

Coaches' Comments

You might call Friday night's game a complete team effort because all 36 players on the Greyhound team played. We divided up into three teams, with the second offensive team playing most of the game. The first team accounted for the scoring in the first quarter, while the second team accounted for most of the other scoring. Several freshmen even made it on our defensive score sheet this week while several sophomores who were originally JV players graded good on offense and defense. Several things occured that were worth mentioning. Bo Johnson was number one for the first time on the defensive scoring with 37 points. Mike Howell (freshman) outscored his brother on defense with five points. Al Bateman touched the ball five times, scoring on four and nearly on the fifth. 




