## General Telephone Co. Requests Rate Increase

Roland R. McCullough, revenue requirements administrator, and Artie Ben Steele, service supervisor, of the General Telephone Company of the Southwest, met with the City Council Monday night to present a rate increase request.

Council members present were Mayor Buddy Angle, councilmen Carl Shelton, Celso Gonzales, A.P. Denton, and Dr. Ted Alexander Jr., and city secretary Faye Railsback. Councilman L.V. Worley was out of town and unable to attend.

Telephone representatives told the council that the present rate of return is 2.12 per cent, and the proposed rate of return is 7.94 per cent. They explained that the company has made every effort to hold costs down by taking advantage of technological improvements and operating efficiencies. However, the

increasing costs of such items as metals and plastics and manufacturing labor eventually affect their costs for specialized equipment. The men said that the company had to go to the open market for many of their supplies and materials as other businesses and pay a competitive scale of wages to their own craftsmen. The continuing upward movement of costs has finally out-paced the operating economies in practice, and it is now necessary to adjust rates charged for services, they said. This will make it possible for the company to maintain an adequate level of earnings and to protect its ability to acquire new capital upon reasonable terms so that customer needs can be met.

Proposed monthly increases include: Business Individual Line Service, \$20.35, Extension, \$1.75. (There will no longer be business party

lines.); Residence Individual Line Service \$9.70, Two-Party, \$8.75, and Extension, \$1.25; Semipublic Individual Line Service - Business, \$20.35; Key Lines \$25.40; and PBX-PABX Trunks, \$35.60.

The council took no action on rate increase request and will study the proposal further.

General Telephone Company's last rate increase in Knox City was in April, 1972, and service has improved since that time with the addition of the new equipment and the new building.

Another item on the agenda of major importance was the position the City is in dealing with garbage and rubbish disposal. Officials report that city-owned property has been filled almost entirely to capacity. Any new land acquired must be approved by the Water Quality Board, the Texas Air Control Board, and the Texas State Health Department. Mayor Angle has been in touch with state representatives in regard to the problems the small towns are having meeting the strict requirements.

Angle said that he understood the rules must be complied with, but that some of the specifications put the smaller towns in a real financial strain in obtaining the additional land and necessary equipment. Plans must be submitted, also engineering and geological characteristics of soil is required, as well as a list of equipment to be provided at the site. The list of requirements is endless and the expense will be tremendous. The county has agreed to assist by lending and operating its equipment provided plans can be worked out for two or three sites within the county for all city and rural residents.

When the city stopped burning trash in 1971, the requirements of the Air Control Board were met. Also the city complied with the other state requirements with the purchase of the covered transport and water tight vehicle for refuse collection. That same year, a landfill operation began on the J.C. Eaton place west of town, and the process has proved most satisfactory except that the landfill is limited strictly to city garbage trucks. The problem now is to find another place suitable for dumping of other refuse by residents.

Fire Chief Drew Holcomb also met with the council to discuss the need for relocating fire plugs that are no longer useful in their present locations, fire plugs that are leaking badly or are inoperable. Holcomb explained that there are also some locations

## Direct Dialing Begins In Knox City May 22

Telephone equipment that provides direct distance dialing for General Telephone customers in Knox City is nearing completion, according to G.F. Kehoe, District Manager, and direct distance dialing will begin May 22.

Kehoe stated, the direct distance dialing equipment has been installed and is being tested for accuracy.

Kehoe said private line customers in Knox City will not be required to give their number to the operator when they dial long distance calls. These customers, said Kehoe, should dial 1 + (the area code if different from their own) and the number being called. The equipment will record the calling number, the called

number, the length of the call, and store this information for billing.

Party line customers in Knox City will also have the 1+ station to station direct distance dialing capability, says Kehoe, but an operator will request the calling number before the call is released.

When the operator requests your number on a 1+ call, this does not make in an "operator handled" call which is more costly than a station to station call, according to Kehoe.

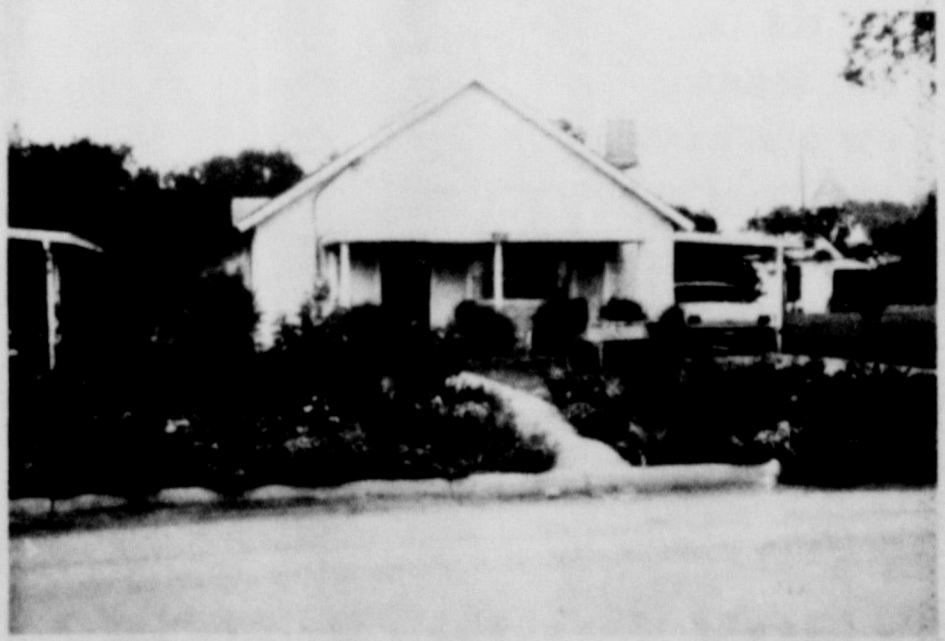
Burial was in the Knox City Cemetery under the direction of Smith Funeral Home.

**LEGAL NOTICE NOTICE OF HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENT**

The Texas Highway Department offered an opportunity for a public hearing to be requested by publication on April 11 and April 18, 1974, of a notice reporting the proposed improvement of State Highway 283, extending from the Foard County line, South 8.8 miles, in Knox County.

No requests for a public hearing were received; therefore, the District Office of the Texas Highway Department, at Childress, Texas, has submitted all of the engineering data and information received in connection with the development of this project for approval of the proposed route and design by the Administration of the Texas Highway Department.

The proposed project consists of widening, reconditioning, and resurfacing the existing 22-foot pavement to provide two 13-foot travel lanes, with 9-foot paved shoulders.

Route of the proposed project is along the present location of State Highway 283, with only a minor exception in the area of the Truscott Cemetery. Additional right of way will be obtained as required to provide a minimum of 150 feet throughout the project. There will be no displaces or relocations on this project.
