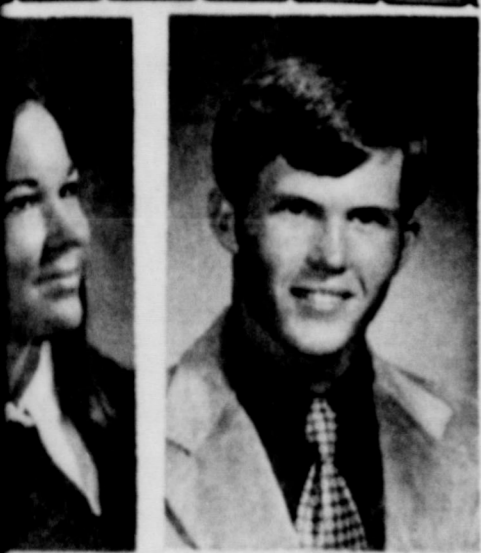

### Soil Stewardship Week Set May 27 - June 3

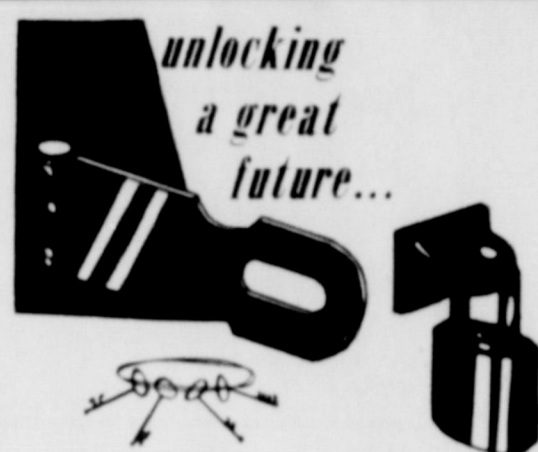

## Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

We have seen dramatic progress away from war and in the direction of that generation of peace which is the goal of our nation. At the same time, it would be folly for us to believe that we no longer need a national defense prepared to meet emergencies. This is the time to increase our vigilance by reaffirming our dedication to the traditional

concept of the citizen-military. This will afford us a most effective defense organization at the lowest possible cost. To achieve this we must have the understanding and support of all Americans - those who are in or join our Guard and Reserve, the families of these individuals as well as their employers. In the case of employers, this could mean some reasonable adjustment in policy so that Guardsmen and Reservists can play their part in this nation's "Total Force" for national defense.

Last June, President Nixon asked me to chair a special Committee whose objectives are to develop better public

understanding of the vital role of the Guard and Reserve and to obtain the full cooperation of American employers in allowing and encouraging their employees to participate in the Guard and Reserve programs. When I accepted this assignment, I was confident that, once the need was known, American employers would willingly give their support and establish personnel policies which would encourage employee participation in these important programs. As the former Chairman of the Board of General Motors, I am happy to report that my faith in the American business community has not been misplaced. I have been greatly encouraged by the early response I have received from companies, both large and small, and by the many personnel policies sent to me as evidence of employer support.

It is now Department of Defense policy that in any future build-up of the Armed Forces, the National Guard and Reserves, and not the draft, would be the initial and primary augmenting element for the active forces. Under the "Total Force" concept, the All-Volunteer Force will be composed of 2.2 million active duty and 1 million selected reserve members.

In the past three years, equipment inventories of the Guard and Reserves badly depleted during the Vietnam build-up of the active forces, have been replenished at an annual rate of more than \$600 million. In the next fiscal year, the equipment build-up will exceed \$1 billion, the total investment in the Guard and Reserves will be the largest in any single year of our history. This addition of equipment is coming from existing resources. In addition, new missions have been developed bringing Guard and Reserve components more in line with active duty counterparts. With these substantial investments there has been an intensification of the readiness training of the Guard and Reserve units.

A well-equipped and fully manned National Guard and Reserve, deployable on short notice, is potentially the most economical part of our defense system (20 percent of the manpower for less than 5 percent of the defense budget). An effective Guard and Reserve is also the best guarantee

against having to use a peacetime draft in future years.

To be a member of the Guard and Selected Reserve one must devote a weekend a month, and an additional two weeks each year, to training exercises. Fortunately, there are employers who encourage their employees to participate in Guard and Reserve programs. Their encouragement comes in the assurance that there will be no discrimination against those employees in their consideration for advancement; in the granting of military leave in addition to regular vacations; and in expressions of appreciation of their employees' contributions to the security of our nation.

I urge all the Americans, particularly employers, to support this concept, a concept on which our nation was formed nearly two hundred years ago and a concept which has retained our basic freedoms ever since.

The new regulations are primarily intended to protect patients from the hazard of getting blood from unhealthy donors.

# Mrs. Casey Retiring

Mrs. Virginia Casey, who has taught in the Knox City Schools since 1960 has announced her plans to retire at the end of this school term.

Mrs. Casey remarked that it is with regret that she leaves the teaching field and that she values the friendship of the Knox City School Board and Faculty.

Valued as both of her grade school and high school classes, Mrs. Casey entered McMurry College as a fifteen-year old freshman. Her sophomore year was at North Texas State Teachers College in Denton. She then transferred to Texas State College for Women where she received her Bachelor of Arts degree with major in English and minors in education and French. She returned to TSCW that fall to complete work on her Bachelor of Music degree with a major in piano. She was class poet of her graduating class and studied with Elizabeth Leske in piano.

Her teaching career which spans 28 years began in Truscott in the sixth and seventh grades, equivalent to the present seventh and eighth grades, with 44 pupils in one room for the two grades.

She later taught seven years in New Mexico, but with the war in progress and a gasoline shortage, she returned to Knox County in the fall of 1942 and taught one year at Benjamin in high school English, typing and economics.

With her husband, Curtis, home from military service in the South Pacific, Mrs. Casey officially retired from teaching and withdrew all retirement funds to have made a beautiful kitchen cabinet and happily settled down to being a farmer-stockman's wife.

In the winter of 1963, the retired school teacher began taking a few piano pupils and for the next two years taught piano four days each week in Truscott and Gilliland.

Due to the dire need for a county public school music teacher in the fall of 1965, Mrs. Casey paid back her retirement money she had checked out and started over. She served as county music teacher from 1965 to the spring of 1960. Also, during these years, the Caseys were foster parents from 1966-67, to Linda and Jimmy Bramum, whose mother became quite ill when the family was serving in the Baptist Mission field in Seattle, Washington. Several times

since, the children have stayed a few months or weeks at a time with them.

During the summer of 1960, Mrs. Casey decided sixth grade as an ideal level and Knox City the ideal school so she applied for the sixth grade vacancy. The Caseys lived in Knox City during the 1960-61 school term but returned to their home near Truscott after that. She has commuted daily, a round-trip of 52 miles, on school days since.

In addition to her public school teaching, Mrs. Casey continued to teach piano again after school. She taught one year in the seventh grade and continued with public school music in grades 5-8 except for two years when she was relieved by band directors Wes Hays and Kelley Glaze to give more time to her high school Spanish class which she taught four years.

Mrs. Casey was responsible for organizing the local chapter of the Pan American Student Forum in 1971 and served as sponsor. She expressed her appreciation to Mrs. Ray Escobar for the co-sponsorship this year.

Graduate study for Mrs. Casey continued and she attended Colorado State College Hill's Business University, North Texas State, Midwestern University, Southern Methodist University, Hardin Simmons University, with correspondence and extension courses from several others.

She is a member of the Truscott Methodist Church where she served as pianist for many years.

Mrs. Casey is a member of the National Guild of Piano Teachers, a member of Beta Chi Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma, where she served as

secretary, first vice-president and president.

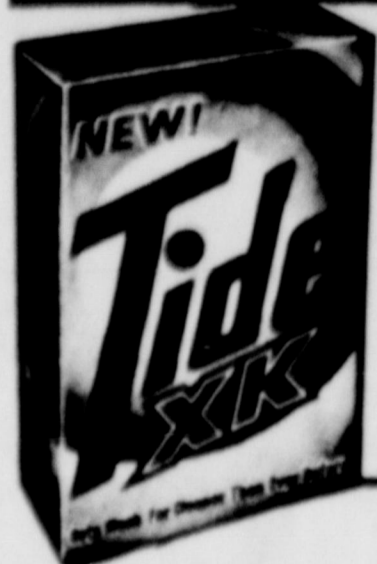

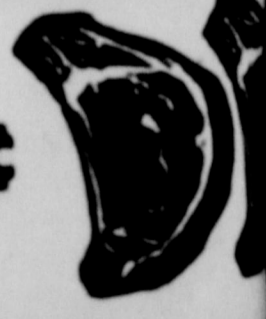
