### Hospital Election March 7 Deadline

## March 1 Deadline For City And School Races

With the March 1 filing deadline for city and school elections less than a week away, as of Wednesday morning only incumbent Lynn Worley had filed for re-election to the city council, while incumbent John Crowover had signed for re-election to the school board of trustees.

In addition to Worley, others whose two-year terms expire on the council are Willard Skiles and Paul Clayton. A councilman for one-year must also be elected to fill the unexpired term of Henry L. White, who resigned.

Doyle Graham is the other school board member whose term expires.

Filing deadline for both city and school elections is March 1.

Glen Rumbley, hospital administrator, advised the Knox County News this week that at the regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Knox County Hospital District on February 9, an election was called for Saturday, April 1, 1972, for the purpose of electing two members to the Board of Directors of Knox County Hospital District. The election will be held at the City Hall in conjunction with the city and school elections.

Any person aged 21 or older and a resident and property owner of Knox County may file for this election. Interested persons must file a petition with the secretary of the Hospital District 25 days before the date of the election.

The petition must contain the names of 25 citizens of Knox County who are residents and taxpayers of this county. Petitions may be picked up at the office of Knox County Hospital and when completed may be returned there.

Absolute deadline for filing for these positions is March 1, 1972.

Absentee voting will begin March 13 and continue through March 28. Mrs. Faye Railsback will serve as absentee voting clerk for the city and Mrs. Mary Beth Smith will serve in the same capacity for the school.

## PMC Technical Committee Allocates 1971 Plants

The Technical Committee for the Knox City Plant Materials Center met during the week of February 14.

The purpose of the meeting was to allocate seed and plants produced at the Center during the 1971 crop year.

The seed allocations consisted of 49 numbered accessions with 6062 pounds. Plant allocations were made for plants that were produced at the center specifically for shoreline protection on watershed structures. There were 7,000 plants of indigo bush, 3000 plants of sandbar willow and 15 thousand rhizomes of common reedgrass and 10,000 rhizomes of maidenlace plus some small allotment of giant reedgrass, burbush and prairie cordgrass for trial planting to determine range of adaptation and use.

A draft of the annual plan of operations for the center in 1972 was formulated by the committee using projected needs for field evaluation plantings to be established in the spring of 1974.

A field day was scheduled to be held at the Plant Materials Center September 13, 1972. It will be set up similar to activities in the 1970 field day with tour wagons and guides.

A field review of the Center was scheduled September 14, 1972 following the field day. It will consist of the field review will consist of the field specialists in agronomy, range, biology and plant materials from Texas and Oklahoma.

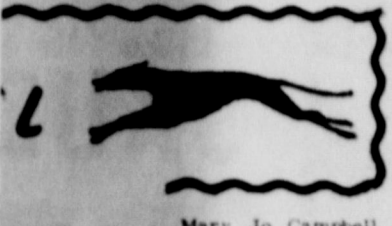

The PASF is hoping that the money we donate can help in buying those things for the crippled children. That about "wraps up" the news of the PASF.

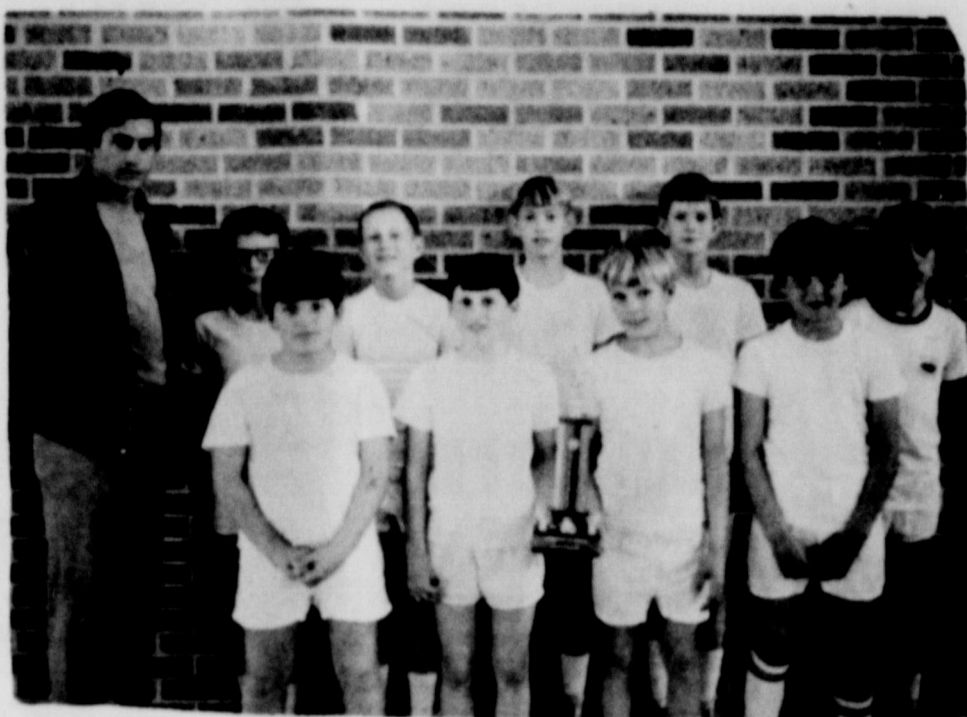
**Seventh Grade**

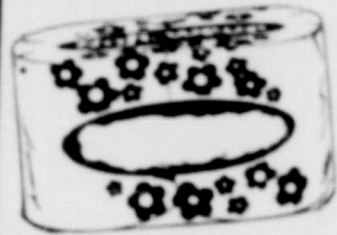

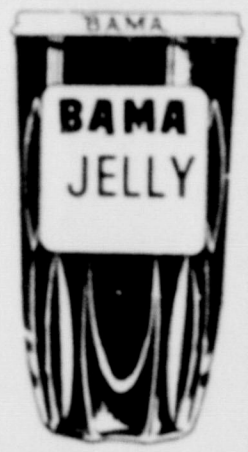
