Majority Of Area Farmers Agree On Uniform Spray Date -- Continue Check

At the meeting of area farmers Friday night at the American Legion Hall, 95 out of 97 farmers had agreed to participate in a uniform spraying program, according to the survey team.

June 20th had previously been set for the first spraying date, but survey teams that have been checking the area cotton for the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers Association have not found overwintered weevils feeding on the young plants up to this date.

Besides the survey team, Emory Boring, area entomologist with the Extension Service in Vernon, and entomologists with Kerr-McGee will assist in a week-by-week check to determine when the weevils are beginning to move into the cotton. Spraying date will be set before there are large amounts of third-grown squares in the cotton fields.

In a late report to the area farmers concerning the uniform date for spraying, Sammy B. White informed the Herald that Emory Boring, area entomologist from Vernon, was in Knox City Tuesday checking various fields of cotton and found very, very light infestation.

He felt that there was no need yet for spraying. He was accompanied by County Agent Joe Doby and a representative of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Boring said that a close check would be kept, and that an indefinite postponement of the date had been made, probably for another two weeks. However, all farmers are urged to watch the Herald and the display in Jones Drug Store for the uniform date.

STRENGTHENING RURAL AREAS TO BE REVIEWED JUNE 20-23

Progress made in helping more than two million rural people strengthen their farms and communities will be reviewed at a conference in Denver on June 20-23 and will be attended by L. J. Cappelman, Texas director for the federal rural credit agency.

Scheduled to address the meeting is Howard Bertsch, national head of the Farmers Home Administration. Agency representatives from 15 states will attend.

Agency services to be evaluated include recently inaugurated insured credit programs for rural housing, and rural community waste disposal systems, also newly authorized grant aid for development of rural water and sewer systems. Approximately ten rural housing loans have been completed in Knox County under this program since the local office opened.

The City of Benjamin has submitted application for a sewerage system loan and grant. O'Brien's sewerage system, now under construction, was financed through this program.

Also to be reviewed are recently expanded credit services that help low-income rural families develop income-producing trades and services, enable family farmers to improve, purchase and develop farm land and buildings.

Total credit aid to be advanced this year to family farmers and rural communities in Texas is estimated at \$106 million, according to the state director.

Mr. Cappelman also reports that six new county offices were opened in Texas during fiscal 1966, the Knox County office in Knox City being one of these. This makes a total of 137 full time county offices serving the 254 counties in the state.

Recommendations for adding more field offices in 1967 are under consideration, as well as plans for adjusting the agency's administrative functions to provide better service from the standpoint of personnel, office space and convenience to rural people in their dealings with the agency.

The Farmers Home Administration through 1600 county offices located throughout rural America provides credit assistance accompanied by management assistance. Funds advanced by the agency are used by rural families to finance family farms, develop rural community facilities, and reduce rural poverty.

As of December 31, 1965, the agency reported losses of less than one per cent on \$7.2 billion in loans advanced through current programs.

These programs have been very active, as well as beneficial, in Knox County.

Information pertaining to any of these loans may be had by inquiring at the local FHA office, now located in their new office on the Munday highway, stated Mr. Joe T. Boone, County Supervisor.

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HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

AUSTIN — State Board of Insurance is distributed over the "growing tendency" of some insurance companies to cancel out or refuse to renew auto coverage on certain classes of drivers.

At its mid-week (June 15) rate hearing, Board debated whether it should ask for new legislation or put into effect new administrative regulations to deal with the situation.

Board Chairman Wm. Hunter McLean said more and more drivers are being forced into higher-cost "assigned risk plan" coverage because of "unwillingness of companies to voluntarily issue insurance to young drivers, older drivers and drivers with poor driving records."

Another insurance rate boost is anticipated due to increasing accidents, injuries and traffic deaths, and higher repair and hospital costs. Rates were boosted 13.4 per cent in 1965.

McLean placed these among items for consideration at the mid-week meeting:

- Revival of a 'penalty system' based on number of accidents and serious traffic violations in figuring rates. A version of the system was abandoned four years ago after a brief trial and strong public opposition.

- Alteration of the assigned risk plan to force all companies to take a proportionate share of 'sub-standard' risk coverage.

- Action to curb mass cancellation due to class, age, territory or agency and individual cancellations of policies of those who have no record of accidents or moving traffic violations.

- Request for more uniform traffic regulations and enforcement procedures from county to county.

- Modifications in methods of classifying drivers.

Board wants to find a way to 'avoid further 'drying up' of the insurance market," emphasized McLean.

Companies writing auto insurance in Texas lost \$13,000,000 last year on the coverage. McLean calculated earned premiums at \$417,200,000, net premiums at \$388 million losses at \$233,200,000, loss settlement, adjustment and litigation expenses at \$42,600,000 and company 'expenses' at \$125,000,000.

The termed "an all-out, effective traffic accident prevention program" the state's "single greatest need."

McLean said he would urge the insurance industry to take the lead in "bringing safety to our streets and highways."

NEW TAXES — A sitate tax rate boost next year is inevitable according to House Speaker Ben Barnes.

He predicted the 60th Legislature will definitely face tax legislation.

Barnes declared that increasing cost of education alone will "require additional monies raised by taxes." Forty-eight per cent of every dollar paid to the state goes to education, he noted.

In a brief preview of his own ideas for legislative action, Barnes said he will ask an increase in juvenile parole officers to help curb teenage crime. He noted a study committee is exploring possible need of legislation dealing with obscene and pornographic publications.

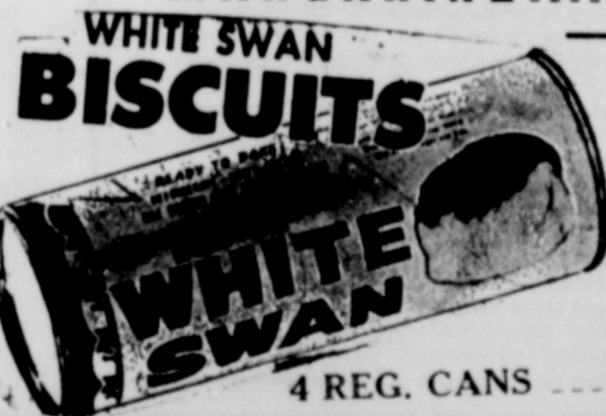

LOCAL PEOPLE AS A SOURCE OF INDUSTRIAL PROSPECTS — usually provide a sound reason or give the community a competitive advantage in attracting the industry.

— **BUSINESSMEN** — should ask the company representatives they buy from if the company needs additional manufacturing facilities to serve this market area, also, service stations, restaurants and motel people can ask their customers.

— **CITIZENS** — who know someone that works for an industry should inquire if that industry might be interested in locating a plant.

— **EXISTING INDUSTRY** — may need a companion industry to supply them with raw materials or services. Expansion of existing industry is sound economic development.

— **LOCAL IDEAS** — can provide leads for the local people to establish an industry of their own or attract a certain type industry.

— **EX-CITIZENS** — should be contacted, advising them and asking their help to obtain leads on any industry that could logically locate in the town.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ACTIVITY — should utilize such programs as direct mail, asking local citizens to call on industries when they are on a trip — watching all news media for possible leads or indications that a company might expand.

COOPERATION WITH OTHER AGENCIES — such as utilities, banks, railroads, regional and state development organizations can provide leads for new industry. Keep all of these organizations fully advised of the local programs, advantages, activities and community interest for attracting new industry for improved economy in your community.

ANY and ALL industrial leads should be handled through and by the local group that has been delegated this responsibility, usually the Chamber of Commerce.

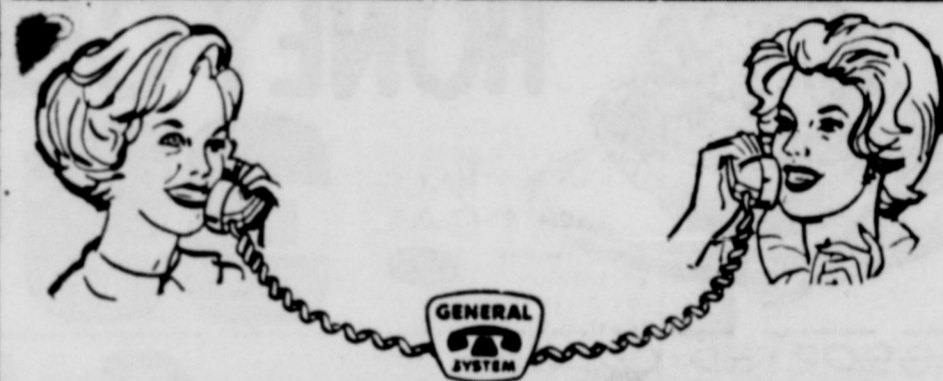
