If you wish you may finance your paving costs at a reasonable rate of interest... one-fourth thirty days after the paving is completed and accepted by your city engineer as meeting strict specifications, one-fourth one year after the date of acceptance, one-fourth two years after date of acceptance and the final one-fourth three years after the date of acceptance.

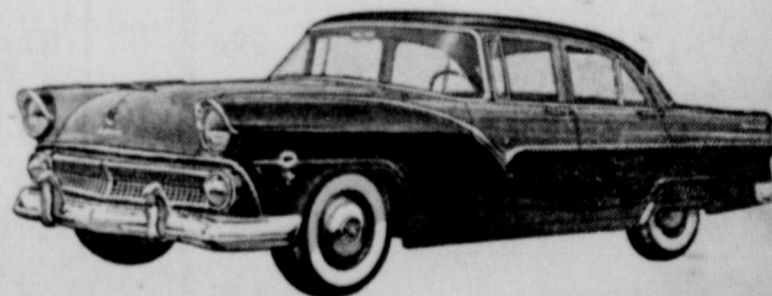

Former Sunset Man Named Outstanding Airman at Donaldson

Master Sergeant James L. Henderson of the 40th Air Base Group at Donaldson AFB, Greenville, S. C., has been named the "Outstanding Airman" of Donaldson. The designation was prompted by a proposal of Headquarters

United States Air Force to release a series of features for use in base newspapers, publishing the Air Force career of outstanding airman.

Sgt. Henderson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Miss Henderson of the Sunset community. His wife is the former Reba Mae Yarbrough, granddaughter of Mrs. Mollie Hubbard.

Born April 3, 1926, Sgt. Henderson has many accomplishments to his credit. While attending Sunset High School he lettered in baseball, basketball and track. Later, during high school post-graduate work at Littlefield, he set a school academic record in chemistry with an average score of 93.3. Upon completion of high school he was awarded a senior scholarship and enrolled in John Tachson College, majoring in agricultural engineering.

When the United States entered World War II Sgt. Henderson became qualified as an aircraft engineer and gunner. Six months after enlisting he was a staff sergeant. Ready for combat, he left the

states for Hawaii, where he participated in the longest post-war flights being conducted at that time: the bombing of Wake Island. He went to the Solomon Islands with the first group of Air Force personnel to land on Guadalcanal. While there he participated in all major air operations in that area. Now a veteran of 182 combat missions totaling over 1,700 combat hours, he was credited with four aircraft destroyed and another probably destroyed. His awards included the Distinguished Flying Cross with two Oak Leaf Clusters, the Air Medal with seven Oak Leaf Clusters, and the Purple Heart for wounds received as a result of enemy action.

After a distinguished tour of combat Sgt. Henderson returned to the states and entered the school for gunner and flight engineer instructors at Fort Myers, Fla. Later he attended the Bendix School of Electronics, after which he became NCOIC of the Target Gunnery Section at Ardmore, Okla.

In May 1948 Sgt. Henderson was one of the first five to be discharged from the Air Force under the point system. During his break in service he completed the Spartan School of Aeronautical Engineering, worked one year under contract with the War Department as Superintendent of Aircraft, and Engine Maintenance on Guam, and spent two years with Braniff International Airways as a mechanic.

In May 1950 he reentered in the Air Force and saw action as a C-119 engineer in Korea. During his off-duty time he developed an electronic engine analyzer for which he was awarded the Bronze Star Medal and a letter of commendation from the Chief of Accidents Branch, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base.

From Korea Sgt. Henderson arrived at Donaldson AFB in time

to participate in the C-119 air drop of construction equipment at various sites on the Greenland icecap. Between flights he supervised the construction of six engine analyzers for use by the 48th Troop Carrier Group.

He is now 3rd - Commissioned Officer in Charge of the Base Instrument School at Donaldson.

The manager added that the new bills, like the old ones, have a stub. This stub must be returned with the payment, he continued, and must not be bent or mutilated by the subscriber since a mutilated stub cannot be returned through the machine for accounting purposes.

He concluded by inviting subscribers with new bills to call of the telephone company.

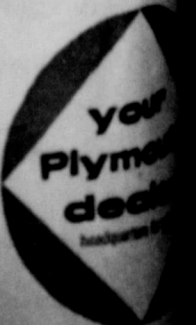

NOT OF NECESSITY

Couched in the words of Philemon 14 is one of the most fundamental principles of Christianity. Paul urged that "goodness should not be as of necessity, but of free will." In Christianity there is an utter lack of compulsion.

Even God so respects the free moral agency of man that He will not violate it by forcing any man to live a godly life. We plead with you to "Repent and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out" (Acts 3:19). We exhort you to "Be baptized and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord" (Acts 22:16).

Following your conversion we encourage you to worship spiritually (John 4:24), give liberally (2 Corinthians 9:6,7), work heartily (Colossians 3:23), and live righteously (Titus 2:12).

Each of these commands can be obeyed ONLY with the full consent of your mind. The Lord has no servants but volunteers. There are no draftees in Christ. You must decide for yourself to obey Christ. We admonish you to do so today, but be certain that you obey "not of necessity, but of free will."
