News Is **Beginning** Fifth Year

If readers will notice the volume and number on this edition of The Knox County news, they will find that this issue begins the fifth year of publication for the hometown paper.

Those of us who have lived here most of our lives will remember that Wednesday, October 13, 1971, when we learned that Volume 67. Number 44 of The Knox County Herald would not be printed even though it was cameraready in the home office of publisher Tommy Herring in Munday. When the editor of the Herald, the Rochester Reporter, and the Times were summoned to the Munday office, it was then we learned that the papers were being closed and the publisher was

taking bankruptcy. Even though it was one of the biggest 'blows' the town had ever suffered, businessmen and friends rallied to the job of starting over. Groceryman Bob Harrison and Herald editor Billye Angle and her husband, Buddy, met with publisher Roy Craig in Stamford late Wednesday afternoon in regard to how the new paper could get 'off the ground.' Then on Thursday, October 14, Chamber of Comsecretary-manager Doris Crownover called a meeting of all persons interested in the dining room of the City Cafe and with

pledged support of the merchants, three months' free rent courtesy of Mrs. Myrtle White, and the help of so many that we dare not mention just a few. The Knox County News was established that afternoon and the Angles assumed the responsibility of the new paper. Our good friends in Munday followed suit the next day, and those in Rochester a week later.

The newly formed Wo man's Action League sold subscriptions from door to door and the News was See NEWS Pg. 7

Improvement Program For Postal Service Due

The U.S. Postal Service first-class mail service improvement program went into effect at the Knox City Post Office on October 11. Postmaster Jeff Graham said.

Under the program, firstclass mail will receive service that is equal to or better than

The major, new service step will extend to all firstclass mail weighing 13 ounces or less. "In practical terms. what this service improvement means is that domestic first-class postage now will purchase the level of service that previously only airmail could buy," said Postmaster Graham.

"Under the new program, there no longer will be an advantage in purchasing airmail postage for domestic delivery." he said.

Priority mail (now starting at weight in excess of 13 parcel service, and international airmail are unaffected by the improvement program and continue in their present form, the postmaster

'Airmail stamps will be sold for use on priority and international airmail. They can also be used in various combinations with other stamps for first-class mail,"

Customers can exchange airmail stamps, and stamped envelopes and cards at full postage value for ordinary stamps, stamped envelopes and cards. Stationery bearingairmail indicia will be allowed to be mailed at the first-class Postmaster Graham
