loss ratio of 21 per cent for the five year period 1970-74 and qualified for a 25 per cent credit on fire insurance policies issued on and after April 1 this year, according to the State Board of Insurance.

Five year net premiums for Knox City amounted to \$98,092 with losses put at \$21,238. The 1974 premium and loss figures were \$27,396 and \$1,270.

The city's key rate was figured at 53 cents, with 62 cents in charges and 9 cents in credits. The credits were obtained by having additional capacity of at least one booster tank truck with 100 gallon capacity; a properly maintained night watch service; teaching fire prevention in the schools; maintaining an arson reward; and conducting a firemen's training school.
