have had this excellent educational vehicle, which is very new in the state of Texas.
