Officers investigating the burglaries last week of the Texas Theatre and Knox City High School have made no arrests, City Marshal Lewis Floyd said this morning.

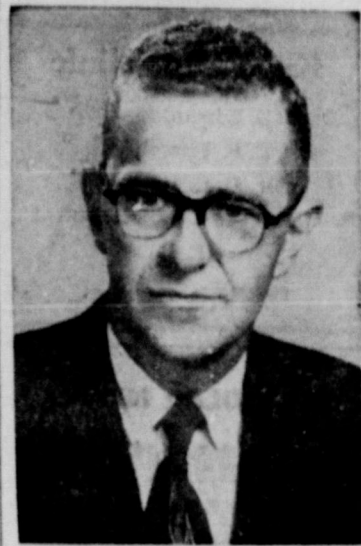

Wednesday night, thieves entered the Texas Theatre and broke into the office. About \$30 in bills and change was taken.

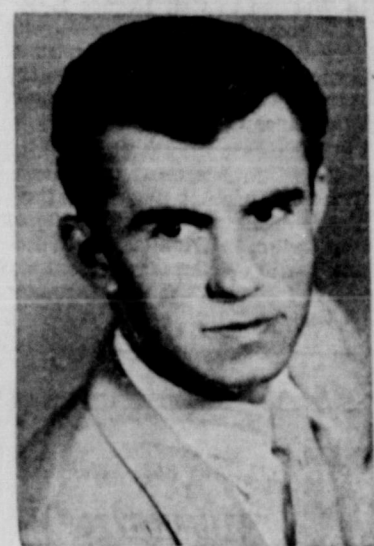
Both jobs, officers said, appeared to be the work of amateurs.

Rains Boost Prospects for Grain Crop

Rains varying from 1.90 in town to 2.40 in some rural areas have boosted farmers' hopes for a bumper small grain crop and given farm land the best early spring "season" it has had in several years.

Moisture totaling 0.19 inch was recorded by weatherman Horace Finley Thursday and Friday of last week, and a 1.71 inch soaker fell early Sunday. This makes a total of 3.72 moisture so far this year, compared to 0.45 in the same period last year.

Fruit trees and some early gardens may have been blasted by the cold front that followed the rain. On Monday, officially the first day of spring, snow fell most of the day and a low temperature of 23 degrees was recorded. Low Tuesday was 25 degrees.

Preliminaries will begin at 3:00 p. m. Tuesday, but the finals in all events except low hurdles are scheduled for that evening.

For the convenience of fans, the football bleachers have been placed by the finish line and the jumping pits.

Monday, April 4th Is Deadline for Bids On City Projects

Prospective contractors have until 7:30 p. m. Monday, April 4, to submit bids on Knox City's paving, drainage and sewer improvement projects.

In a story in the Herald last week it was erroneously stated that April 14 was the closing date. However the legal advertisement for bids, required by law, carried the correct date.

The improvement projects were approved by Knox Citizens in February, 1954, when a \$125,000 bond issue was voted. The projects have been delayed by engineering problems and the difficulty of securing right-of-way for the proposed drainage system.

Mayor Guy Glenn expects actual work to begin in 30 to 45 days after contracts are let.

Lions Complete Broom Sale Plans

Plans for the Knox City Lions Club Broom Sale, to be held Wednesday, April 6, were announced at the regular weekly meeting of the club Wednesday.

Claud Reed, committee chairman, said there will be twenty-one pickup trucks, each with a driver and two salesmen. The trucks will call at every house in Knox City, Benjamin and O'Brien with brooms, mops and other items made by blind workers in Texas Lighthouses for the Blind.

To advertise the sale, members of the club will wear small brooms beginning Monday, April 4, until the sale. Any member caught without a broom may be fined by other members.

About \$1,300 was realized from a similar sale last year, and club officials expressed the hope that sales would be even more this year. Half the proceeds go to the blind workmen, while the other half remains with the club to be used in civic and charitable projects.

Club officers urged housewives in the community to buy brooms, mops, dust cloths and other items when the trucks call. "Remember, you will be helping a worthy cause, and at the same time getting good quality merchandise at competitive prices," they said.

County Agent Finds Mite Infestation In Wheat Fields

In checking small grains over the county, County Agent W. J. Bryan has found a light infestation of brown mites in most fields, he said this week.

The mites are first indicated, Bryan said, by a silvery appearance of the leaves, and later the tips of the leaves turn brown. These brown spots start out small and spread. Usually they damage the wheat only during dry weather, as mites do not damage wheat much when it has enough moisture, unless the infestation is extremely heavy.

The research information to date indicates that control measures will not always increase the yield of grain. In case stands are threatened, however, chemical control of the pest may be profitable, the county agent said. It will require from 1/3 to 1/2 pound of actual Parathion per acre to adequately control the mites.

"Parathion is poisonous and should be handled with care," Bryan continued. "No livestock should graze on wheat sprayed with parathion for at least 21 days."

"With the moisture we received this week I don't think the mites will do enough damage to pay for control measures in most parts of the county."

Plans and specifications for paving and drainage improvements may be obtained upon deposit of \$25.00 and those for Sewage Treatment Improvements may be obtained on deposit of \$15.00. Deposits will be returned if the Contractor submits a bona fide bid and/or returns the plans and specifications before the bid opening date.

The Paving and Drainage Improvements include approximately 54,000 square yards of grading for paving, 54,000 square yards of triple asphaltic surface treatment on 8 inch two course gravel base, 24,500 feet of concrete curb and gutter including grading, 12,000 C. Y. of drainage excavation, and removing twenty five 5'x2' concrete culverts with a total length of 830 feet.

The Sewage Treatment Improvements, consisting of a small primary treating plant and an intercepting sewer, include approximately 150 C.Y. of concrete, 11,000 lbs. of steel, 1,100 C.Y. of excavation, 700 Ft. of 12 inch V.C. sewers, 450 Ft. of 10 inch V.C. INCOME TAX RETURNS LAG—DISTRICT OFFICIAL SAYS

Marvin M. Rudd, administrative officer in charge of the Wichita Falls office of the Internal Revenue Service, has released figures comparing the income tax filing for 1955 with 1954. In 1955 Internal Revenue has received 1,192,906 pieces of mail during the first 45 working days. During 1954 Internal Revenue received during the same period 1,324,574 pieces of mail. A very large part of the mail received is income tax returns. During January of 1955 more taxpayers filed than during January of 1954. The number of taxpayers filing dropped slightly during February but is dropping rapidly at the present time because of the change in filing deadline. Last year March 15 was the deadline, whereas April 15 is the deadline this year. Based on last year's mail receipts, more than a million pieces are yet to be received in a little over the month remaining.

"Those taxpayers who have not filed had better sharpen their pencils and start figuring," Mr. Rudd said, "because there is not much time left."

The Dallas Internal Revenue District deposited \$236,596,986.75 during January and February of 1955. Even though this is a respectable amount, it was \$3,338,194.32 less than the \$239,935,181.07 deposited during January and February of 1954. Internal Revenue expects the March 1955 deposits to drop below those of last year since many taxpayers will wait until April 15 to pay their tax.

129,962 North Texans have been refunded \$10,094,311.45, or an average of \$77.67 per refund check. Internal Revenue is mailing out refunds at the rate of 10,000 per day. They will be required to maintain the 10,000 per day rate to get out the more than 700,000 refund checks by the May 31 deadline. Internal Revenue has 300,000 refunds being processed at the present time. It requires six weeks to two months to process a refund. They have six weeks' work on hand at the present time. In spite of the 430,000 tax returns due a refund that has been filed to date, more than 300,000 Texans that the government owes money have not filed a return. Mr. Rudd urged taxpayers who have a refund due to file immediately, so that Internal Revenue can begin the necessary processing work.

Mr. Rudd requested that taxpayers do not write Internal Revenue

concerning a refund, as several refunds can be sent out while one letter is answered. The large volume of refunds to be processed prevents the service from giving a taxpayer individual attention concerning his refund regardless of circumstances. Many things can prevent the Internal Revenue Service from getting the taxpayer his refund check within six weeks after he files his return. Taxpayers who make errors in their tax returns will not receive their refunds until after correct returns have been processed.

Mr. Rudd concluded by urging that every taxpayer that has not yet filed, no matter whether he is due a refund or owes tax, sit down immediately, prepare his return and mail the return with a check for any tax owed today.

In this grave matter the Lord does not even rely on faith by itself. "Ye see then how that by works a man is justified, and not by faith only" (James 2:24).

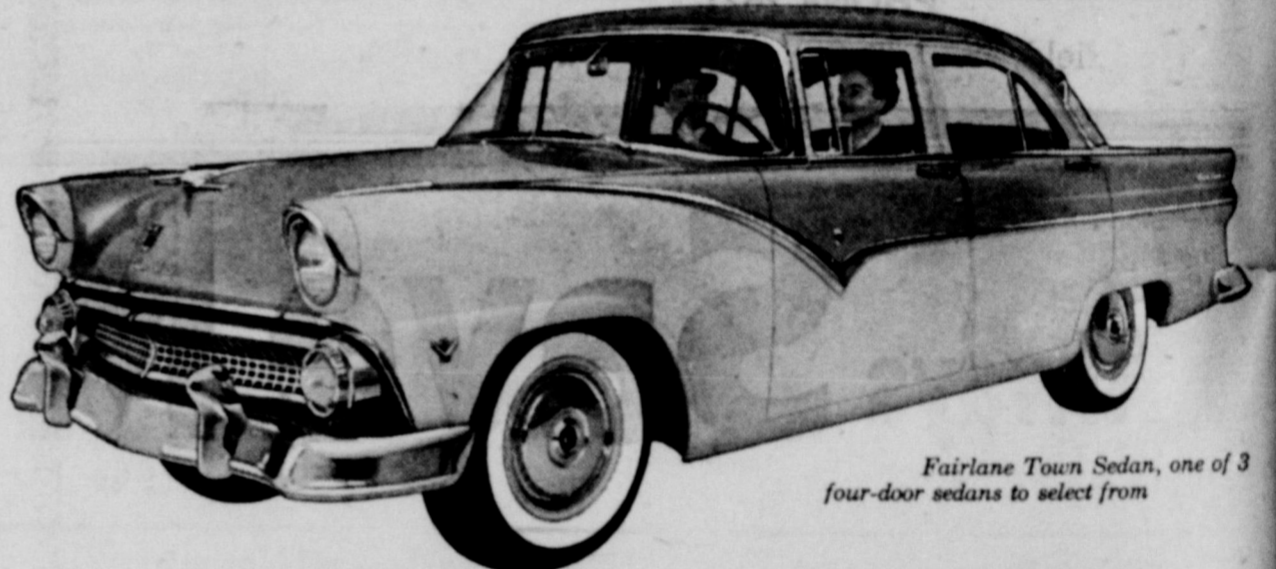
