Edge Haskell For Title

Hounds Take District

Coach Jimmy Rogers' Knox City Greyhounds edged Haskell by one point to win the district track title in Jayton for the fourth consecutive year and qualified five individuals to the regional meet, April 30 and May 1 in Lubbock. Things seemed to get off to a bad start for the Greyhounds as the 440 relay team, which had the distinction of being the top team in this area, dropped the baton causing disqualification.

Dubbed as one of the best small school district meets in the state, the Greyhounds racked up a total of 108 points while Haskell had 107. Paducah with its standout Danny Garrett had a close third with 94 points.

Knox City was led by Al Bateman as he won the 220 with a time of 22.1 and finished second to Garrett in the 100 with a time of 9.85. Bateman took second in the long jump with a leap of 22'3".

Following Garrett and Bateman in the 100 yard dash was KC's Charlie Flye who ran third with a time of 10.1. Two more firsts were racked up by the Hounds as Jimmy Lynn took top spot honors in the 330 yard hurdles with a time of 40.7 and Eddie Martinez in the mile run. His time was 4:55.4.

Bill Reynolds and Ricky Bishop took first and second places respectively in the pole vault. Reynolds had a vault of 11'6" with Bishop having a 11'3".

Lynn also took third in the

120 yard high hurdles with a time of 15.2 and Reynolds placed third in the 880 yard run in a 2:14.5 time. Butch Johnson also brought home a third place in the mile run with a 5:08.6.

Other individuals helping add points to KC's total were Jimmy Lynn, fifth in the long jump; Jim Richardson, fifth in the 100 yard dash; Jerry Eaton and Tim Whitten, fifth and sixth in the 330 intermediate hurdles; Richardson, fourth in the 220 yard dash; and the mile relay team, Philip Rhodes, Tommy Mangis, Bill Reynolds, and Charlie Flye, fourth.

At regional in Lubbock, Friday, pole vault competition will begin at 12:30 p.m. followed by running events at 3:30 p.m. The long jump event will be at 11:00 on Saturday with the running finals at 1:30 on the same day.

In Demo Primary

Good Turnout Expected Sat.

A good turnout of voters is expected here Saturday, May 1, for the Democratic Primary.

According to a report early Wednesday morning from Tax Assessor-Collector John A. Smith's office, up until March 1, a total of 2,961 voters had been recorded and since that time "well more than another 100 voters had registered for the upcoming election."

In a check with County Clerk Zena Waldron's office following the 5:00 o'clock deadline Tuesday afternoon, 46 persons had voted absentee, with 12 absentee ballots requested by mail and three returned. The absentee ballots may be received by mail until noon on Saturday, May 1, she said.

Two contested races in the county are expected to bring out a record number of voters. Four men have filed for the office of County Commissioner, Precinct One, including

C.C. (Buddy) Angle, Charles Lankford, Billy Gene Johnston, and Charles Ray (Charlie) Smith. J.V. Carver, who has held the office 16 years, did not seek re-election.

Incumbent R.C. Daniel of Truscott will face Philip Homer of Munday for the office of County Commissioner, Precinct Three.

Uncontested races include W.S. (Bill) Healy, State Representative, 101st Legislative District; R.J. (Judson) Balch, District Judge, 50th Judicial District; W.H. Healy, District Attorney, 50th Judicial District; H.C. Stone, Sheriff, Knox County; John A. Smith, Tax Assessor-Collector, Knox County; and Bobby D. Burnett, County Attorney, Knox County.

On Precinct One's ballot, Sam Leaverton's name for county chairman will appear, along with Abe Watson, Precinct Chairman for Precinct 7S.

Lee Smith is precinct chairman for Precinct 7N.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. and voters in Knox County will vote at the Community Center at South Third and Avenue B for Precinct One (7S) while Precinct Two (7N) will vote at the City Hall.

Both Mr. Watson and Mr. Smith have asked the News to remind voters if possible to bring their voter registration slips with them to the polls. A sample for Precinct One appears elsewhere in this week's News.

Citizens are asked to remember to vote Saturday as this is not only a privilege but a responsibility as well.

Tax Check Is Received

AUSTIN--Comptroller Bob Bullock mailed checks totaling \$11.9 million to 516 cities and towns last Thursday as payment for their April city sales tax rebates.

Bullock said he has remitted \$87.4 million to the 845 municipalities collecting the one-cent sales tax so far this year, compared to \$80.4 million remitted during the same period last year.

"Both city and state sales tax collections are growing faster than inflation alone," the Comptroller said.

He noted that 1975 city sales tax collections totaled \$263.9 million, nearly 10 percent more than the \$240.8 million collected in 1974; and state sales tax collections in 1975 totaled \$1,266 billion, 12.5 percent more than the \$1,126 billion collected in 1974.

Bullock attributed the increases mainly to increased consumer spending and improved collection procedures by the Comptroller's Office.

"Because tax collections are running so high, I've been able to project that state government can easily get by another two years without a tax increase," he said. "And with careful planning, we might be able to avoid new taxes for years to come."

Knox City's net check for April was \$1087.78 as compared to Munday's \$1100.58, Seymour's \$826.25, Haskell's \$2900.52, Stamford's \$3646.73, and Anson's \$1060.47.



Knox County Accidents Are Investigated

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of March, 1976, according to Sergeant J.W. Garner, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1976 shows a total of 13 accidents resulting in one person killed and six persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for March, 1976, shows a total of 448 accidents resulting in 15 persons killed and 261 persons injured, as compared to March, 1975, with 446 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 217 persons injured. This was two more accidents, two less killed, and 44 more injured in 1976 at the same period of time.

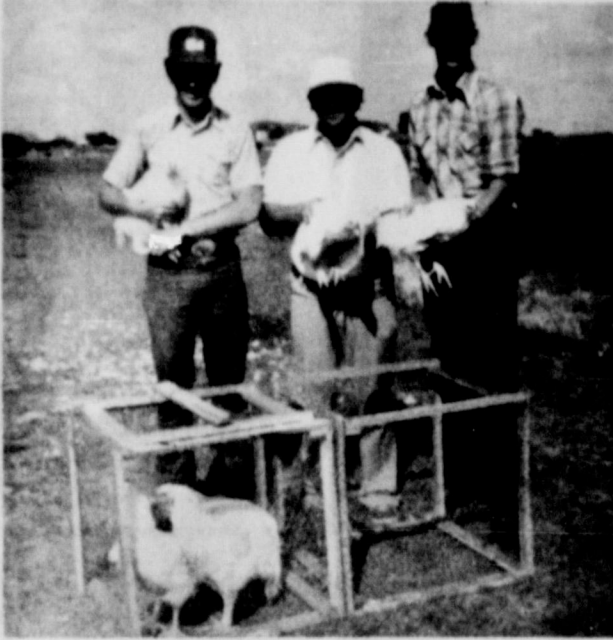
