

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



The latest word from Extension Entomologists is that spraying for the pecan nut casebearer in Knox County should begin May 26 or 27. The development cycle of the Casebearer has been slowed again this year by cool weather. The banding program has shown that the adults will be emerging over a longer time. One of the following materials are recommended to be -Thiodan, 1 pound 50 percent wettable powder; DDT, 3 pounds Oper cent wettable powder; Malathion, 3 pounds 25 percent wettable powder; Toxaphene, 5 pounds 40 per cent wettable powder; Sevin, 2 pounds, 80 per cent wettable powder.

Two pounds of zinc sulfate should be added to the insecticide mixture to control rosette. This is a nutritional disease caused by a shortage of zinc and is very prevalent in Knox County. This should be done annually to prevent rosette.

The last Texas Legislature direated the Texas Department of Agriculture to develop the markets for Texas Agricultural products to their fullest potential and increase the Texas farm ers share of these markets. The new marketing division has been set up in Austin.

To help the Texas farmer capture markets, thte division started a research program in February. Baby pigs need iron for a good start in life. Unless they get iron by the time they are three to five days of age they

Baby pigs have a very low storage level of the trace mineral at birth and the sow's milk is also low in iron content. Iron A also important trace mineral in commercial hog production, especially when ratios containing cottonseed meal are fed. It prevents the toxic effect from grossypol which is contained in the meal.

We suggest five methods for supplying the day-to-day needs of iron for baby pigs. The first is the injection of iron-dextran compounds into the muscle.

The injections need not be in the ham. To avoid possible infections, we would emphasize the need for keeping the injections needle clean.

Dosing with an iron pill or

paste is another method. A third method is to swab the sow's udder with an iron solution. It is effective but may cause chapping and then infection. Supplying pigs with clean soil is a fourth method; however, it may be necessary to mix ferrous sulfate with the soil to provide adequate iron.
