



Today, Dexter still has some of the sand he brought from Puerto Rico and continues to bok for new colors and textures everywhere he goes.

At the present time he is using sands in shades of black, red, green, tan, gold and brown. He has not found a white sand that is suitable, nor a blue. He steadfastly refuese to tint his sand in any way, so he works without blue, and for his whites he uses crushed beads, the only artifical item in his designs.

The Process is a slow and tedious one. First, the drawing made on whatever base is chosen-wood that has been treated with a sealer, glass, canvasboard, etc. Then the outline is made by applying glue in small amounts with a tiny brush; black sand is applied while the glue is still damp and then shaken off leaving the outline covered with sand in the dry glue. Each color is applied separately in the same way and each is allowed to dry thoroughly before another phase is begun.

In addition, the texture of each grain of sand must be approximately the same size and color, and the humidity must be just right for the proper adhesion of glue and sand.

Although Dexter has had no instruction in art, he is able to come forth with a sand painted design in almost any theme.

Portraits in sand painting are Dexter's ultimate goal, but he feels that he needs quite a bit of study and experimentation before he is able to a complish this.

In the meantime his immediate goal is sell enough of his paintings to finance another trip to Puerto Rico where he can obtain the variety of sand colors that he will soon be needing—and also to continue an interting hobby that keeps his busy hands occupied while he watches TV and relaxes at home.



Trustee, jointly announced that as agreement had been reached regarding the acquisition of a flowage easement on Waggoner lands adjacent to Lake Kemp. Such additional acquisition has been necessary because of the reconstruction of the facilities at the Lake.

Spokemen for the group cited recent changes in the Corps of Engineer acquisition guidelines for Lake Kemp as a significant event which enabled the conveyance by the W. T. the consummation of the agreement without litigation. Under the contract with the Corps, the City and the Water District are responsible for all land and improvement acquisitions.

The original acquistion guideline by the Corps in 1966 provided for the removal of some 630 cabins which were all those lakeside cabins below elevation 1163 feet m. s. l. This requirement was changed in 1967 to 1159 feet m.s.l. which reduced the number of cabins required to be removed to approximately 450. In response to numerous appeals regarding the subject, the Corps has now changed the requirement to provide for cabin removal or relocation over an extended period of time. All lake cabins with a first floor elevation below 1150 feet m.s.l. may remain on location until January I, 1978. It is estimated that only 20 cabins come within this category and the owners will be compensated. All cabins with a first floor elevation below elevation 9 feet m.s.l. and above 1150 feet m. s. l. may remain on location until

Mr. Farmer, Can We **Afford Another Four Years?**

Referring to Republican farm policies which have caused the price of cotton to drop to price support levels, Travis County Commissioner David Samuelson, co-chairman of Rural Texans for McGovern, said that "Texas farmers have once again been victimized by collusion between the U.S. Department of Agriculture and big business. Thousands of Texas farmers will now suffer large financial setbacks because they were lured by the Administration into producing a hugh cotton surplus -- for which there is no market.'

Samuelson said, "Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz, the corporations' friend, launched an effort early this year in cooperation with the cotton trade interests to mislead farmers into planting more cotton than the market could

"The Nixon 'plant every acre' campaign was successful. Farmers produced a bumper crop of 13.4 million bales of cotton for a market of only about 11.5

"Prices have been driven so low," Samuelson said, "that some farmers have found it cheaper to plow under their cotton than to harvest it. Cotton prices in Amarillo and Lubbock have dropped from 28¢ a pount to 18¢ a pound, and in some areas cotton prices have dropped as low as 10¢ per pound.

"An added blow to the farmer," Samuelson continued, "is the fact that cotton price supports were set too low to protect the farmer from just such a disaster as the Nixon Administration has brought about. The loan rate was set by the U.S.D.A. last year at only 19.5¢ per pound for the best grade of cotton, when, under the law, it should have been set at a minimum of 20.7¢ per pound. That failure by the U.S.D.A. to increase the loan level cost American cotton farmers million of dollars.

"This is clearly another instance of Republican special interest favoritism," said Samuelson. "The U.S.D.A. simply sold out the farmer to insure huge profits for the cotton industry. That policy was disastrous to the farmer and of no benefit to the consumer.

"As is always the case," the commissioner pointed out, "lower prices for he farmer did not mean lower prices for the consumer, they just meant windfall profits for the industry.

"Why did the Administration help the cotton industry against the farmer?

"It's a question of who owns the Administration," Samuelson said. "Chummy relationships between the cotton industry and Nixon officials are wellknown. A good question is: How much did Nixon's friends in the textile industry contribute to the Republicans \$10 million secret donor slush fund? The answer, which the Nixon campaign refuses to divulge to the American people, might very well reveal why cotton farmers were deceived.

"This cotton scandal is just one more example of this Administration's polley of farming the farmer," said Samuelson. "Four more years of Richard Nixon will spell the end of the family farm system which has served this country so well,"




