Dear Friend:
The 64th Session of the Legislature has come to a close and it is with regret that we appropriated practically all of the balance that the state had when we convened. The salary increase for school teachers that we appropriated amounted to 650 million dollars. The Bill was written to such an extent that it limits the amount of local school assignments that can be made and in checking all of the school districts in my 15 Counties, it is my understanding that the local school taxes will not be increased from this Bill. However, there were laws on the books that already brought about a small increase in the school taxes.
During the course of the debate on school financing, there were a number of school superintendents from my District in Austin and they were very helpful in this matter. Mr. Bill Baker, Superintendent of Schools of Knox City had served several years ago on the "Committee of Eighteen" and I consider him to be an expert in this field. He was a great help not only to me but to the Speaker in the final drafting of the school legislation. We hope to have a large meeting in July of School Board Members, School Superintendents, and the County Courts and other interested people to try to acquaint everyone with the serious problems that confront us two years from now in school financing.
The Legislature submitted a complete new Constitution and according to the Fiscal Note issued by the Comptroller Bob Bullock, if adopted, could cost the State a billion dollars more per year in revenue. I am opposed to the entire new Constitution and

U.S. Mint To Issue Bicentennial Coins

The hand flips a coin. Heads I win. Tails you win.

The eyes light on the head of a colonial drummer. Did you win or lose the toss? You won.

That head is really a tail. You can take the word of Mary Brooks, Director of the U.S. Mint. She's our nation's coinmaker and says the colonial drummer was chosen in a national design competition to appear on the back of the new Bicentennial quarter. George Washington, she insists, still heads the coin over a new date—1776-1976—and it was all done to celebrate our country's 200th birthday.

"I know big decisions, like whether or not to walk the dog in the rain, rest on the flip of a coin," Mrs. Brooks says, "and I want to warn the nation's big decision makers about the coming big change in their small change."

In all, the Mint is changing the designs on the backs of three coins in honor of the Bicentennial. Along with Washington on the quarter, those famous faces of Kennedy and Eisenhower, with the new twin date, still head the half dollar and dollar. Again, it's the backs that carry the new Bicentennial designs. Independence Hall won its place on the back of the half dollar. And the moon and Liberty Bell was chosen for the dollar reverse.

Beginning July 7, the Federal Reserve System starts distribution to financial institutions throughout the country of the first of the three Bicentennial coins—the half dollar—with the quarter and dollar scheduled for release before the end of the year.

Citizens State Bank reports that they have not received the coins as yet, but they expect to have them in the

very near future. "To me, these coins—like all our coins—are symbols of our nation's 200 years of freedom," Mrs. Brooks says. "They are small links with our historical and cultural heritage that will touch the hands of every man, woman and child in America."

Family Land Program To Recognize Farmers

AUSTIN--County Judge Sam E. Clonts is working with the Texas Department of Agriculture in registering area farmers and ranchers who qualify for honors in the Family Land Heritage Program for 1975.

The program gives recognition to those who kept land in the family for 100 years or more, maintaining continuous agricultural operations, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White explained.

Last year over 560 families qualified for certificates and inclusion in the Family Land Heritage Registry, which contains brief histories of all the farms and ranches, the names of current owners, and pictures of early settlers.

"The Texas Department of Agriculture has received many requests for the Registry--from universities, historians, and government agencies. It provides an interesting record of agriculture in the early days of Texas, as well as anecdotes about members of the families."

"We also included nota-

tions on the 100-year-old structures on the property, no matter what condition. This information can be invaluable to researchers," White stated.

"For this reason, we are trying to register all those who qualify--not only to give these people some recognition, but also to have a permanent record of pioneer agricultural producers in Texas."

Application forms are available from the county judge's office. Once completed, the forms must be certified by the county judge or his designate. They are then mailed to the Texas Department of Agriculture with any pictures of early settlers which can be copied and returned. Deadline is August 15, 1975.

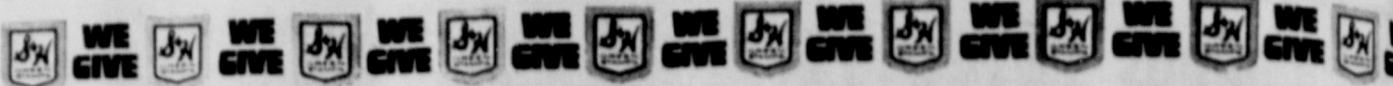

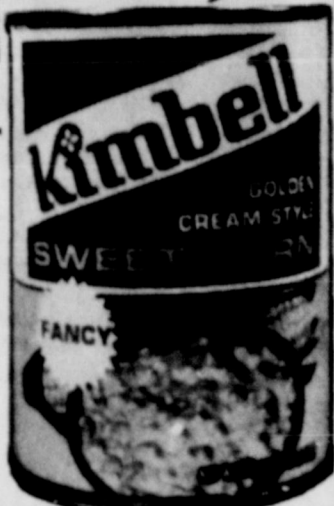
