Funeral services for Mrs. Margaret Verhalen, 86, who died in the Knox County Hospital Tuesday Oct. 10, will be held at the St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Rhineland at 10 a.m. today (Thursday) Oct. 12. The Rev. Anthony Schroeder will officiate.

Burial will be in the Rhineland Cemetery under direction of Pinkard-Smith Funeral Home.

Mrs. Verhalen was born in South Bend, Indiana Sept. 30, 1875. She came to Texas with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. L. Klein, who were natives of Germany.

They lived in Clay County, where Mrs. Verhalen married Leo Herchenback in 1893. They moved to Knox County in 1897, and operated a general store in Rhineland. After the death of Herchenback she married M. A. Verhalen and the couple moved to a farm six miles north of Knox City.

Mr. Verhalen died several years ago.

## Exhibit Space Assigned Knox City For Texas Industrial Site Selection Show

Exhibit space has been assigned in the Texas Industrial Site Selection Show for Knox City to tell the nation's industrialists why this city is a good place to locate a plant, it was announced by Tom Van Winkle, manager of the Knox City Chamber of Commerce.

"Knox City has cinched a choice spot in the show," Van Winkle was advised by Ira W. Curry, managing director. He said, "The aggressive attitude being shown by Knox City's industrial leaders gives them an advantage in the spirited competition among Texas cities to attract new industries."

The Texas Industrial Site Selection Show will be the first exhibition ever held anywhere featuring the individual communities of an entire state. It will present to industrial site seekers, at one time under one roof, specific information about specific locations in Texas.

The show will be held in Dallas' vast downtown Memorial Auditorium for a four-day run next January 22-25 (Monday through Thursday).

## American Legion Sponsors Cub Pack -- 15 Sign Up

A number of local citizens of Knox City met at the American Legion Hall Tuesday night to organize a Cub Scout troop here.

Paul Fitzgerald was master of ceremonies for the occasion and after a short speech introduced District Scout Executive Noel Crenshaw of Seymour to explain Cub Scouting to those present.

Crenshaw said Scouting was organized 50 years ago, and to impress on the audience as to how many boys were involved in Scouting today he said that in the United States that one out of every three boys between the ages of 8, 9, and 10 were a Cub Scout. Also, that one out of every four were Scouts between the ages of 11 to 14, and that one out of eight were an Explorer Scout—the three phases of Scouting.

Crenshaw said Scouting helped to make better boys and later better men.

Crenshaw said that first we had to have a group of men and women who would take a little time to make the program a success.

Fitzgerald said the Legion Hall would be available for the meetings.

Knox City's American Legion is the sponsor of the Cub Scouts. Crenshaw said there were 62 boys in Knox City who could qualify as a Cub Scout. There are 25 boys eight years of age; 23 nine years of age, and 14 10 years of age, he said.

Fifteen boys signed up for Scouting Tuesday.

Knox City's Cub Scouts will be Pack No. 161, Crenshaw said. Besides the 15 boys attending the meeting Tuesday night, 24 adults were also in attendance.

A Scoutmaster is still needed for the Cubs. Members of the American Legion are asking the cooperation of the town in securing a Scoutmaster.

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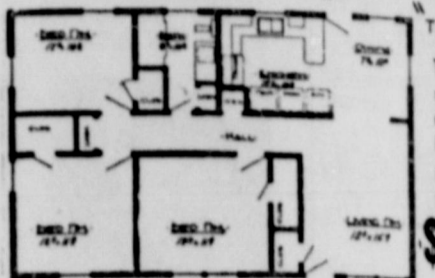

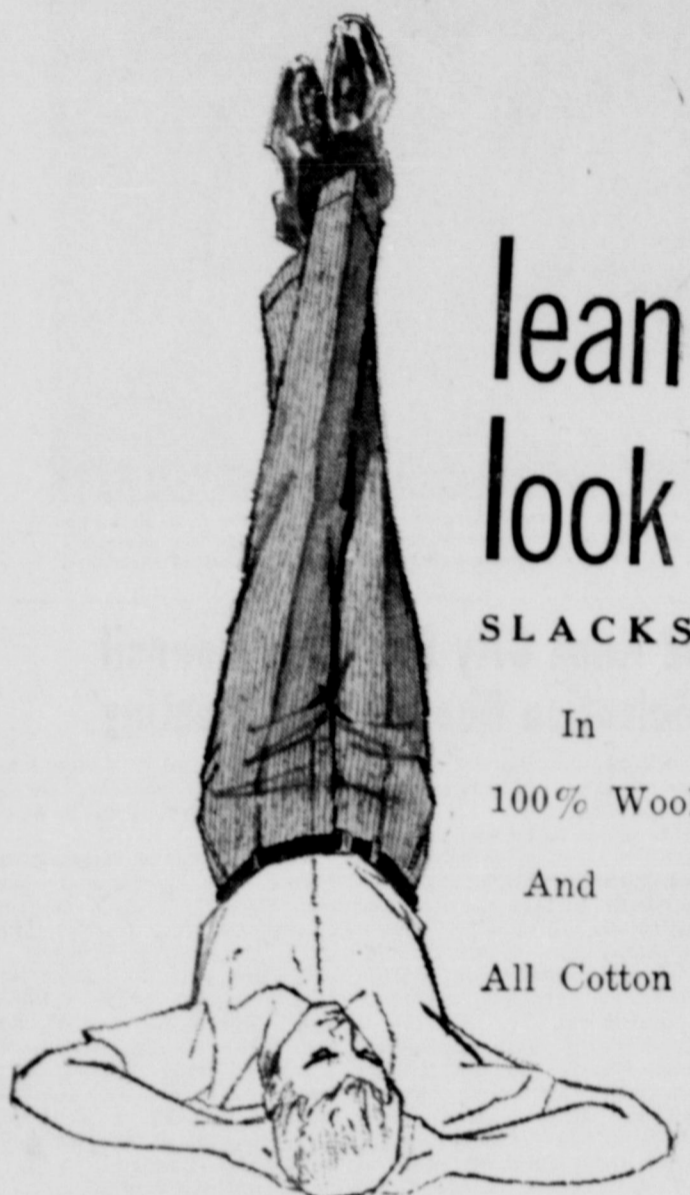

"To keep your sanity in a troubled world—try reading."

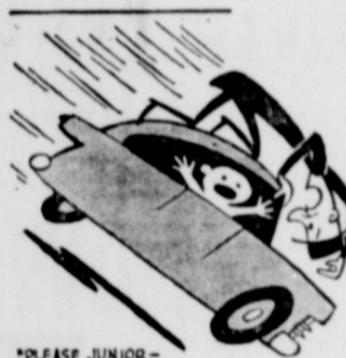

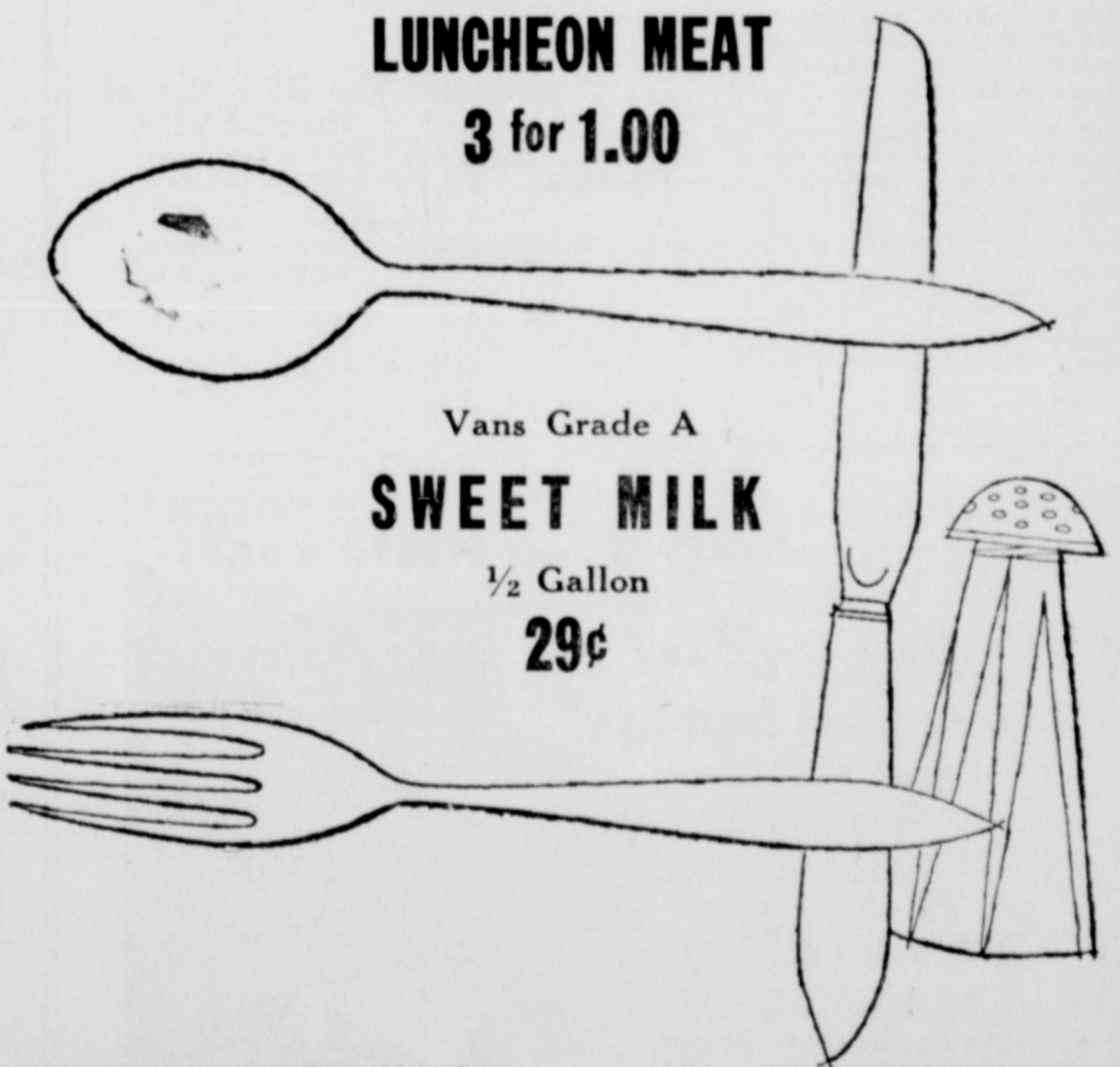
