## Food Stamp Program To Begin Oct. 1 In County

The new statewide food stamp program will start operation October 1, 1973 in Knox County.  
This was announced today by Mr. William E. McKinney, Food Stamp Program Director, State Department of Public Welfare.  
"The statewide food stamp program will replace the commodity foods program currently operating in this county," explains Mr. McKinney. "The statewide program was made possible when the 1972 Texas Legislature appropriated \$7.7 million for a state-administered, state-financed statewide food stamp program."  
The State Department of Public Welfare will administer the new program and the United States Department of Agriculture will provide the food stamps and bonus stamps.  
Eligible households pay a set amount for food stamps and are then given bonus stamps based on size of household and their

total net income. Bonus stamps make up the difference between what a household can pay for food and what is necessary for a nutritious diet.  
Also, bonus stamps mean many dollars worth of new business for the community. Bonus stamps represent money that low-income households would not otherwise have to spend at local grocery stores.  
A recent study of three rural food stamp communities showed that food stamps represented from five to ten percent of the total retail sales.  
Households are certified eligible for food stamps at the food stamp office at 604 Main, Knox City, Texas. Certified households will then receive Authorization To Purchase (ATP) cards in the mail which will tell them how many stamps they are eligible for and how much money, if any, they must pay for them.  
The ATP card and the necessary cash are redeemable for food stamps at local post offices.  
Participating grocers accept food stamps for the purchase of most foods and food products. Food stamps cannot be used to buy alcoholic beverages, tobacco, and most imported items.  
Participation in the food stamp program is voluntary and does not prevent the household from receiving any other benefits for which the members might be eligible.  
Food stamps increase the food purchasing power of low-income households. And food stamps are also good for the community's economy. Studies show that food stamps generate new economy and create new jobs.

Born September 11, 1903, in Oklahoma, he married Ina Mae Brown February 9, 1938 in Goree.  
Mr. Sanderson was a retired rancher, and he and his wife moved to Knox City from Seymour seven years ago. He was a member of the Foursquare Church.  
Survivors are his wife, a son, James of Ulisses, Kansas; a sister, Mrs. W.J. Williams of Dumas; and one grandchild, Sherri.  
Nephews served as pallbearers.

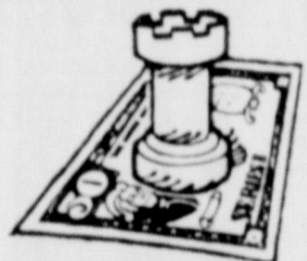

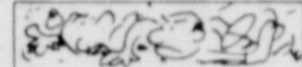

## TFU President Speaks At Haskell Monday Night

Haskell, Texas—Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco said a farm audience at Haskell Monday night that in spite of all the work that Farmers Union had done to pass a good farm bill, the new farm program was an "watered-down" by action of Senate-House conference committee that Farmers Union opposed the conference report and called on members of the House to reject it.

"We hope that President Nixon will veto the new farm bill because it is inadequate in terms of price assurances to farmers and lacks the capability of providing an incentive to encourage farmers and ranchers to produce food and fiber supplies in abundance," Naman said.

Farmers Union was originally on record in support of the target concept in the new farm bill, but concessions to the Administration to avoid a veto have weakened the proposal to the point to where it lost Farmers Union's support and has been rejected by other farm groups that traditionally support federal farm programs.

Naman told those attending the county Farmers Union Meeting which was held in the Community Room of a Haskell bank that Farmers Union opposed the program for three major reasons: "The target prices in the program are inadequate to assure farmers a fair return on their investment. The escalator clause which we considered the heart and soul of the new program has been eliminated for the first two years. The conference report

includes a 'no-escalator clause' that was in the House version and insisted upon by Secretary Butz. This clause penalizes farmers for efficiency by setting up a device that will provide a loophole for the Administration to take away any increases in target prices that might be warranted as the cost of production goes up. This efficiency of yield adjustment factor is a phony scheme that is being used against farmers at the insistence of Secretary Butz to assure that target prices will not go up even though farmers costs go up," the statewide farm leader said.

Naman said that the new farm bill compromises the farmers' position and will fail to serve the interests of either the producer or the consumer.

"The Administration sought to dismantle the farm programs with a 'phase-out' proposal. It has now achieved somewhat the same results in the form of a watered-down, ineffectual farm program. For this reason, I doubt if President Nixon will veto it," the farm organization leader said.

### CHEAPER COW DIETS

Providing the beef cattle herd with an economical, yet nutritional diet will be the center of discussions at the Beef Cattle and Forage Short Course at Texas A&M University Aug. 20-21. Emphasis will be placed on using good forage in the feeding program to lower ration costs. The use of protein supplements and minerals will also be discussed as well as different types of forage grasses and different grazing systems.

The Wyoming Girl Scout Council made arrangements for her trip that included 53 girls on the 26 two-man canoes and eight counselors.

The Mississippi River Heritage Trip commemorated the first landing west of the Mississippi, and the itinerary was planned so the girls could explore early river towns plotted and surveyed by Lincoln. It meant the canoes tested their skills on America's greatest river, while gaining an understanding of their heritage.

### TO SAVE YOU TIME AND MONEY

#### APPLIANCE WARRANTIES

Even if an appliance is guaranteed, it's important to know what the guarantee covers. Parts and labor? What parts? For how long? Who stands behind the warranty—the manufacturer or the dealer? Be sure that if a dealer goes out of business, you aren't without a warranty.

Consumer service people at the Whirlpool Corporation suggest that you also ask these questions:

- Is the warranty in effect if I move?
- Do I need to mail a registration card (some have a deadline for mailing) or save my sales receipt?
- Do I have to mail a defective part somewhere to get warranty coverage? If "yes," who pays for removing, mailing and replacing the defective part?
- If the work must be done by an authorized agent, where is the nearest one? Warranties usually don't cov-

Although most warranties don't cover damage due to "acts of God" such as flooding, your household insurance may cover you.

There's still another kind of coverage. When shopping for an appliance, check the warranty carefully to see that it's a good one. This way you save yourself

## OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

BY VERN SANFORD

"Wildlife is a product of edges." This statement has long been an axiom in game management circles. Although hunters may not have thought of it in these terms, this principle is one that most of them realize instinctively.

What does it mean? Dr. J. P. Linduska of Remington Arms explains it this way. When you go hunting for cottontails (and that's legal in Texas anytime) you don't put your beagle down in the center of a cornfield, or in the middle of a dense wood. You work the hedgerows, brushpiles, and woodland borders . . . the edges.

It's the same with quail and pheasants. For every one of these birds you find out in the center of the field, you'll stir up a dozen on the borders, on the banks of ditches and just inside the thickets. Again it's the edges.

Of course the real give-away as to where game hangs out is to watch a bird dog with a couple of seasons of savvy behind him. He won't putter around in the big uniform places. He will skirt the edges of the field, the edges of the plum thickets, the edges of the orchard, and all the other edges where different types of vegetation meet.

Dr. Kinduska says "It's no mystery why game inhabit the edges. That's where they find, in close proximity, all the things necessary for a good life."

He points out that the center of a picked cornfield offers food aplenty and occasionally the birds will wander to the center. Also the center offers

protection, so now and then the birds will stray in. But by far the greatest advantage to the hunter is to be found at the edges . . . since that's where the game spends most of its time.

Succinctly put "it's a matter of safety and logistics." Whether it's game or some other species of animal life it's not enough simply to have lots of food and cover. Unless they are properly distributed . . . one in relation to the other . . . the amount of wildlife an area will support will be limited well below its real potential.

That's why, other things being equal, 10 one-acre ponds will produce more ducks than one big 10-acre pond.

It's a large part of the reason, too, why the small patch farms of yore were more productive of game than the big, consolidated, Texas ranches of today.

Modern day game management strives to improve habitat partly by increasing and bettering "edge" conditions.

Naturally, such a program doesn't allow for too many generalities. In a large timber stand it might well mean creating openings to insert food producing units in a uniform habitat of trees. In a large area of open fields it might call for hedges, or fence-row plantings of shrubs and trees to add cover to a barren landscape.

Whatever the formula, it will vary with the nature of the countryside and the type of game you want to encourage. But you can be sure that giving wildlife an edge on numbers will require, first of all, giving them an edge on which to live.
