Large Crowd At Chillicothe Station For Field Day

Approximately four hundred farmers and agricultural workers from Texas and Oklahoma attended the Annual Field Day at the Chillicothe agricultural experiment station, Wednesday, August 21, according to R. O. Dunkle, county agent. Five farmers from Knox County attended.

The program began promptly at 9 o'clock with a field trip over the experiment station farms. Since they are working chiefly on grain sorghums at this station, special attention was given to them during the field trip. More than 500 varieties of grain sorghums are bred and maintained at this station to furnish pure seed for experimental breeding work. In the experimental plots they have the varieties most commonly grown as well as new varieties that seem to be adaptable to this section of the country. From these plots data is collected as to yields, maturity date, moisture content of grain, threshing qualities, resistance to disease and many other factors that go into determining the adaptability of certain varieties. The new grain sorghum, known as Midland, that the 4-H boys of Knox County are growing this year, is one of the three high yielding grain sorghums grown at this station and indications are that it will

be one of the best adapted ones for this section. At noon hamburgers, water-melons and cokes were served by the Chillicothe Lions Club. The afternoon session was given over to group discussions. J. R. Quinby, superintendent of the station, welcomed the visitors and introduced the speakers. Mr. Quinby and Mr. Stephens, agronomist at the station, discussed grain sorghums. Mr. Dines, secretary of Certified Wheat Growers Association, discussed new varieties of wheat and their adaptability and milling qualities. E. A. Miller of A. and M. College, discussed the work of the experiment stations and their relation to agriculture in general and to the farmers problems in particular. I. W. Parrot of Tipton, Oklahoma, discussed mechanical cotton harvesting. According to his tests cotton picked with an International Harvester cotton picker sold for about \$30 per bale more than hand picked or sled picked cotton, due to the fact that it graded 1 to 2 grades higher than cotton harvested by hand or sled. Knox County farmers attending this field day were L. C. Sweat and Ancel Waldrip, Knox City, C. C. Browning, Tom Westbrook and Tom Westbrook, Jr., of Truscott, County Agent R. O. Dunkle and Assistant County Agent R. J. Penick also attended. It doesn't irritate us as much to make a new mistake as it does to make an old mistake over again.

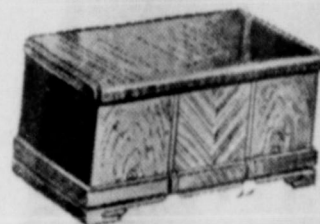

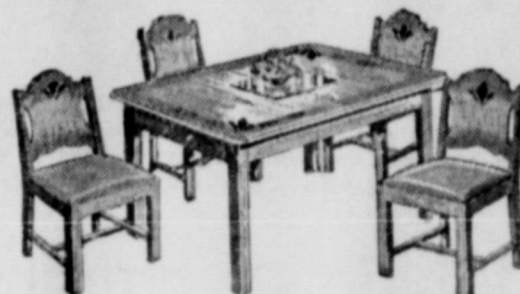

Horn Fly Control Proves Successful

The horn fly control demonstration that was begun on the League Ranch April 23, 1946, was continued this week when the purebred breeding herd was dusted with DDT for the sixth time this year.

According to Snow Crenshaw, foreman of the League Ranch, there has been only four or five cases of screw worms in this herd, which is about one-fourth

as many as occurred of the same size of flies. The cattle have been dusted with a DDT-sulphur mixture every 21 days since April 23, and will continue to be dusted through the current season.

The mixture used is in the ratio of one pound of 50 per cent wettable DDT powder and nine pounds of sulphur.

Danger In Grazing Sorghum Fields

About this time of year, livestockmen are likely to lose a few cattle by grazing them on sorghums, including sudan and Johnson grass. This is an and is called hydrocyanic, a common acid poison, or prussic acid. Grist, veterinarian, says E. A. A & M. College extension service. The poisoning usually occurs after a good growing season, when plants are given a setback by drought, heavy grazing or a bad trampling by livestock.

Cattle affected by this poisoning don't usually last long, says Dr. Grist. They suffer stupor, difficult breathing and convulsions, and there is little time for treatment.

To help prevent this poisoning, see that your cattle get plenty of other feed besides sorghums, such as dry hay. If they eat proper amounts of feed in the barns they are less likely to be affected.

This word of caution is no cause for alarm on the part of dairymen, but it might prevent severe losses in many cases.
