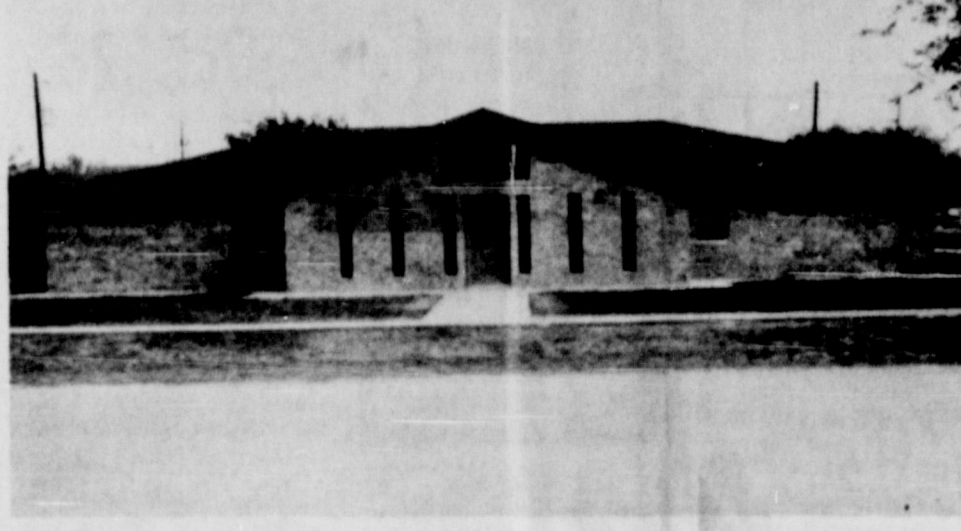
Al, a 140 pound junior, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dusty Bateman.

Baptists To Begin Sunday School at 9:45

The morning worship service will begin at 10:55 a.m.

Emphasizing Bible study, First Baptist Church is planning a high attendance day in Sunday School on November 17, which members are calling Celebration Sunday. They will also celebrate their 70th anniversary on this day with a homecoming, open house, and an old-fashioned dinner.

Clocks Roll Back Sunday

Knox City and area residents will join the nation Sunday morning at 2:00 o'clock when clocks will be set back one hour to end daylight savings time for the four winter months.

Congressional action ended the nation's ten-month experiment with year round daylight time originally set for two years in an effort to conserve energy.

Under the new legislation, the nation will stay on standard time until 2:00 a.m. Sunday, February 23, 1975.

You might call Friday night's game a complete team effort because all 36 players on the Greyhound team played. We divided up into three teams, with the second offensive team playing most of the game. The first team accounted for the scoring in the first quarter, while the second team accounted for most of the other scoring. Several freshmen even made it on our defensive score sheet this week while several sophomores who were originally JV players graded good on offense and defense. Several things occurred that were worth mentioning. Bo Johnson was number one for the first time on the defensive scoring with 37 points. Mike Howell (freshman) outscored his brother on defense with five points. Al Bateman touched the ball five times, scoring on four and nearly on the fifth. Dale Bloxham scored his first TD and also caught a pass for a TD that was called back. We got our first safety for two points. Swain kicked his longest field goal (20 yards). Nine players graded 80 or higher on offense and Mike Howell got a white star for making an unassisted tackle on a Mogul that had intercepted a pass on our goalline. Mike tackled Buddy Cypert on our 50 yard line to keep Munday scoreless for the last three years.

Defensively, Joey Swain had 94%, Jerry Stamps had 89%, Dale Bloxham, 89%, Jimmy Lynn, 87%, Jimmy Moore, 86%, Robert Taylor, 83% and Mike Burkham 80%.

JV players on defense that scored were Tim Whitten with 17 points, Jimmy Albus with 7 points, Mike Howell, 5 points, Troy Lewis three points and Robert Watson one point.

JV players on offense were Tim Whitten who had a 65% grade and Flint Richardson with a 73%. Richardson also carried the ball five times for 24 yards.

Our big problem now is with Crowell this week. They have been rated high all year in several polls and by all reports are even tougher than the scores they have posted thus far. They have only lost one game and it was to Memphis which is also a high

rated team. They have better than average size in both the line and backfield and a team that makes very few mistakes. Another strong point is their defense, which has only allowed 28 points in six ballgames. They run a five man front and have a better than average secondary that is very alert. We will have to play our best game offensively and defensively to stay with the Wildcats. At the present, we are OK physically. Charlie Flye should be back in top form and will travel to play at 7:30 at Crowell.

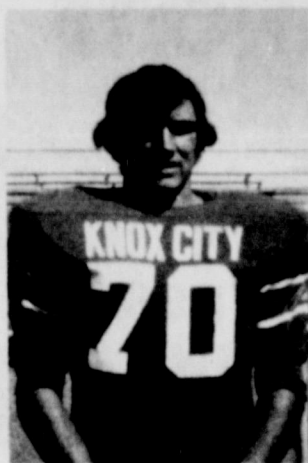

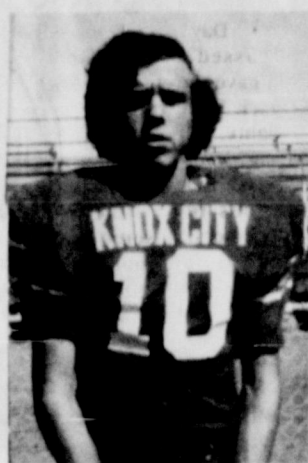

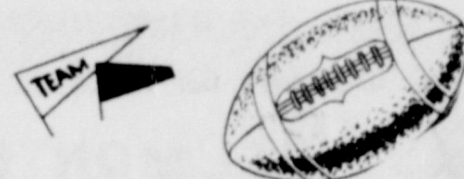

White Seeks Action On Ways To Cut Costs

AUSTIN -- Positive action by all food related industries can help make a turn-around in the cost-price squeeze that is crippling our economy and contributing to inflation today, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said recently.

"I am urging every segment of the food chain to look at all production and sales methods for ways to cut costs," said White. "Today, there is too wide a gap between what the farmer receives for his products and the prices being paid by consumers at the retail level."

Commissioner White said he was grateful that his two weeks of negotiations with ranchers and dairymen recently had helped prevent mass slaughters of calves in Texas.

An earlier appeal this year by White to national food chains brought about some renewed efforts to generate sales of meat at competitive prices. "All food stores, wholesalers and processors must take a hard look for methods that will reduce expenses and then pass the savings on to the consumers," White declared. "The gap between farm and retail prices is wider than at any time in the past 30 years."

"Transportation charges could be decreased by revision of shipping methods and removal of some inhibiting and costly national legislation," he said. "Also, some unnecessary national regulations on manufacturing and processing could be deleted and help reduce retail prices."

Farm prices have dropped at least 18 per cent in the past year and are below production costs in many cases. Yet, corresponding drops have not taken place on food costs. The farmers and the consumers

both need a fair break in the market place but the whole system is not responding as it should," White added.

Commissioner White said the Texas Department of Agriculture is working with other state departments and federal agencies in an effort to correct current inequities. "But it requires cooperation from every segment of the food industry," he noted.

On the international level, White has met with representatives of several oil producing countries in an effort to reduce fuel costs for agriculture. "We received a very favorable reception for the idea from representatives of two countries and hope to continue negotiations on cheaper fuel supplies."


