

#### Trail Ride Termed Big **Juccess**

Accompanied by Knox County Sheriff H.C.Stone, approximately fifty riders left Rhineland last Wednesday at 1:45 p.m., bound for Seymour Pierce, Mrs. O.L. Patterson in neighborning Baylor Coun-The group included people -- and horses -- from all over Knox County, plus two young Baylor County residents, Jim and Wendy

> Four hours and fifteen miles later, the group rode into camp at the Bates corrals, northwest of Bomarton, after a number of horse races, blown-off hat chases, a lot of visiting, and three "Water stops'

Several pickups equipped with water cans and trailers made the "water stops" possible. The pickup drivers would pull several miles ahead of the riders and wait for them with water for those who didn't have canteens -and for those who did, because it didn't take long to empty a canteen, especially if one had a few thirsty friends and acquaintances.

The trailers were for anyone who gave out and wanted to haul their horses to camp. Only a few of the youngest riders availed themselves and their horses of this mode of transportation.

Greeting the riders on their arrival into camp was the enticing aroma of barbecue cooking, thanks to the efforts of chief trail ride cooks Rick Barnard of Knox City and Tom Brooke Hudson of Benjamin. They were ably assisted by Troy Lewis of Knox City and a number of the women members of the Knox County Riding Club.

Before the trail riders got to enjoy the delicious meal of barbecue, red beans, cole slaw, sourdough biscuits, and apple cobbler, they unsaddled, watered, and fed their tired horses, which were then turned loose in the various pens to rest up for the final lap of the journey.

The dusty, somewhat sunburned trail riders were joined for supper by about 200 persons from Knox and Baylor Counties, as approximately 250 persons went through the serving line at the camp for the chuchwagon supper Wednesday night.

After supper a band composed of several area musicians struck up some "dancing" music, and young and old alike stepped out on the "dance" floor, which was really a bare spot of ground near the "cook trailer". Youngsters who had never danced before got lessons from mothers and fathers. and were soon asking other youngsters to "come dance with me." Members of the band were Gail and Paul Bullion, George Brown, W.C. Lankford, Jake Wallace, R.C. Daniel, Tom Brannon, and Mr. Worley

About 11:30 p.m. the day's journey began to catch up with the dancers and the band played "Good Night, Ladies".

After the camp cleared of visitors, the overnight residents got down to the serious business of going to sleep. Some put their sleeping bags on top of trailers, some were on the ground with saddles for pillows, some set up cots in their horse trailers, and a few had the "luxury" of campers to sleep in.

Some of the trail riders went home after the first day's ride, leaving about forty people who spent the night in camp. The group was joined by a number of new faces the next morning, so there were again some fifty riders hitting the trail for Seymour Thurs-

day morning. With the coming of daylight, the camp started to stir. 22. TOTAL DEPOSITS. Horses were caught, watered, and fed. Sleeping bags were rolled up and cots were folded. Breakfast cooks headed for the "cook trailer" to serve up the delicious eggs and sausage, which had been donated to the group by Sam Jones and Mr. and Mrs. Ot of Seymour.

Crewing the rolling kitchen 81. Other reserves on loans on the breakfast shift were Sue Oxford, Jan Carver. Katrine Hudson, Stella Carver, Jan Lankford, and Shirlev Brown.

All cleaned up, in white shirts and their red Knox County Riding Club emblems on the back, bandana neckerchiefs, and blue levis, fifty-eight members strong, the Knox County Riding Club was exhorted by club parade chairman, Joe Boone, to watch your spacing, stay even with your partner, and square your corners". The group lined out behind club sweetheart, Lynda Brooke Hudson, and flag bearer, Tammy Carver, stretching a block and a half.

The club won second place

trophy in the riding club division, which was presented after the grand entry at the rodeo Thursday night, with sixty members mounted for the grand entry.

Following the parade, the group met at picnic shed #4 at Seymour park for a delicious stew supper, cooked up by trail cooks, Barnard and Hudson. The younger trail riders had recovered sufficiently to enjoy the rides and swings in the park, while older members were content to sit and sip a second cup of iced tea. In a few cases, it was stand and sip a second cup of iced

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
