## ROUND UPS

When ten thousand inhabitants and visitors of a county can enjoy gatherings as they did the Golden Jubilee Celebration in Benjamin last week. It seems that it is time that someone with leadership and initiative should begin an old settler's association that would bring the old timers and their friends together on special occasions several times each year. Let's revive the spirit of '86 and discard conventionalisms that the twentieth century has brought at least twice each year.

Knox County was created in 1856 from Fannin county which previously extended as far west as the east Dickens county line, as far north as the Canadian river, with the Red river as the northern order, and with the present county of Hunt as the eastern limit. Knox county was not named for Benjamin Knox, as some of us were taught, but it got its name from General Henry Knox.

"The Wrangler" was reading the official publication of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, "West Texas Today", very religiously the other day and saw the opening sentence of a dandy news article standing out among all others. It read: "Some of these West Texas columnists are absurdly young." This columnist wishes to impress to the capable editor of West Texas Today that all outstanding newspaper men were once young and probably absurd. The late Chas. A. Jones of Spur published a Colorado (Texas) weekly when he was only 19; Arthur Brisbane began writing a column before he was twenty, and Charles A. Dana edited the New York Sun at a very early age. Gene Howe, editor of the Amarillo News-Globe retired from active editorship after twenty-five years and said that he was making room for a young man with new ideas about editing proving that modern day journalism and its absurdity has a place in this pell-mell age that was handed American youth by its predecessors.

Have you ever wondered where the saying "some one has stole my thunder" originated? It seems that John Dennis who was an English dramatist and critic of the eighteenth century had been refused a contract with an English theater company after he had staged a play and invented a means of producing thunder. Dennis accented a rival production in which his system of producing thunder was used. He astonished the large crowd present by rising to his feet and yelling: "Curse them! They refuse to run my play but they steal my thunder."

Colonel E. H. R. Green, son of Hetty Green, famous woman financier, died Monday in his New York home. Green was an outstanding figure in the development of the Texas Midland Railroad and in the introduction of the automobile into Texas. Always he kept close to the plain and simple things of life, never hesitating to work with his employees in the advancement of the various enterprises.

N. C. Hanks, blind and armless lecturer who has made several public appearances in West Texas towns recently dropped one thought that women may not realize but that is generally conceded by all men. He said, "Women set the quality of the nation", perhaps that is what Lincoln meant when he paid a tribute to his mother and that's what the little boy meant when he threatened to "black another boy's eye because he would not call his mother a lady. The accused sullenly said "well, she is a WASH lady, then."

## Knox County Will Be Represented at Centennial

### GROUND TO BE BROKEN JUNE 17 FOR NEW SCHOOL BUILDING

At last the hopes and ambitions of Knox City folks for a new school building are about to be realized. Work order was issued as stated last week and the ground will be broken for work on Wednesday, June 17th. Contractor from Seymour has been in Knox City this week completing the arrangements for beginning the work. It is possible that the office and oil room will be erected before the 17th.

Although there will be no ceremony at the "ground breaking" the day will be momentous for Knox City. Mothers will whisper a prayer for success in the construction and fathers will walk about the town and school ground like proud turkey gobblers, as if to say "I told you we would get it after a while".

### KNOX COUNTY PIONEER BURIED MONDAY

Mr. J. B. Fortenberry, 66 died here at his home Sunday June 7th. Funeral service was conducted from the First Methodist church Monday afternoon and burial was made in the Odd Fellow Cemetery. Reverend J. C. Mann of Cross Plains conducted the service, being assisted by Reverend B. J. Osborn.

Mr. Fortenberry was stricken ill the 12th day of January and since that date has been up and down. He was confined to his bed only one week before his death.

The deceased was born in Arkansas March 26 1870. At the age of one year he was brought with his family to Texas settling in Parker county. In 1893 he moved to Knox County and has been a resident of the county since.

In 1897 Mr. Fortenberry married Miss Minnie Brock to which union two children were born, Hayden and Willie. While still a boy the deceased was converted and joined the Methodist church, having his membership, at the time of his death, in the Knox City church. He was a Methodist for over 50 years.

Lived in County 43 Years  
Mr. Fortenberry was a resident of Knox County for 43 years. He was one of the pioneers who rode the range and stayed with the county through good and lean years. He hauled the sand and gravel that was used in the erection of the first bank in Knox City and assisted in hauling the lumber from Seymour that built the first school house. In his passing Knox City loses one of its remaining frontier men.

The deceased is survived by his wife and two children, Hayden of Stamford and Mrs. Willie Weaver of Seymour; also by three brothers and four sisters, seven grand children, host of nieces and nephews. The brothers are Lee Fortenberry of Lake Arthur New Mexico, Baxter of Snyder, Texas and Frank of Munday. The sisters are Mrs. Ada Jarvis of Sunset, Mrs. Ida Hill of Waco, Mrs. Josie Adams of Knox City and Mrs. Eula Kelly of California. Frank Fortenberry, Mrs. Jarvis and Mrs. Adams were the only ones among the brothers and sisters who were able to attend the funeral service. Among friends who were in attendance were Uncle Troy House of Benjamin and Mr. and Mrs. N. J. Ivy, Mrs. Cleve Phillips, Mrs. Ed Dodson, Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Simpson, Mrs. Claude Day, Mr. and Mrs. O. R. Jones all of Stamford and Miss Monnette Dodson of Aspermont.

### MASSED CHORUS OF 50,000

Boys and Girls Selected From 1,558,000 Texas Children

By car, school bus, and airplane, Texas school children will arrive in Dallas, Texas Centennial Headquarters, on Saturday, June 13th, for the purpose of singing in the Massed Chorus of 50,000 boys and girls. Tickets have been sent to the various County Superintendents and may be obtained at his office. An ample supply of tickets have been obtained for the school children of Knox County. These tickets are for school children who plan to go to Dallas and sing in the Massed Chorus and may be obtained by calling at the County Superintendent's office and asking for them.

For the benefit of parents that might feel a little uneasy about the safety of their children, every precaution is being taken to provide the utmost in safety for the children. The state highway patrol has pledged its utmost cooperation in seeing that all traffic problems are properly handled, and traffic patrolmen will be on duty on each of the cardinal highways entering Dallas in order to assure the safety of the children.

The Police Department of the City of Dallas will likewise assign groups of patrolmen for special police duty on this day.

A number of companies of the regular army are permanently located on the Texas Centennial grounds. This group of men together with the special Centennial police will act as guards and guides for the children.

First-aid stations with public health nurses in charge will be available to attend to any emergency that might develop.

Each bus must have two directors on board to direct the children. The driver may act as one director. The program is tentatively set to be held at 10 a. m. On arrival in Dallas the busses will be promptly parked in the designated parking space, and the children will immediately go to the stadium; the seating arrangement of the stadium will be so numbered as to correspond with the first series of numbers on the identification tag. The program should be completed at approximately 12 o'clock noon. The afternoon will be used to enjoy the Texas Centennial Exposition, and definite information will be given the children by their directors as to the time of departing for home.

In Knox County, children going on busses will go and return the same day. Parent-Teacher organizations, Chamber of Commerce, and all other organizations are urged to contribute to paying the expense of the busses which will be used to transport the children. There is not public allotment of any funds from any source for the purpose of financing the trip. It is left to the local organizations and patrons. It is suggested that patrons contribute to the expense of the trip. It should not cost over fifty cents a child and I would give them an opportunity to participate in something worthwhile and at the same time to see the Centennial Exposition.

### RULES GIVEN FOR GETTING MORE MILES PER GALLON

Ten simple rules for turning 100 per cent of the gasoline used in a motor car into comfortable and economical transportation have been worked out by L. K. Marshall general service manager of the Pontiac Motor Company.

"Science and engineering have made it possible for modern automobiles to use twice as much of the energy contained in gasoline as did the cars of 30 years ago," says Marshall.

"It is up to the motorist to do the few things that will enable him to take full advantage of these developments of science and engineering." Expressed in simple terms they are:

1. Accelerate gently. Tramping on the accelerator pumps more gas into the cylinders than can be used. Keep the foot steady.
2. Holding the car in second gear until it gets up to high speed may easily double the gas used in getting under way.
3. Always try to coast to a gradual stop. It costs money in gasoline to rush up to a stop light and then jam on the brakes.
4. Keep tires properly inflated. Under-inflated tires mean extra work for the engine, which means more gas consumed.
5. Letting the engine idle for long periods while parked or waiting for a train to pass hastens the return for gasoline.
6. Faulty spark plugs may waste as much as 10 per cent of the gasoline. It's a good idea to have them tested occasionally.
7. Keep the car properly lubricated at all times. It's important to take care of crankcase lubrication properly too.
8. For constant engine temperature, keep the radiator filled to the proper level. An overheated engine engine uses more gas.
9. See that the pointer of the season control on the intake manifold heater of a Pontiac is in the direction indicated for the season.
10. And finally, gas can be saved by having your motor tuned up at least every 5,000 miles of driving.

**Cowboy Reunion News**

STAMFORD, June 11—Although there will be many worthwhile attractions on the program of the seventh annual TEXAS Cowboy Reunion to be held in Stamford July 2, 3 and 4, the chief entertainment feature of the Reunion will be the rodeo, featuring the cowhands from the ranches.  
 Word has been received from numerous contestants and visitors of former years that they will be on hand this year when the gates swing open on July 2. In addition many Centennial visitors to Texas are expected to visit Stamford during the Reunion to witness a rodeo that has been classified as "an authentic survival of a typically Western institution." Former years have seen crowds of 50,000 and 65,000 visitors here during the three days. This year conservative estimates place the attendance at an even greater figure.  
 Seven rodeo events are on the card for this year's show. Three rodeo performances will be held each day during the Reunion morning, afternoon

and night. Cash prizes in the rodeo events total \$1400. Prize saddles, boots, spurs, hats and other premiums will swell the total prize list to approximately \$2500.  
 Cash prizes will be given in bronc busting, calf-roping, steer riding and wild-cow-milking each day. A special Junior steer-riding contest will be staged at night performances on July 2 and 4, and the winners will receive cash prizes. Cowboys over 55 years of age will compete for honors on July 2 and 3 in a special calf-roping contest, the winner to receive a hand-made saddle.  
 In addition to these attractions, a cutting horse contest will be held on the morning of July 3. This contest has always been popular with the spectators, because more depends upon the skill of the horse than the ability of the rider. It is particularly popular with the cowboys who like to boast of the skill and intelligence of their horses. Each contestant must cut five head of cattle, designated by colored ribbons, out of a herd. The horse and rider doing the job with the greatest skill and speed wins the contest and prize, a fine hand-stamped saddle.  
 A change has been made in the rules of the cutting horse contest in that there will be no elimination contest as in former years. The entire contest will be held on the morning of July 3, the horses being given their final rating by the judges at that time. Certain changes will be made in the manner of conducting the contest, in order to give the rider a better chance to show his horse.

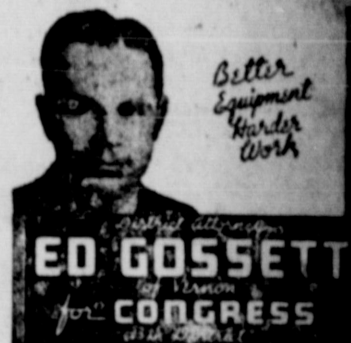
