Chad began as a clerk in the U.S. Post Office on December 1, 1934, when his father, the late John A. Wilson, was Knox City postmaster. He was appointed substitute rural carrier in February 1935 when Route 1 was being carried by the late W.W. Hyde. Upon Mr. Hyde's retirement, Chad became regular carrier on July 1, 1941. Except for duty as a naval clerk in 1944-45 during World War II, he has served continuously for the Knox City Post Office. The rural routes in Knox

City were consolidated March 21, 1959. Chad then became the only carrier with a combined route of 92 miles. Chad explained that his present route is 89 miles.

### **Dead Ducks** Are Puzzle

WICHITA FALS--An estimated 1,000 to 1,100 waterfowl have been found dead during the second week of December at Proctor Lake in Comanche

Parks & Wildlife Departnent wildlife biologist Larry Holland at Brownwood, reports he and game warden Billy Works were called to the scene when the ducks were found by Corp of Engineers personnel while making a routine inspection of the 4,600 acre lake.

Holland said he and Works began stacking and burning ducks for fear of a possible disease spread. Several ducks were immediately carried to the pathology department at Texas A&M University for analysis. Later reports revealed disease was not a likely cause.

A mold that occurs on peanuts under certain weather conditions, called Aflatoxin, was a prime suspect; however, a thorough investigation was also being conducted in other areas, according to Holland.

Aflatoxin was first discovered in 1951 and very little is known about it except that it s extremely toxic and could affect waterfowl, livestock, and even humans, Holland

Proctor Lake, located nine miles northeast of Comanche. was formed by the damming of the Leon River by the Army Corp of Engineers in 1963 and is in the heart of the peanut growing industry. This makes it a tremendous attraction to waterfowl and mallard hunting there is reported to be the best in the state.

HOLIDAY NUTTY NITTY GRITTY

Thanksgiving has come and gone and we are startled into planning and preparing for Christmas. We've successfully avoided the tempting displays of candies nuts-until now.

But the Christmas spirit is beginning to catch up with us. and our thoughts turn to shopping, decorating and baking for the holidays ahead.

Baking for the various festivities almost always includes candies, cakes, cookies and puddings chocked full of nuts. The grocery store shelves are full of package upon package of nuts. We have more kinds, forms and sizes of nuts from which to choose in December than during any other month of the year.

You may be wondering whether to buy nuts in the shell or to buy the nut meats. Around the holiday season, time seems to grow more important each day. So time, energy and money all play an important part in the decision about how to buy nuts.

The following table will help you make cost compari-

labor. Of course, if the nuts are going to garnish cookies or cakes, then you probably want the halves.

There are several things to look for to make sure you are buying the highest quality nut available. Nuts in the shell should be clean and free from cracks, holes or scars. Also the shell should be well-filled so the kernels do not rattle.

Freshness of shelled nuts can be judged by looking at the appearance of the kernel. Plump, meaty kernels mean full flavor and richness. Fresh kernels of fine quality will snap when broken. They will have a crisp, fresh taste. If the kernel is rubbery this indicates staleness, high moisture content and probably rancidity.

It is easy to store nuts, but here are some suggestions to help keep them fresh.

Nuts in the shell keep better than the shelled. If nuts are to be kept over a long period of time, it might be wise to buy and store them in the shell and crack as needed.

Nuts contain a high per centage of fat which will become rancid when stored at room temperature or in the light. The nuts should be kept in the refrigerator between 32 and 40 degrees F. It's best to store the nuts in the main section of the refrigerator rather than in the moist air section where the vegetables are kept.

Since air also hastens the onset of spoilage it is best to avoid opening vacuumpacked containers long before the nuts are to be used. It's also good to remember that salted nuts do not store as well as unsalted ones, since salt encourages the onset of

Nuts add a delicious touch to main dishes, salads, desserts and relishes. Christmas cookies depend on nuts for their special goodness. Nuts are also wonderful snacks. A full nut bowl adds a warm touch to a living room or a family room. Nuts can also be used in many creative ways on wreaths and with greens.
