## Abilene State School Chaplain Gives Program Speaks to KC Lions

Knox City Lions Club members heard a very interesting program Wednesday of last week at their noonday luncheon when Jerry May, Program chairman, presented Donald W. Cauble, Chaplain of the Abilene State School.

Mr. Cauble explained to the Lions that in 1899, the Texas Legislature authorized the establishment of an Epileptic Colony and in 1901, its location was designated as Abilene on 649 acres of land donated by the city. The name was changed in 1925 to Abilene State Hospital and again in 1957 to Abilene State School, a school for the care and training of the mentally retarded. Since 1962, the school has operated under the supervision of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

Abilene State School, one of 10 state residential institutions for the retarded, is basically responsible for serving 50 West Texas counties. L. W. Cain is superintendent and the staff consists of five medical doctors and two dentists.

Chaplain Cauble said that this institution is not for the mentally ill. He continued that although there is no cure for retardation, much progress is being made through new programs. A number of residents are living in half-way houses, working in the cities of Dallas, Austin, Fort Worth, Houston, and San Antonio. Others are employed by Thurman Johnson and work on his ranch in Goldthwaite. Many of these persons become self-supporting, tax-paying citizens. With some supervision, he said, they are discharged from the Abilene State School.

Mr. Cauble reported that one thing which impresses most visitors on their campus is that the residents appear very happy. There are many activities for them, such as the Chapel Choir which presents religious

### Work After 65 Can Now Mean Higher SS Checks

Continuing work after age 65 can now mean higher monthly social security retirement checks according to Henry Chastiz, manager of the Vernon social security office. Recent changes in the social security law provide an increase of 1/2th of one percent for any month between ages 65-72 in which a person does not get a retirement check because of his work and is otherwise eligible for payment.  
The increase amounts to one percent a year; so if a worker continues to be employed until he is 72 old he will have received a seven percent increase.  
Chastiz pointed out that this increase is in addition to any raise due because of the amount of the yearly earnings.  
In order to receive the annual increases, a worker must be entitled to retirement benefits for the first time at age 65 or later, be fully insured under social security, and working for wages or self-employment. His income must prevent him from receiving a social security check for the month.  
The increase will be determined after the end of each year beginning after the close of this year.

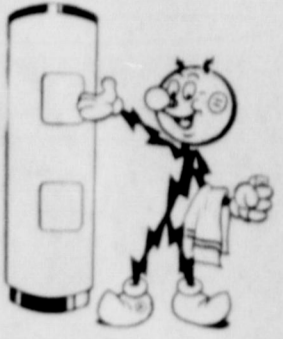

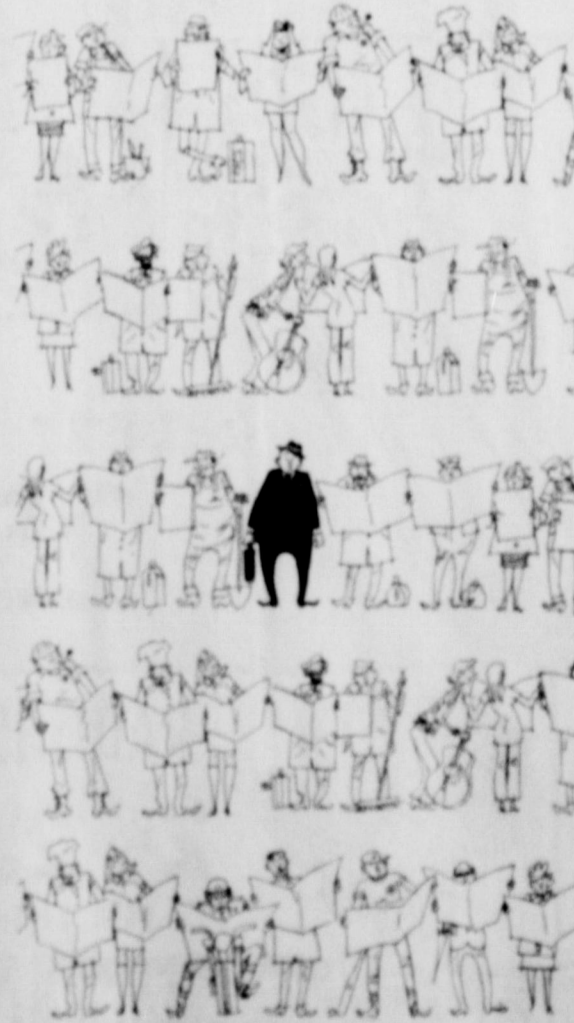

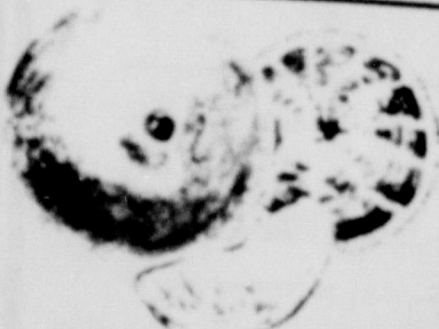

## United Methodist Women To Observe Call To Prayer And Self-Denial Jan. 29

United Methodist Women of Knox City will hold one of their most important annual observances The Call to Prayer and Self-Denial, on Monday, January 29, million women in 34,000 local units in all 50 states will join in the observance.

The Call, inspired by special mission needs and by the opportunities to be made possible, focuses on prayer, a deepened spiritual life, and a guided mission study. Major events of the observance include the Quiet Day and an interpretation of the mission projects in the United States and abroad for which a special offering will be made. Each woman who takes part is asked to give for others by denying herself, and to cultivate through prayer a spiritual oneness with planners, mission workers, and those served in church-related ministries.

The Women's Division of the United Methodist Board of Global Ministries sponsors the Call to Prayer and Self-Denial and has designated two

aspects of the large United Methodist mission program to benefit from this year's social offering:

1. In the United States the offering will be used to repair and improve mission properties and to renew programs of Christian mission. Through these instrumentalities the renewal of lives in the name of Christ is sought as well as a strengthened Christian presence in cooperative community efforts. Mission facilities are in constant use and demands for help increases daily. It is the belief of the Women's Division that mission programs, to be effective, must be sensitive to the varying conditions and needs of their surrounding communities, and staffs must be ready to work in new or old directions and combinations.

2. Overseas the special offering will be used for leadership training for women. This will enable women around the world to follow earlier Christians in carrying on the responsibility of training other

women for leadership roles in family, church, community, and civic life. A woman receiving such training has often passed it on to be whole community.

United Methodist Women is the successor body to two former denominational women's groups—the Women's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild, and is related to the Women's Division of the United Methodist Board of Global Ministries. Last year the Call to Prayer and Self-Denial offerings of United Methodist Women totaled \$651,312.96.

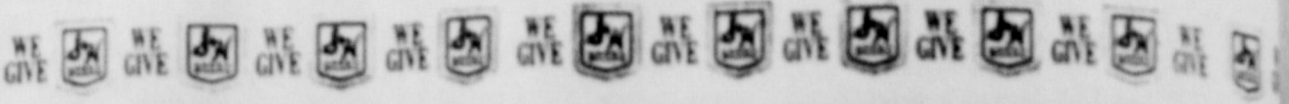
