Philippine Nurses Now Employed By Hospital

The Knox County Hospital recently employed two more registered nurses, Cristina F. del Rosario, 21, and Jocelyn C. Villaluz, 24.

The unusual part of the above paragraph is that the two very personable young ladies traveled miles from the Philippine islands to accept their employment, and yet neither of the two knew the other before their arrival in Knox City.

The very attractive young Filipinos are both 5'5" and there is only one pound's difference in their weights, 117 and 118.

Cristina's home is Pasay City. A graduate of the University of St. Thomas where she did her pre-nursing training, she received the bachelor of science degree in nursing from Arellano University in Manila in 1971.

Cristina has a brother in the U.S. Navy in San Diego who investigated the location and population of Knox County for his sister's information. He also learned the meaning of "county" for her in relation to the hospital's name, she said.

Jocelyn, 24, comes from Ilorilo and graduated from the University of the Philippines at Manila where she had her pre-nursing training. She received the bachelor of science degree from Philippines Women's University in Manila in 1971.

"Jocelyn" as she is called, has a sister living in New York. Asked about her first impression of Knox City, she replied "I have to be perfectly honest and

say that I was disappointed because it is such a small place." "However," she quickly added, "the people have been so friendly and kind, it really doesn't matter anymore about the size of the town."

"They were asked how the climate compared with theirs and they replied that so far it was very much the same, cool mornings and warm afternoons. They did add that it gets dark there about 6:00 o'clock in the afternoon. They also explained that they had "been to the cellar twice" since their arrival here!

The nurses are presently staying in the home of Mrs. Opal Hutchinson.

Glen Rumley, hospital administrator, said that the nurses were hired through the "Fit for a Queen" agency in Forest Hill, N.Y., who placed foreign nurses and physicians in U.S. hospitals. The state board was very favorable impressed with those who had made application through the agency and explained that the applicants all had excellent records and were very well qualified.

Cristina arrived by plane April 15 in Lubbock where she was met by Mr. Rumley, while Mrs. Emma Watkins, nurse supervisor, and Mrs. Hazel Tankersley, hospital lab technician, met Jocelyn on April 22 at Lubbock Municipal Airport.

Knox City welcomes these two newcomers and we hope that they will like us as much as all the patients and acquaintances are liking them.

The young women are of the Catholic faith.

Large Turnout Expected In Democratic Primary

A good turnout of voters is expected here Saturday, May 6, for the Democratic Primary. John A. Smith, Knox county tax assessor-collector, reported this week that 2787 voters had registered to vote in the Saturday election.

In a check with County Clerk Zena Waldron Tuesday afternoon a total of 30 persons had cast absentee votes and the count on mail-in ballots was incomplete.

Two contested races here are expected to bring voters out in record numbers.

Incumbent J.C. Stone of Benjamin will face Don Daniel of Truscott and Frank M-Aulley of Knox City in the race for Knox County Sheriff.

Incumbent Joe Reeder Jr. of Knox City will be running against D.J. Brookreson II and R.J. (Judson) Balch, both of Seymour, for District Judge of the 50th Judicial District.

Uncontested in this year's election are County Attorney Bobby D. Burnett, County Tax Assessor-Collector John A. Smith, Precinct No. 5 Constable Leroy David, District At-Precinct I Commissioner J.V. (Dud) Carver, Precinct No. 3 Commissioner R.C. Daniel, State Representative 101st District W.S. (Bill) Beatty, State Senator 30th District Jack Hightower, and U.S. Representative 13th District Graham Purcell.

Freshman Debbie Reese, sophomore Denise Grindstaff, junior Debbie Wall, and senior



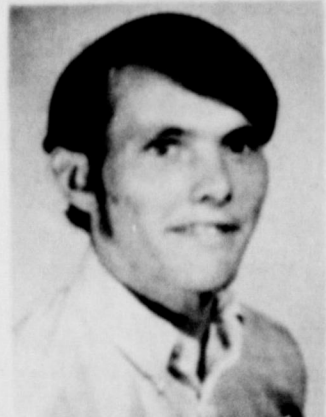

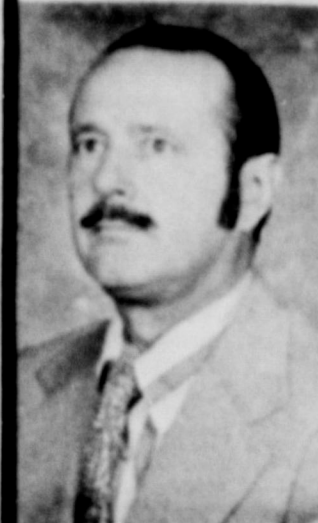

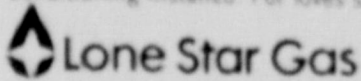

Roadside Erosion Project Completed

Interest continues on the roadside erosion control project in Knox County, reports Arch Lieb of the Soil Conservation Service.

Work on this special project, sponsored by the Wichita Branch Soil and Water Conservation District, Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service County Committee, and Knox County Commissioners Court, began in March of this year.

To date twenty-six applications for assistance have been received by the A.S.C.S. office in Knox City.

Projects have been completed on the Vic Thomas, A.C. Tackitt, and J.C. Elliot farms. Work is underway on Ora McCullough Howell Estate, and League Ranch projects. Five more projects have been designed and are ready for construction.

Protect Gas Dollars

How do you protect your dollars at the gasoline pump? How can you tell if the service station pump is operating correctly? How do you avoid paying for more gas than you get?

The answer to these and other questions are listed in a brochure available from Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

"More dollars are lost at the gasoline pump by both buyers and sellers through inexperience, carelessness or faulty equipment than by actual fraud," Commissioner White said. "But regardless of cause, most of these losses can be prevented."

The pamphlet gives a number of helpful hints on what to watch for when you are buying gasoline. It includes several ways you can tell whether the pump is operating properly, tips on recognizing "bad and switch" tactics, and a few cautions on credit card purchases and equipment losses.

"Remember, it is your money being spent at the service station," White said. "The information in the pamphlet can help make you a more knowledgeable consumer and cut down on dollar losses."

"You are entitled to a full dollar's worth of gasoline for every dollar spent. Weights and measures inspectors from the Texas Department of Agriculture are constantly checking trade practices and mechanical devices for your protection, but they cannot be present to supervise every purchase."

"An alert consumer, well informed, is the best guarantee of equity at the time of sale. Our efforts, combined with consumers', will help save you dollars at the gas pump," Commissioner White said.

The pamphlet also lists all Texas Department of Agriculture regional offices where help can be obtained on gasoline problems. Copies of the information are available on request by writing: John C. White, Texas Department of Agriculture, Austin, Texas, 78711.

Guar On Set Aside Acres Explored

Norman Brints, District 3 Extension Service Consultant, has explored the possibility of planting guar on set-aside acreages.

According to information from Brints, guar can be planted for harvest on set-aside acres, but the farmer must certify with the ASCS office location of his set-aside and his guar planting intentions.

This may be changed under recent rulings by the U.S. Department of Agriculture extending the set-aside certification deadline on cotton and milk to a later time. But, before producers accept any plan, consultation with the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office is advisable, according to extension personnel.

Brints cautions that guar cannot be harvested on conserving base acres. He said that for most of the Rolling Plains producers a flat reduction rate of \$7 per acre for all acres of set aside which will be planted to guar will apply.

But even if the producer

plants a guar crop, he has until Oct. 1 to decide whether he will harvest the current production on diverted acres. If he chooses not to harvest, he must notify the ASCS office prior to Oct. 1 and his \$7 per acre penalty will be recinded.

The profit picture depends upon the expected yield of guar, the expected market price at harvest time and the costs of production.

ONE OF THE BEAUTIFUL SIGHTS THIS SPRING is this field of Englemansdaisy at the Plant Materials Center. Jake Garrison manager, explained to the photographer that Englemansdaisy is a cool season perennial flowering plant that stays green the year round. It grows through the fall and winter as a flat rosette. It makes rapid growth during the spring and flowers over a long period. Seed stalks are about three feet high at maturity. Englemansdaisy is palatable to all classes of livestock and many wildlife species. Research has indicated that better livestock gains have been obtained where grazing included a mixture of grasses and forbs. Seed produced here at the Knox City PMC will be used with a mixture of range grasses to re-introduce this forb into its native grassland environment where it once was abundant. PMT-874 Englemansdaisy was collected near Eldorado, Texas. It is a native to much of Central Texas on many different soil and climate extremes. It is listed as a rare and endangered species in Texas.

Wheat, oats, barley, rye and Triticale varieties will be observed.

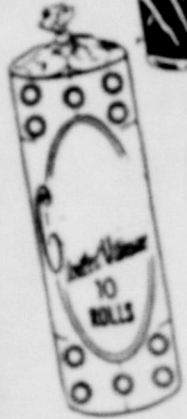

"Wet and Wild"—that's what last week's weather was! Heavy rain and rain, accompanied by a crashing crescendo and dazzling fireworks of thunder and lightning poured out to the sky last Wednesday to flood the stock tanks, creeks, and back yards of those in Truscott and Gilliland. Over four inches was reported in many cases. Those who had cellars were in them as the wind and hail proceeded to wreck havoc in wheat fields.

On the Dugat Creek watershed, when the force of trash took out one fence it washed down and hung on a second which then gave way to the water and debris and sent a wave down to the next fence. Water marks are at least six feet high near county road. This creek was the highest it has been in many years.

China Creek water mark was only exceeded in recent years by the time it rained 2 inches in twenty minutes. After the Dugat Creek flow joined China Creek the water spread deep and wide, going up over all the China Creek bridges and damaging fences all the way to the North Wichita River. Newell Looney said the water came across his land "Like a Wall", he believes he lost a calf in the flood.

West of Truscott, at Antelope Flat, Charles Carroll reported less than 2 inches of rain. The tanks in the Antelope Flat-Good Creek area are still low, even after a 2" rain Saturday night. West of town all spillways were running Sunday.

Knox County Included In
Book Price Refunds

Attorney General Crawford Martin today announced recovery of almost \$700,000 from book publishers and distributors that allegedly conspired to fix the price of children's books sold to Texas schools and libraries.

General Martin said the most recent refund in Knox County totals \$475.11, \$178.13 of which goes to the Benjamin Rural

High School, Gilliland Common School District and Knox City Independent School District; \$100.98 goes to the Munday City-County Library. Total recovery to date for these entities now amounts to \$732.29.

Martin said the most recent refund boosts Texas' total recovery to more than \$1.1 million in the past year, and that more would be coming.

"In April, 1971, Texas recovered \$494,929 and we have now received an additional \$676,216," Martin said.

"There will be one final refund coming next year."

The refund to Texas schools and libraries stems from settlement with the last of more than 30 Book Publishing and Distributing firms sued by Martin in antitrust litigation in 1968.

"As this alleged conspiracy was aimed right at the taxpayers," Martin said, "I'm delighted with the chance to return the taxpayers their money."

Martin said his office is mailing out checks to 757 school districts and 189 public libraries on whose behalf the Attorney General originally filed the price-fixing suit.

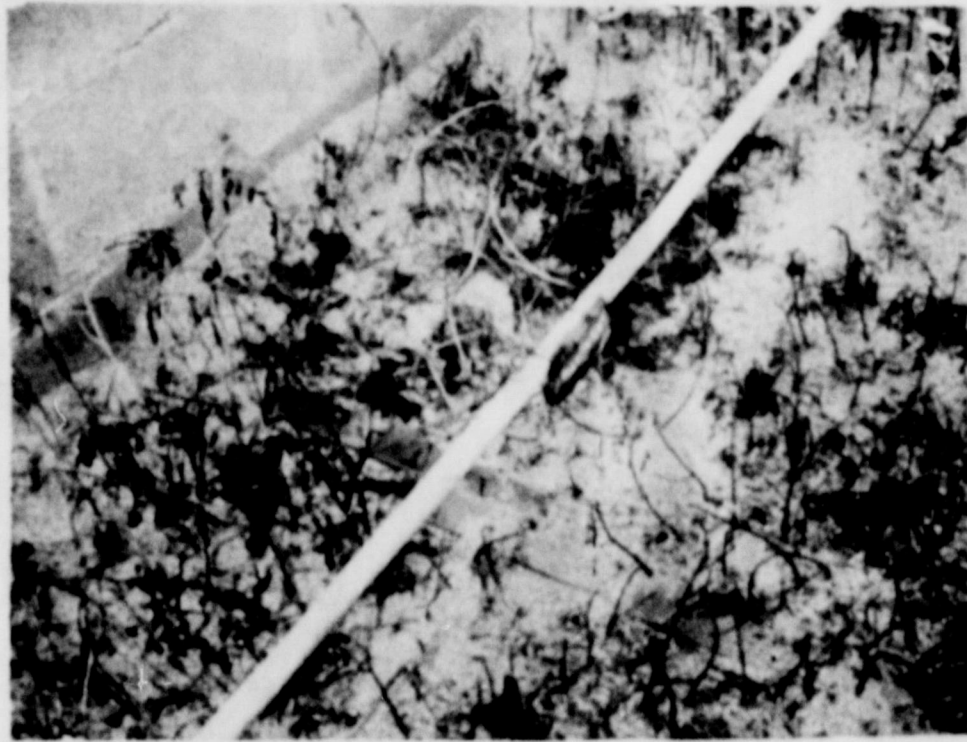
Triumphant Living
