## County Meeting Set For Beef Producers

A countywide meeting concerning the proposed Beef Research and Information Act has been set for 8:00 p.m. May 3, in the County Courthouse in Benjamin by Marvin Zeissel, chairman of the Knox County Beef Development Task Force.

Details about the upcoming beef referendum will be explained, the chairman announced.

The educational program, which is designed for all beef and dairy cattle owners of the county, will include two slide presentations about the Beef Research and Information Act --one prepared by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service--and the second by the Beef Development Task Force. There will be a period for questions and comments from producers.

Additionally, the BDT chairman, County Extension Agent Tommy Antille, and Extension Livestock specialist, Dr. Witney Rounds, will provide more detailed information about the forthcoming beef referendum.

The Beef Research and Information Act serves as enabling legislation and authorized the Secretary of Agriculture to conduct a referendum among beef producers to determine whether they want a beef development plan, developed by an industry-wide committee.

"The beef development plan is a proposed national checkoff program that would be financed by assessment as spelled out in the beef marketing order. If approved, the plan would provide some \$30 to \$40 million per year for beef research, consumer and

producer information, promotion and market development," explains Zeissel.

Expenditures, he added, would be directed by a 68-member board of cattlemen and representatives of livestock organizations.

To be eligible to participate in the beef referendum, beef and dairy cattle owners need to make two trips to their county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Offices: the first trip to register, and the second to vote. The tentative dates set for these include registration, June 6-17 and voting July 5-15.

In connection with the BDT meeting, Stanton Brown will briefly discuss the "Mission '77: Stamp Out Screwworms" program and how Knox County producers can help insure the eradication of screwworms from Texas in 1977.

Every beef producer is encouraged to attend this very important meeting so that they can obtain information concerning the beef referendum and be able to make the correct decision in voting.

# Textbook Copies Now Available For Review

Copies of every book submitted to the Texas Education Agency for the 1977 state textbook adoption will be available to all interested citizens for review at the Region IX Education Service Center Annex in Wichita Falls beginning May 5.

Sample books will be on file

at the annex, located at 3114 Seymour Highway in Fremar Valley, from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Elementary subjects scheduled to receive new materials include elementary Spanish for grades three through six, Texas history and geography for grade se-

ven and literature for grades seven and eight.

Secondary subjects on the list include English composition, drama, biology, chemistry, German, Spanish, fundamentals of the free enterprise system, general business, office procedures, business mathematics and driver education and traffic safety.

will be available for students on September 1, 1978.

All major publishers are expected to submit text materials for the Texas adoption in selected elementary and secondary school subject areas. The new materials may be adopted for a maximum of six years.

Books will be studied in detail by members of the State Textbook Committee and their local advisors throughout the summer. The 15-member committee will be appointed by the State Board of Education at its May 14 meeting in Austin. Committee members, which includes school administrators and teachers, will also seek the views of other teachers in their own districts.

A series of public hearings will be held in Austin in order to gather citizen viewpoints before the State Board of Education adopts textbooks at its November 12 meeting in Austin. The new materials

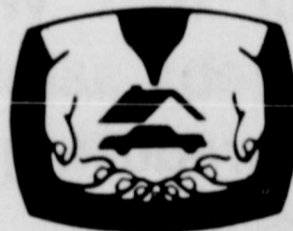

## NEWS OF AGRICULTURE

By TOMMY ANTILLEY

Beef cattle producers may be somewhat in the dark as to the principles involved with the proposed Beef Cattle Referendum coming up in the near future.

The Beef Research and Information Act is a self-help plan under which producers can raise funds for beef research, consumer education, producer information, promotion and market development programs. The ultimate goal, of course, is more profit for producers...plus better products and more stable supplies for consumers.

The program was developed by the Beef Development Taskforce, an industry wide committee of 15 cattle industry leaders representing eight national cattlemen's organizations, following the wishes of numerous cattlemen for "somebody to do something to improve beef markets."

If the program is passed it will be administered by a Beef Board of not more than 68 members. These will be composed of beef producers, nominated by producer organizations. Representation would be proportional to the cattle production in each state or geographical area as set by the Secretary of Agriculture. By this method, Texas will have the largest representation of members, presently designed for seven members with most states having one, two or three. The Beef Board will become the real decision-making body in this program with the following duties:

(1) To administer the provision of the order.

(2) To make rules and regulations to carry out the terms and provisions of the order.

(3) To receive, investigate and report to the Secretary of Agriculture any complaints or violations of the provisions.

(4) To recommend to the Secretary of Agriculture any amendments needed in the order.

(5) To appoint from its members an executive committee consisting of not less than seven or more than 10 members, with the authority to employ a staff and conduct the routine business determined by the board.

Basically, any man, woman, or child who owns cattle

is a bona fide producer and is, therefore, eligible to vote in the referendum. If the cattle are joint property, there will be one vote per entity and either owner may vote. A corporation, cooperative, partnership, or similar business is considered as only a single entity and receives one vote. There is no age limit or minimum requirement of numbers of cattle owned, so 4-H and FFA members having owned a beef club project in the last twelve months can vote.

Concerning the voting procedure, a two week period will be set up for registration followed by a two week period between registration and the referendum and then one week in which to vote. Producers may register at the ASCS office in the county where cattle are located. Tentative dates have been set for registration June 6-17 and voting July 5-15.

A county wide meeting has been set up for Tuesday, May 3, in which a representative from the District BDT and Dr. Witney Rounds, District Extension Specialist for livestock, will explain the referendum and voting procedures. Marvin Zeissel, County BDT chairman, will also assist in explaining the program. Every cattle producer is encouraged to attend this meeting to fully understand the program.

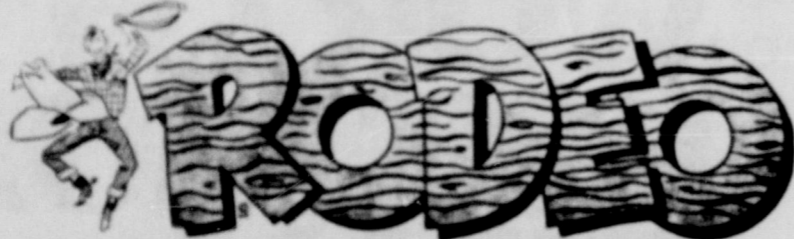

## Telephone Employees Improve Efficiency

General Telephone Company of the Southwest operates a training department that would rival some colleges.

"The goals of the training department are to improve efficiency of employees through the learning of new and updated skills in both management and technical fields," according to Tom Alford, training director.

"As a result, the company can improve quality, quantity and service to customers while improving the profitability of the company through faster and more efficient workmanship."

Alford said most courses are designed to be directly job related, teaching the specific skills which enable employees to perform their jobs. Additionally, employees are able to rise to higher levels of competence and become eligible for advancements to higher level jobs.

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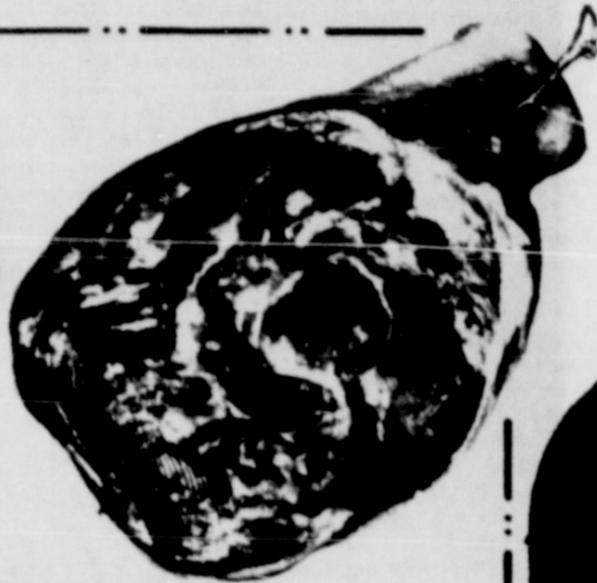
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
