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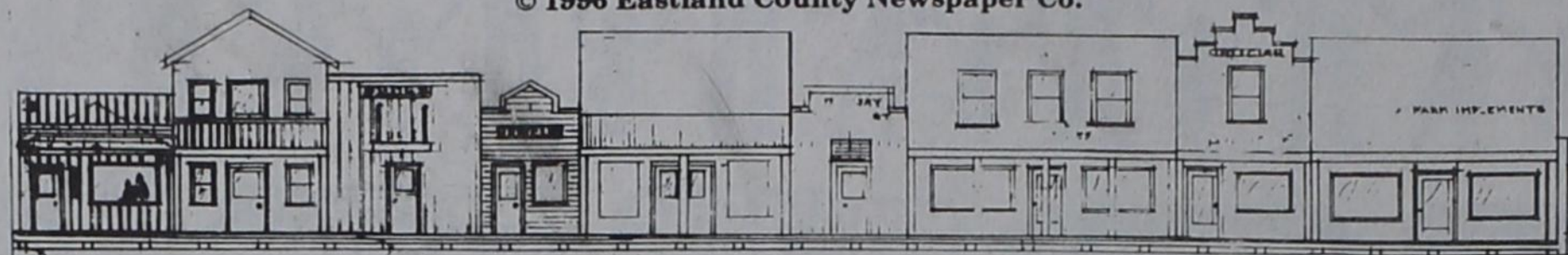

Our Game Warden Drilling Down



Statewide, the Texas Railroad Commission issued a total of 1,049 original drilling permits in April 1996, compared to 895 in April, 1995. The April total included 769 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 45 to re-enter existing well bores, and 235 for re-completions.

Sofar in 1996 there have been 4,005 drilling permits issued, compared to 3,651 recorded during the same period in 1995.

Total well completions for 1996 year-to-date is 2,789, a one percent increase from the 2,752 recorded during the same period in 1995.

The major part of this exploration is taking place in the Midland area (177 permits in April) and the San Angelo area (155 permits). West Central Texas had 87 permits in April.

Callahan County dispatch alerted the fire department and Sheriff's Deputies at 5 p.m. of a grass fire in the area of I-20 and F.M. 2228, five miles east of Baird. Responders found that

salvage crews had accidental gotten cutting torch sparks in some compressed cardboard spilled from a wrecker boxcar during last week's derailment. The cardboard then caught some plastic pellets from another damaged car on fire. Baird fireman, David Franke, said it took two trucks, five men, and about 2,000 gallons of water to extinguish the blaze. The trucks returned to the station at 7:30 p.m.

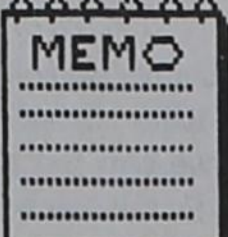
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News For Veterans

Abilene Out-Patient Clinic...Your County Veterans Service Officer attended a meeting at the Dyess Gate V.F.W. Post on June 20. The meeting was called by personnel from the Big Spring and the VA Medical Center in Temple, TX.

A major problem was discussed concerning access to the hospital as it will be necessary to use the main gate at Dyess AFB for entry. We are awaiting word from Big Spring as to how this matter will be handled.

The good news is that our area will no longer have to use the VA Hospital in Albuquerque for specialty care. Area Veterans may now be referred by Big Spring to the Temple VA Medical Center. This is good news, especially for Callahan County Veterans, as the trip to Temple is some 170 miles vs 500 to Albuquerque.

SMOKING/CANCER-----Many of our

Veterans follow Taylor County CSO Dan Garcia's column in the Abilene Paper. The June 23 article carries word about Service-Connection for cancer presumed to be caused by tobacco use in the service. This office has filed several claims quoting VA General Counsel Precinct Op. 2-93 and a decision on all of them has been deferred. We continue to follow these cases in an effort to secure a favorable ruling.

WIDOW'S PENSION----Surviving spouses of deceased Veterans are reminded that VA pays Widow's Pension amounting to \$460 per month. All income counts against the pension, including Social Security and this drops many widows from eligibility. VA does give credit for medical expenses that are paid out-of-pocket and this will often entitle the person to receive some payment from VA. Expenses include

your Medicare Insurance payment, supplemental medical insurance, prescriptions, dental, hearing, optical and doctor bills. Mileage for medical purposes is also allowed. As an example, Cross Plains to Abilene and back is 86 miles at 20 cents per mile or \$17.60 as an allowable expense.

AGENT ORANGE -- President Clinton has decided to extend federal disability benefits to Vietnam Veterans suffering from two diseases linked to Agent Orange. The president announced that Veterans afflicted with prostate cancer or a neurological disorder called peripheral neuropathy will be entitled to the medical benefits. He also said he plans to propose legislation to extend federal assistance to Veteran's children suffering from spina bifida, a birth defect.

Webb Bros. have just finished threshing on the Ravenna Ranch seven miles east of Baird, and report a good yield of wheat and oats. The wheat threshed out twenty one bushels to the acre and is extra fine. 2000 bushels of oats were threshed, averaging 57 bushels to the acre. The boys say they do not pretend to be farmers, but there is no telling what they could do if they would only turn themselves loose.

The benefit for the Baird brass band, last Friday night, by the band, assisted by the Baird Thespian Dramatic Club was a decided success. The Opera House was crowded with an appreciative audience, who were loud in their repeated outbursts of applause. Both the band boys and the dramatic club showed a marked degree of improvement, considering the very limited amount of practice these amateurs have had, they all did remarkably well. We have not time nor space to particularize the different performers, but we cannot refrain from saying that Harry Cook, especially, added fresh laurels to his name as an embryonic Irish comedian. Gramm News

Waco-The announcement that U.S. Senator Phil Gramm (R-Texas) will fill the Senate Agriculture Committee seat vacated by former U.S. Senator Bob Dole is great news for Texas farmers and ranchers, according to the president of the state's largest general farm organization.

"We are facing some of the worst agriculture problems related to drought that this state has faced in a long time--maybe the worst problems ever," Texas Farm Bureau President Bob Stallman said. "And it's going to be very important to have an advocate for Texas agriculture in Washington, D.C., and appropriately placed on the Senate Ag Committee to help us out."

Gramm said his first and most critical mission on the

Agriculture Committee will be to make certain drought-stricken "Texas agricultural producers have every bit of assistance that the U.S. Department of Agriculture is capable of providing." He said the current drought represents the largest threat to the state's agriculture industry since he's served in the Senate.

"I believe this new committed assignment will help me to help farmers and ranchers in Texas," Gramm said.

Stallman noted that Texas' excellent representation on the House Agriculture Committee will only enhance by Gramm's appointment on the Senate side.

"Obviously it takes bills passing both the Senate and House in Washington to get things done," he said. "And now we will have a strong advocate on the Senate Agriculture Committee."

QUEEN VICTORIA'S SECRETS, by Adrienne Munich (Columbia Univ. Press: \$27.95). It's difficult to picture the stern-visaged "Widow of Windsor" as having any secrets. Yet Prof. Munich of State University of New York explores how Victoria maintained her position and created a regal yet maternal image despite the perception of her as reclusive and ineffectual. The seeds of her talent and the saga of Scarlett, Rhett and Ashley are evident... MARYLIN MONROE, edited by Giovan Battista Brambilla, Gianni Mercurio and Stefano Petricca (Rizzoli: \$60.00). We don't know what Marilyn would look like today at 70, but here in over 400 photos (many unpublished) the legend lives. The transformation of Norma Jeane Mortensen into the luminous Marilyn Monroe still dazzles and intrigues.

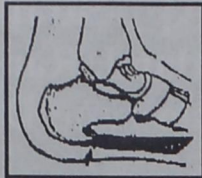

Snyder Facility To House One Of Seven District Offices Of Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Program

The last of seven district offices in the 19-county Rolling Plains Central Boll Weevil Eradication Zone has been established in Snyder. The former Howard Gray dealership building, 705 25th Street, will serve as a district office, housing storage and office space for approximately 50 full-time and temporary employees and serving as the staging area for boll weevil eradication operations on approximately 100,000 acres of cotton, said Frank Myers, executive director of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation, Inc. "The outstanding cooperation of the community and the local development corporations makes it possible to save growers money by spending funds on eradication of the boll weevil instead of administrative costs," Myers said. For the program to run efficiently, district offices are located in closest proximity to the majority of cotton acreage in an area, he said. Also, whenever possible, the program hires personnel and purchases supplies locally. "Historically, boll weevil eradication offers a 12-to-1 return on an investment," Myers said. "For every dollar spent on eradication, \$12 are returned to the local economy." Ricky Watzl is the supervisor in this district that encompasses all or portions of Scurry, Borden, Mitchell and Fisher counties. The zone headquarters, responsible for the management of operations in the zone, is located in Stamford.

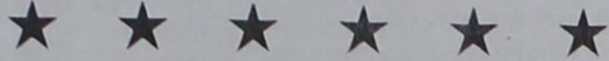

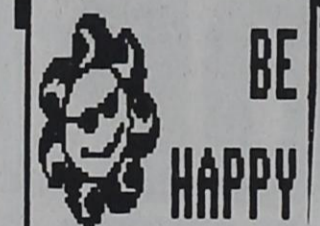

WORLD'S MOST PREVALENT DISEASE

What is the world's most prevalent disease? If your answer is the common cold - you're wrong! Tooth decay is the most universal disease in the world. Only a minute fraction of the world's people are free of it. Only 2 percent of the American population has been spared. Earliest cavities show up right after primary teeth erupt. The average 13-year-old already has at least five cavities in permanent teeth. Girls seem to get more cavities than boys; but then, girls get their teeth sooner.

A cavity is a hole in a tooth caused by decay which is produced by the combination of plaque and acid. It doesn't take a few days for trouble to develop. Tooth decay can start in less

than 15 minutes after eating. All that is needed are three ingredients: a tooth, bacteria (in dental plaque) and sugar. When the bacteria and sugar meet, acid is formed. When the acid and tooth meet, the acid starts etching a hole in the tooth.

Today's diets, high in refined sugars and carbohydrates, are conducive to decay. But careful and PROMPT oral hygiene procedures after eating will reduce, if not eliminate the decaying-producing activity of the modern diet.
