## Work Progressing On Plans for New River Bridge

Herbert Cunningham of Munday, resident engineer for the State Highway Department, reported Wednesday that a Core Drill Machine was expected to arrive from Austin about noon today to take bridge soundings for the proposed new bridge across the Brazos River west of Knox City.

The machine will determine whether a piling or a pier type structure will be most practical. Mr. Cunningham expressed surprise that the machine is being sent so soon after approval of the project by the highway department.

According to the engineer, the bridge will probably be a concrete girder span, and the length of the bridge and its approaches will probably be between one and a half and two miles. The survey for the location has already been made.

Total cost of the project is estimated at about \$240,000, with \$140,000 financed from funds already allotted to the county, and the remainder of the cost to be paid from funds to be allocated the county farm to market road fund in 1952.

Mr. Cunningham also reported that another highway job in Knox County is expected to be let in January—that of widening the pavement west of Benjamin to the King County line.

The 11 1/2 miles of highway would be widened from 18 feet to 40 feet.

## Local Teachers Required to Take Non-Subversive Oath

According to Harold Barnett, superintendent, all teachers in the local schools will be required to sign the "Non-Subversive Oath" before receiving their next salary check.

Supt. Barnett does not anticipate that any local teacher will refuse to sign. The oath, approved by the 52nd Legislature, is in addition to the Constitutional oath already required of teachers. It must be signed by anyone receiving compensation from the Foundation School Program, the State Available School Fund or the Public Junior Colleges appropriation.

Supt. Barnett received a list of more than 200 organizations classified as totalitarian, fascist, communist or subversive, or as approving acts of force or violence to deny others their rights under the constitution, or as seeking to alter the form of government by unconstitutional means.

The State Attorney General recently ruled that the oath cannot be retroactive.

Included in the list of organizations, Mr. Barnett said, are such innocent appearing titles as American Patriots, Inc., Citizens Protective League, Congress of American Women, Abraham Lincoln School, American Youth for Democracy, and Protestant War Veterans of the United States.



**LIONS CLUB SPEAKER URGES INTEREST IN GOVERNMENT**

Social gains achieved in America in the past two decades will be meaningless unless they are grounded upon an economy that will endure to support them. Fred H. Husbands, executive vice president and general manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, said in address to the

Knox City Lions Club recently. Husbands expressed concern that failure of business men to take active interest in government is a danger perhaps even more real than threats from abroad. He cited parallels between causes of the decline and fall of the Roman Empire and trends evident today in America. These include widespread divorce and decay of the home, higher and higher taxation with reckless

spending of public funds, craving for excitement and deterioration of morals and weakening of religious life of the people. "If we are to preserve and strengthen our nation we must have more people who will assume the responsibilities of citizenship," Husbands declared. "Our lawmakers keep their ears to the ground," he said. "If and when they believe that their constituents really want graft and waste eliminated from government, and when they believe their people actually desire to forego government handouts, they will in most every case do what the people demand."
