Kehoe stated, the direct distance dialing equipment has been installed and is being tested for accuracy.

Kehoe said private line customers in Knox City will not be required to give their number to the operator when they dial long distance calls. These customers, said Kehoe, should dial 1 + (the area code if different from their own) and the number being called. The equipment will record the calling number, the called

The council took no action on rate increase request and will study the proposal further

General Telephone Compa ny's last rate increase in Knox City was in April, 1972, and service has improved since that time with the addition of the new equipment and the new building

Another item on the agenda of major importance was the position the City is in in dealing with garbage and rubbish disposal. Officials report that city-owned property has been filled almost entirely to capacity. Any new land acquired must be approved by the Water Quality Board, the Texas Air Control Board, and the Texas State Health Department. Mayor Angle has been in touch with state representatives in regard to the problems the small towns are having meeting the strict requirements. Angle said that he understood the rules must be complied with, but that some of the specifications put the smaller towns in a real financial strain in obtaining the additional land and necessary equipment. Plans must be sub mitted, also engineering and geological characteristics of soil is required, as well as a list of equipment to be provided at the site. 

The Texas Highway Department offered an opportuquality and competitive in nity for a public hearing to be requested by publication on April 11 and April 18, 1974, of a notice reporting the proposed improvement of State Highway 283, extending from the Foard County line, South 8.8 miles, in Knox County.

No requests for a public hearing were received; therefore, the District Office of the Texas Highway Department. at Childress, Texas, has submitted all of the engineering data and information received in connection with the development of this project for approval of the proposed route and design by the Administration of the Texas Highway Department.

The proposed project consists of widening, reconditioning, and resurfacing the existing 22-foot pavement to provide two 13-foot travel lanes, with 9-foot paved shoulders.

Route of the proposed roject is along the present location of State Highway 283, with only a minor exception in the area of the Truscott Cemetery. Additional right of way will be obtained as required to provide a minimum of 150 feet throughout the project. There will be no displacees or relocations on this project.
