PHLOT OF TRACK DRAMA

A chance experience shared by actor George Raft and producer Jeff Lazarus resulted in the key situation of the plot of Paramount's "The Lady's From Kentucky," the romance of the turf, scheduled to have its first local showing next Sunday and Monday at the Roxy Theatre in Munday.

For weeks Lazarus and a covey of writers had struggled over the script, groping for a device that would provide conflict between Raft and the girl, played by Ellen Drew, and at the same time keep them together throughout the race track picture.

One week end, producer and star, both devoted racing fans, went to Victorville together, and there spotted a yearling, owned by a farmer, and decided it could be brought up to be another Seabiscuit. They bought the animal jointly for \$500.

There followed a month of careful handling by trainers hired for the purpose—and of constant disagreements and bickering between the owners. Upshot was that the horse turned out to be a disappoint-

ment, and they sold it. But it wasn't until they met to sign the bill of sale that Lazarus realized that a very whimsical Muse had provided the situation he needed for "The Lady's From Kentucky."

In the picture, Raft, who plays a big-time gambler, first meets Miss Drew, a Kentucky horse-breeder, when each falls heir to half of the same horse. Others figuring importantly in the comedy plot are Hugh Herbert, Zasu Pitts and Louise Beavers.
