Knox City Wins Golden Gloves Bouts

Knox City Golden Gloves hopefuls won six out of ten bouts before a capacity crowd in the school gym Monday night. The bouts, first held locally this season, were in preparation for the up-coming regional Golden Gloves tournament and featured boxers from Knox City, Seymour, Munday, Abilene and Benjamin.

The main event of the evening was a match between Billy Joe Hollingsworth, Rochester football star fighting with the Knox City team, and James Adams, open division middleweight champion in the Abilene region. Hollingsworth has been high school middleweight champion in the Wichita Falls region the past three years. The fight was a crowd pleaser, with Hollingsworth the victor in a unanimous decision. All three judges gave Hollingsworth the first and third rounds, Adams the second.

Another top fight was a draw between Knox City's James Busby and Bobby Clark of Sweetwater.

Scholastic Census Is Underway Here

The scholastic census for the Knox City School District is now in progress, and Chas. E. Silk, superintendent, has asked for the cooperation of all parents in completing the census as accurately as possible.

Each child in school was given a census blank Tuesday or Wednesday to carry home. Supt. Silk asked parents to see that each child is listed who will be six years of age, and under 18, on Sept. 1, 1955.

The blanks are to be filled out and returned to the school by Friday, if possible.

Parents who have no children in school now, but who will have next year, will be the most difficult to reach, the superintendent said. All parents who will have a beginner were asked to come by the superintendent's office and register the child's name.

"Each eligible boy or girl enumerated in the census means \$68 in state aid to our school. Based on the 1953-54 census, state aid amounted to \$36,424.00 to the Knox City schools," Supt. Silk said in stressing the importance of listing every child of school age.

Besides the money from the state, the information is valuable because it furnishes school officials a basis for planning next year's program, he said.

Munday Fails To Win Reversal In School Case

The decision of the 50th Judicial District Court in the Munday-Knox City school controversy was upheld by the 11th Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland this week, school officials have been informed.

The district court, with Judge Alton B. Chapman of Floydada presiding, rendered a decision in favor of Knox City on April 9, 1954, and the Munday School District appealed to the higher court.

The Munday district was contesting the action of the County Trustees in annexing about 12,220 acres of the Munday district to the Knox City district. The board acted on two petitions, one for 6,567 acres, the other for 5,653 acres, and the Munday attorneys contended this violated the statute against an annexation of more than 10 percent of a district.

In the appeals court decision, written by Associate Justice Milburn S. Long, it was stated in part:

"... It is undisputed that the two orders entered by the County Board of Trustees, when taken together, detached from the Munday School District more than ten percent of its area. However, the first order had been completed and the debt assumption election had been held prior to the filing of the second petition. There is evidence to show that it would be to the best interest of the children and the citizens residing in the territory so detached for it to be placed in the Knox City District. . . . It is undisputed that most of these people live nearer Knox City than Munday. The County Board did not abuse its discretion in granting either of the petitions. We have failed to find any basis upon which the trial court could have held the orders invalid. . . . The judgment is affirmed."

About 130 4-H and FFA projects will be exhibited in the annual Knox County Junior Livestock Show in Goree Saturday, County Agent W. J. Bryan said this week.

Animals are to be in place at 10:00 a. m., and judging will start at 1:30. According to Bryan, the projects shown will include 100 head of lambs, 18 beef steers and 12 fat barrows.

J. D. Jones of Texas Tech, Lubbock, will judge steers, and Clint Shirley of Ft. Worth will judge sheep.

The Goree Fire Department is sponsoring the show this year and will furnish exhibitors with a barbecue lunch, in addition to handling other arrangements.

Showmanship prizes will include a show halter for the best steer showman, and hand-made belts for the best lamb and barrow showmen. These prizes are furnished by the Knox County Farm Bureau.

Bryan said the show will be one of the largest ever held in the county. He urged everyone to attend the show and encourage youth in the development of better livestock.

The Knox City boys' and girls' basketball teams each lost a game and won a game in district play this week.

Friday night the boys eked out a 59-52 win over Vera, and Tuesday night they lost to Megargel, 54-35.

The girls' team also defeated Vera, 45-35, but lost to Megargel, 39-48.

Tomorrow (Friday) night both boys' and girls' teams will meet the Goree teams here in district contests. The games will begin at 7:00. Next Tuesday night, Jan. 25, the local teams will play Woodson on the Knox City courts. These will be practice games.

Also scheduled for next week in the local gym are Junior High games next Thursday night with Old Glory, and conference games with Benjamin Friday night.

GARDEN CLUB MEMBERS HEAR NURSERYMAN DISCUSS ROSES

Mr. Carter of North Park Nursery, Abilene, told members of the Knox City Garden Club how to plant and grow roses, at the regular meeting of the club, Wednesday, Jan. 12, in the attractive country home of Mrs. Earl Watson.

Mr. Carter said the soil in this area is good for rose growing except that it is very alkaline. The condition can be corrected with the proper preparation of rose beds. He suggested the use of organic fertilizer and peat moss.

"Rose bushes should be pruned the first week in February, and a light pruning again in September," he advised. For this area, and particularly for the growing of roses, he recommended the use of organic fertilizer instead of commercial fertilizer, and suggested that everyone have a compost bed. For beautiful fall blooms, he told club members to feed the roses in September.

The Peace rose bush he used in pruning demonstrations was presented to Mrs. Tom R. Campbell.

Mrs. Ansel Waldrip presided at the meeting in the absence of the president, Mrs. B. B. Campbell. She gave a talk and demonstration on "Dried Arrangements", using materials found in this vicinity. A beautiful formation of driftwood was found by Mrs. Lee Smith on the Smith Ranch west of town and presented to the club.

Dried arrangements by Mrs. Smith, Mrs. Horace Finley, and Mrs. Campbell were displayed.

The next meeting of the club will be February 9 at the home of Mrs. S. M. Clonts. Co-hostesses will be Mrs. T. S. Edwards and Miss Beulah Sanders.

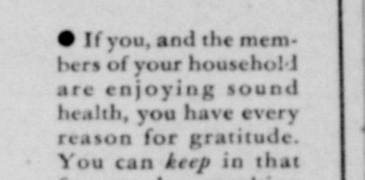

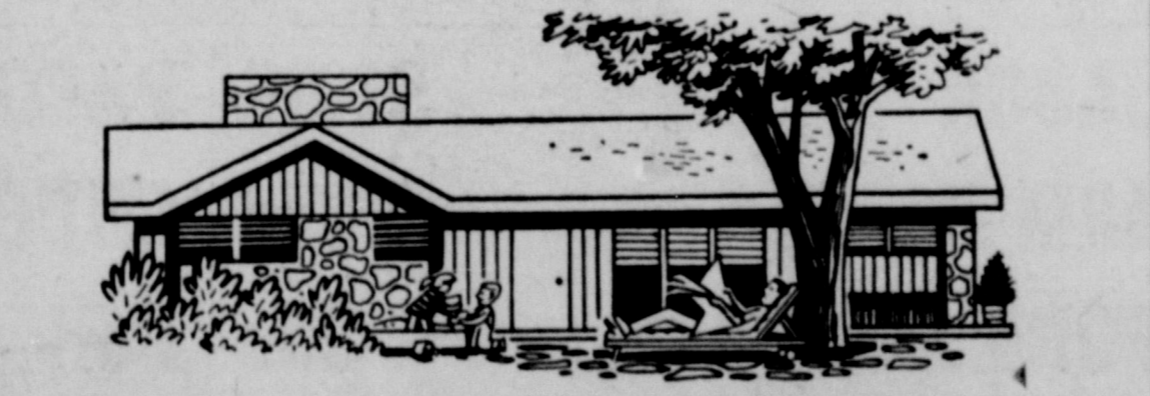
