Five years ago when the Spanish monarchy was overthrown and King Alfonso XIII went into a self-imposed exile in France, a republic was formed which took drastic actions to quash the feudal institutions and the monastic teachings of the old Jesuit Order. One of the first articles of the new constitution aimed at strict regulations of the clergy and the confiscation of church property. Today the new republic is in a turmoil of revolts led by rebels of Spanish Morocco and the Canary Islands. They hope to successfully overthrow the party in control and set up a system to their liking. Of all the countries of western Europe, Spain has been the slowest to recover from medievalism. Although there has been a compulsory education law since 1857, there are large numbers of illiterate people in the republic. In 1920, forty five percent of the inhabitants of Spain were classed as illiterates. Sanguine rebels and an uneducated race of people seem incapable of sharing in a system of self-government.

Father Coughlin, the Michigan radio priest, undoubtedly overstepped the rights of manhood when he overtly grouped President Roosevelt in the category of "liar", "betrayor", "double-crosser". He will obviously lose the confidence of his own followers in his church, radio audience, and party for even the strongest opponents of the New Deal know Roosevelt for his honesty, frankness, and sincerity. He went into office telling the American people that he would frankly admit mistakes as they came.

Since Al Capone, the racketeer who evaded the income tax, has been in the Atlanta and Alcatraz prisons he has worked in the tailor shops, laundry, and the shoe shop departments. He should be fitted to earn an honest and non-evading living when he becomes free several years from now, but will he?

Application of a parent or guardian of a child to transfer it from one school district to another must be made by August 1st. High School pupils whose grade is not taught in the home district must be transferred. Forms for making application may be obtained in the office of the county superintendent, Benjamin.

Sunset School will open August 10 for its first session of six weeks. At the end of the first six weeks, school will be dismissed for a period of about a month.

NOTICE: SCHOOL TRANSFER

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation recently sent checks covering the deposits of school districts in Knox County up to five thousand dollars. One fund and two school districts had over five thousand dollars on deposit when the county depository was closed. Permanent School Fund, Benjamin Common School District number 1, and Sunset Consolidated Common School District number 27. The over-plus of these three accounts were protected by bond and has been collected. \$31,173.68 was paid by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, representing the deposits of sixteen school districts and the Knox County Permanent School Fund.

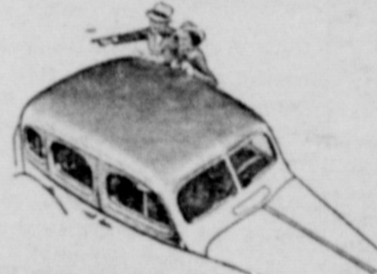




