Mrs. Smith died at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, October 22, in the Brazos Valley Care Home here after an extended illness.

Born in Wise County April 24, 1883, she came to Knox County as an infant with her late parents, James R. and Mary Craig, pioneer settlers of Knox County, She was a retired Knox County nurse and served 14 years on the Knox County Hospital Board. She was active in all county and civil affairs and a charter member and past president of the Knox County Historical Society.

She married Herbert A. Smith July 4, 1918, A retired Humble employee, he died in 1965,

Mrs. Smith was Truscott correspondent for the Knox County Herald for several years before her eyesight began to fail,

Survivors include one son, William Ralph (Billy) Smith of Fort Worth; two sisters, Mrs. Allie C. Moorhouse of Benjamin and Mrs. Van W. Browning of Stephenville; and several nieces and nephews.

(Editor's Note: We usually do not publish tributes of this sort, but because the deceased was such a part of Knox County history and because she was so interested and concerned in preserving it, we felt that this certainly should be an ex-

A truly pioneer of Knox County passed away last week. She was the former Myrtle Craig. daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs, James Riley Craig who moved to Knox County before the county was organized. She was an infant of two months and coming to this part of West Texas at that time was a pioneering adventure. There were few settlers at the time. no roads, no water - only a spring to furnish water for several families - no towns closer than Seymour, and no means of transportation except by wagon and team, It took some courage to begin a new life in these surroundings, but the Craig family did have the courage and the determination to make a success of their ven-

Myrtle attended school in Benjamin, which had become the county site of the newly decided to become a nurse, and because of her ability to care for the sick, she nursed

Woman Dies October 22 studied in Fort Worth and in Chicago, and kept up with the newer methods of taking care

> She was married to Herbert A. Smith on July 4, 1918. He was an employee of Humble Oil Co. They made their home in Truscott and she nursed both Knox and Foard Counties for years. She did private duty nursing for the late Dr. T. S. Edwards on numerous occasions.

She served as a member of the Knox County Hospital Board for a long time. She was appointed the first chairman of the Knox County Historical Committee by former Knox County Judge L. A. Parker and served as long as her health permitted. She was greatly interested in the preservation of Knox County history and was a faithful member of the First Christian Church in Truscott.

Lone Star Asks Rate Increase

Lone Star Gas today asked the City of Knox City to increase local residential and commercial natural gas rates to enable the company to earn a reasonable rate of return on the fair value of properties used in rendering public service.

The application for rate increase, the first major request since 1953 based on an income deficiency in the Knox City distribution system, listed increased wages and salaries, higher interest rates on borrowed money and increased taxes as primary reasons for the deficiency,
