Truscott Youth Dies of Suffocation

James Truscott Rutherford, 19, of Truscott died of suffocation, Friday, June 22, when he was buried under road gravel in a giant construction hopper.

Rutherford was working on the machine, which mixes sand and gravel for asphalt, when he apparently crawled inside the bin to remove a lodged rock. Gravel banked along the slopes of the hopper vibrated loose and buried the youth at the bottom.

Fellow workmen dug for 20 minutes to free Rutherford, who was pronounced dead at the scene by a doctor.

Rutherford had been working for the Angelo Construction Co. of San Angelo, which is improving U. S. Highway 80. The hopper was located about 13 miles east of Monahans.

Funeral services were held at Gilliland and burial was in the Truscott cemetery.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jess Rutherford of Truscott, a brother and five sisters.

STORES TO CLOSE ON 4TH OF JULY

Most Knox City stores and other businesses will be closed Wednesday in observance of the July 4th holiday, a survey this morning indicated.

Drug stores will be open until about 9:00 a. m., so customers can pick up their daily papers. Both City Cafe and Central Cafe indicated that they will be closed all day.

At the postoffice, mails will be distributed and dispatched, but the windows will not be open and rural delivery will not be made. The bank, city hall and Knox City Clinic will be closed, as will grocery and dry goods stores.

Most service stations indicated that they will not open. There will be no meeting of the Lions Club on the holiday.

Knox City, O'Brien Men Slightly Injured In Traffic Mishap

Seven people were injured, but none seriously, Sunday when a 1951 Dodge pickup driven by Solomon Luna Casillas, 41, O'Brien cafe operator, was in a near head-on crash with a 1951 Chevrolet ten miles west of Vernon.

Highway patrolmen investigating the accident reported the pickup veaved from behind a 1954 Cadillac traveling in the same direction, into the path of the Chevrolet. The Cadillac was also involved in the collision. The pickup driver was held in Wilbarger County jail for investigation of the accident.

Also in the pickup were Ralph Rios, 16, of Knox City and Jesse Luna Casillas, 22, of Munday. The three were treated at Vernon for minor injuries.

Driver of the Chevrolet, A. B. McQuerry of Wichita Falls, was admitted to the Vernon Hospital with minor cuts and bruises; his wife received multiple cuts and bruises and their son, 6 years old, lost four front teeth and was cut about the mouth.

Mrs. Mozelle Braehar Craft of Bowie, driver of the Cadillac, was treated for shock.

Damages were reportedly estimated at \$300-\$400 to the pickup; \$300 or more to the Chevrolet and slight to the Cadillac.

Contract Awarded For Widening of Highway 82 and 83

A contract for 33 miles of construction on U. S. Highway 82 and 83 in King and Knox Counties has been awarded to a San Angelo firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Starin Brothers, Inc., submitted the low bid on the project, which calls for construction of flexible base shoulders and hot-mix asphaltic concrete pavement from Guthrie east to Benjamin.

The project is expected to be completed in 175 working days, according to Palmer Massey of Childress, District Highway Engineer.

H. T. Cunningham of Munday, Resident Engineer, will have active charge of the project while under construction.

Son of Legislator Drowns Friday

The 3-year-old son of State Rep. and Mrs. J. B. Walling of Wichita Falls drowned in a Wichita Falls swimming pool shortly after noon Friday.

The child, Steven Gregory, was discovered floating on the surface of the water by his mother who was there with a group of friends. A life guard and funeral home attendants attempted to revive the child enroute to the hospital.

Walling, 27, an independent oil operator, has served in the Legislature since 1951. A native of Munday, he is a brother of Mrs. A. L. Ressel. Mrs. Walling is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mahlon Boggs of Munday.

The Wallings have three other children, Danny, 6, Scottie, 5 and Candy, 6 months.

Funeral services were held at Wichita Falls and graveside rites at Johnson Memorial Cemetery, Munday.

Ikard and Mahon Urge Quick Brazos Flood Survey

Representatives Frank Ikard of this district and George Mahon of the neighboring district this week renewed a plea for speedy action by the U. S. Corps of Engineers in a study of Upper Brazos River flood control.

The House public works committee recently approved a resolution drawn up by the two legislators authorizing the engineers to ask Congress for \$57,500 for a

survey of flood control needs on the river and its tributaries.

The Corps of Engineers, however, insists that a large backlog of previously approved projects makes it impossible to proceed with the project at this time, and it appears no action will be taken until after January 1.

The project is intended to prevent recurrence of a flood such as the one last fall which caused extensive property damage here and in other counties on the Brazos.

The resolution authorizing the survey grew out of a meeting of Corps of Engineers officials and the legislators with representatives of the counties affected. The meeting was held here last October.

Lions Broom Sale Nets Club \$197.25

Members of the Knox City Lions Club sold nearly \$800 worth of brooms and mops in a house-to-house canvass Wednesday morning, it was announced at the regular meeting of the club Wednesday at noon.

The brooms were made by blind workmen in Texas Light-houses for the Blind, and part of the proceeds go to the blind workmen.

Total sales amounted to \$789, of which the club's share was \$197.25.

Scofield Retiring As District Agent

J. A. Scofield, district agent in Extension District 3 since March 1937, is retiring on June 30. In making the announcement Director G. G. Gibson of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service said Scofield leaves behind him a record of progressive leadership in the fields of agriculture and 4-H club work, and during his almost 20 years in the northwest Texas district, great changes have been made in farming and ranching practices and operations.

Scofield is well known in Knox County, having judged many livestock shows and participated in other 4-H and extension work. He has supervised the work of the county agents in the 22 counties which make up District 3, and has always been a strong booster for 4-H club work. Under his supervision livestock shows on the local, county and district levels have been improved; a strong camping program developed and many state and national 4-H winners have come from the district he served.

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The dreaded pink bollworm is moving into cotton fields in all areas of Texas. When the cotton plants first start blooming, fields should be checked between 9:00 A.M. and Noon, daily, for about ten days for rosetted blooms. Rosetted cotton blooms indicate the presence of pink bollworm. The worm can be found by tearing open a rosetted bloom. Farmers should be on the lookout for pink bollworms, and are urged to contact their County Agent for control recommendations.

Sub-District No. 2 of the Standard District, Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Methodist Church was held at the Rochester church Wednesday.

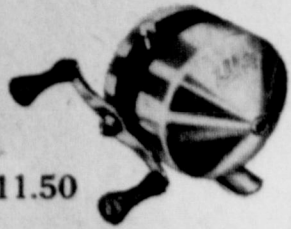

Take Safety Along On Your Vacation, Council Advises

The Council offers a few suggestions for cutting the summer accident toll. Give the car a thorough check-up before starting on the trip and watch for signs of trouble along the way. Don't block vision by improperly loading the car, for good vision is a must for safe driving.

Be prepared for emergencies. A first aid kit, maps, permits if needed, identification, a flashlight and a tool kit should be carried along.

Much of the responsibility for a safe trip rests with the driver. Fatigue greatly reduces his efficiency. Plan the trip, urges the Council, to allow for rest stops during the day and a good night's sleep each night. Don't, they caution, try to drive and take in the sights at the same time.

Know the laws of the states in which you expect to travel, for ignorance of the law is only an excuse. Use traffic signs as a guide for safe driving. They are for your protection.

Traffic will be a problem during the vacation season in all parts of the country. Don't get in a hurry nor drive faster than conditions justify, warns the experts. Be adaptable and fit your driving to the peculiarities and conditions that exist in the areas where you drive. Respect the rights of others and remember, if safety rides with you, you and your family can look forward to next year's vacation.

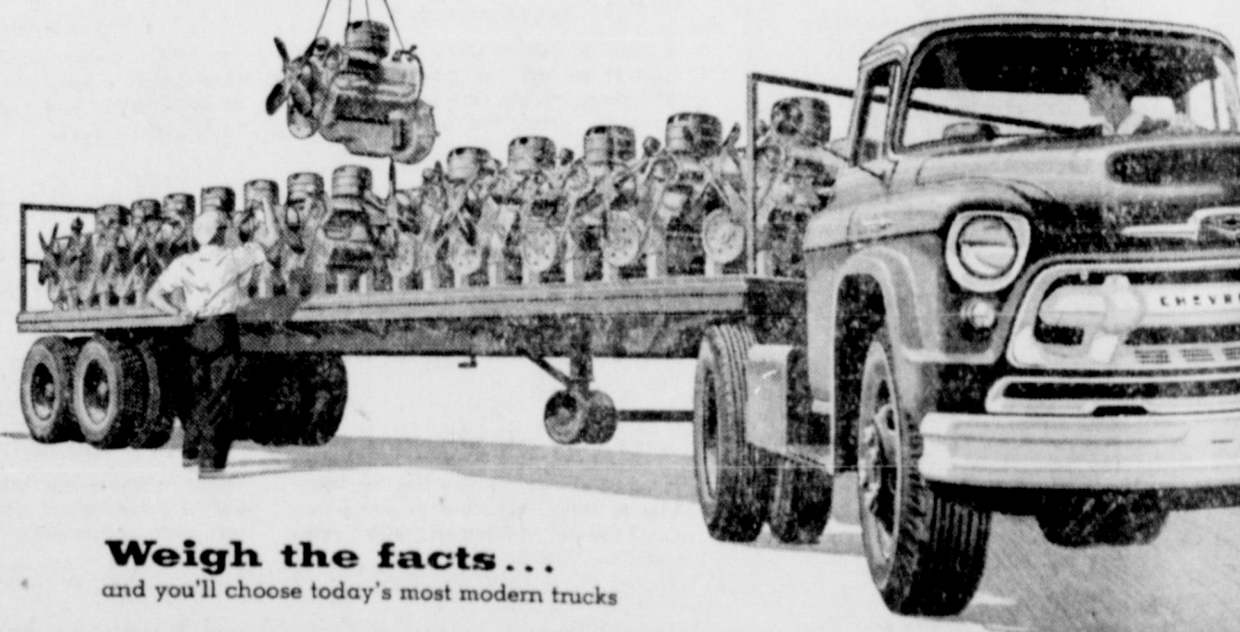

Knox County Population Stable for Past 15 Years

Knox County has had a stable population in the last 15 years, it was revealed recently in a survey conducted by the Northwest Texas Methodist Conference.

There has been a decline of only 80 in the county's population during the 15 years, according to statistics compiled by the Rev. J. H. Crow of Abilene, executive secretary of the Town and County Commission of the Northwest Texas Methodist Conference.

The survey showed a population of 10,000 in 1940, 10,082 in 1952 and 10,010 in 1955.

Schools suffered a heavier enrollment loss, however, shrinking from 2,702 in 1940 to 2,494 in 1950 and 2,053 in 1955. That's a decline of 649.

The Methodist Church membership held fairly stable, ranging from 1,092 in 1940 to 1,079 in 1950 and 1,029 in 1955.

The survey shows 546,560 acres in farming in the county, with 837 farms, and a farm population of 4,035. There were 271 full owners of farms and 180 part owners, 384 tenant farmers and two farm managers. The average size farm in 1954 was 689.3 acres.

There are 2,485 families living in the county, with an average family income of \$2,755 per year. The population per square mile is 11.8. There are 613 Negroes and 858 Latin Americans. These figures do not include seasonal workers.

Oil production in the county in 1954 was 1,071,414 barrels.

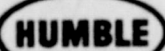
