Free Gasoline At Keck Bros. Station

Levelland County Seat Ford Endurance Report

The "Non Stop Motor Run" in a Model "A" station Wagon, through the state of Texas, visiting each and every County Seat has been successful without a motor failure; with no motor repairs whatso ever.

Under the greatest road hazards possible, through muddy roads, rocky hills and river beds rain hail and windstorms, this was accomplished in 732 hours and 53 minutes; or thirty days and 12 hours and 53 minutes on the motor, with a total mileage of 12,664.5 miles on the speedometer.

Our motor idled approximately four hours each twenty-four hour day, at the rate of 20 miles per hour. This for one day would be 80 miles for the trip 2400 miles.

Gas and oil consumption for the entire trip was 651 gallons of gasoline and 13 3-4 gallons of oil. Practically no water used at all. We made an average on gas, less idling time of 23 miles miles per gallon, and with idling time 20.5 miles, which is far the average under good road conditions.

We made only 11 oil changes, using 13 3-4 gallons, giving us an average of 1,151.3 miles by speedometer, and with idling time in, 1,369.5 miles, without a drop being added between drainings.

Our average miles per hour was from start to finish, by speedometer readings, 17.5 mph, with idling time out, 20.5 miles per hour, which is considered under the road conditions, very very good.

We have a signature from each of the 253 County Seats to certify for our visit there, and at the end of run were checked by employee number 616 at the Ford Motor Company Dallas, Texas, who checked motor and switch as O. K.

Our Station Wagon Body stood up wonderfully and shows no ill effects of the hard usage.

Our braking system is in perfect condition with only two adjustments made for the entire trip.

We made the entire trip without the use of mud chains due to the easy control of the car.

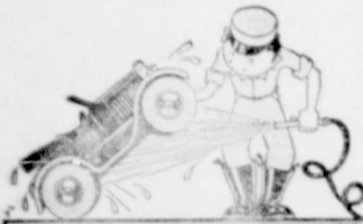

Railroad Information

The cog railway to the top of Pike's peak, over 14,000 feet high, is probably the highest railroad line in the United States. Corona, Colo., on the so-called "Moffat road," is 11,000 feet. The longest tunnel in this country is the Cascade tunnel, 7 miles 1,320 yards long. The Moffat tunnel is 6 miles 170 yards long and is 9,200 feet above sea level; it was begun in September, 1923, and completed in February, 1928.
