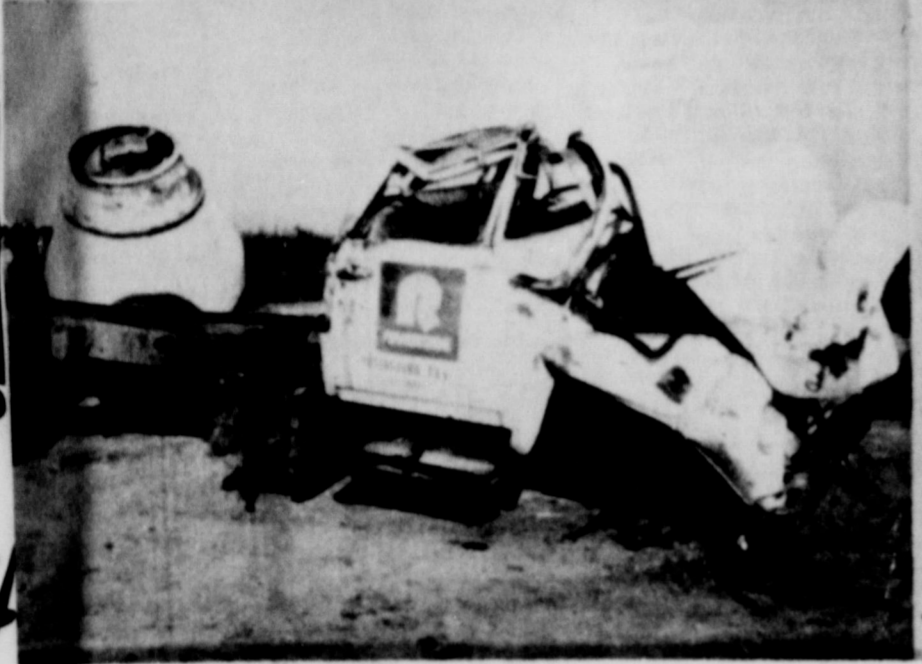

## Truck Fatal To Ropesville Man

Ropesville man, Mickey Smith, was killed Wednesday night when the truck he was driving overturned at the Ropesville Ranch eight miles east of Knoxville. The accident occurred shortly after 10 p.m. Smith was pronounced dead at the scene about 11:30 p.m. by Dr. Ted Ropes of Knoxville. The driver was being taken to Riverside Chemical by a company manager, A.A. Smith, who was a troublemaker at Riverside Chemical and arrived in Knoxville Wednesday afternoon. He was taken to Knoxville after delivery of fertilizer to the Davis Ranch.

Perkins, pastor of the Church of the Nazarene of Ropesville, officiated. Burial was in Ropesville Cemetery. Smith was a 1965 graduate of Ropesville High School. He had attended South Plains College at Levelland.

## Hounds To Host Paducah Friday

# KC Slams Archer City

The Knox City Greyhounds evened a year-old score Friday night at Greyhound Stadium when they ran over the previously unbeaten Archer City Wildcats to the tune of 39-14.

Charlie Flye made the first trip into the end zone for the Hounds with a two yard carry, three and half minutes into the

second quarter. Joe Huff kicked for the extra point, and it was Hounds 7 - Wildcats 0.

Before half time, the Hounds had hit paydirt twice more.

With two minutes and 40 seconds left in the second quarter, the Hounds' Flye dropped back to punt, and instead, made an 85 yard gallop downfield behind some fast and fancy Hound blocking, through a rattled Wildcat eleven. Extra point try failed.

The Hounds kicked off to Archer City, but before the Cats could get things rolling, KC's Huff hauled in an Archer City pass, and the Hounds were headed downfield again and got on the scoreboard just before half time when Roy Posey snagged a 13 yard pass from Hound quarterback Ricky Hacker. The extra point try failed, making the score read Knox City 19 - Archer City 0.

The Archer City Wildcats came back after the half and finally got on the board with 16 seconds left in the third quarter when Wildcat Weyman Oliver crossed the goal line. Extra point try failed, and it was Knox City 19 - Archer City 6.

The Hounds promptly got back on the board when Joe Huff took the ball on kick off and made a fast 80 yard trip that took him over the goal line. Huff also booted the extra point, making it Knox City 26 - Archer City 6.

A wild fourth quarter got under way as KC's Art Crownover intercepted a Wildcat pass, putting the ball back in Grey-

hound possession. Quarterback Hacker tacked on six more points when he went over the line on a quarterback sneak. Huff again booted the extra point, making it Hounds 33 - Cats 6.

The Cats quickly lost possession of the ball when Crownover snagged another Archer City pass, which the Hounds quickly put to good use as Dale Bloxham raced 25 yards to paydirt. The kick failed, making it KC 39 - AC 6.

The Wildcats got back in scoring position in the closing minutes of the game when they broke loose with a 50 yard run to the end zone. The extra point run was good, and the game ended Knox City 39 - Archer City 14.

The Hounds meet Paducah Friday night at 8 o'clock in Greyhound Stadium for the last home game of the season. The Dragons are somewhat short on experience, having lost a number of starters, but have speedster Carl Wright at half back. Wright's breakaway speed is a definite threat. Paducah had a 6-4 season last year. It fell to Knox City 42-7.

In last Friday's games, District 7-A contenders began the battle for the title. Crowell stomped Paducah 39-13, and Holliday whipped Munday 53-0.

Coach Don Mullins, who noted the change in districting, advised the News office that the first five games have been set for next season. They will be Rochester, Rule, Archer City, Quanah, and Windthorst.

## League Favors Pay Raise For Texas Legislators

Texas Municipal League president Jamie Clements today added the endorsement of the Texas Municipal League to the growing list of statewide organizations supporting a pay raise for Texas legislators.

Temple Mayor Clements said, "As public officials, the mayors and councilmen of Texas are acutely aware that the business of state government has become a full-time job for legislators. But the present unrealistic level of pay for legislators--\$4,800 per year--assumes that financial hardship is the price that members of the Texas Senate and House must pay to serve the public responsibly. This policy is contrary to the best interests of State government and the general public alike, and it is unreasonable to expect high-quality leadership in Austin unless the people of Texas act affirmatively on November 6th to adopt Constitutional Amendment No. 1."

Proposed Amendment No. 1, on the November 6th ballot, would raise the pay of state legislators from \$4,800 to \$15,000 annually. Work sessions would be increased as well, from the present 140-day sessions every other year to 180-day sessions in odd-numbered years and 60-day budget sessions in even-numbered years.

The Texas Municipal League is participating on the "Statewide Committee for the Adoption of Amendment No. 1," a broad-based organization composed of more than 35 civic and professional organizations re-

presenting thousands of Texans with divergent political viewpoints. By informing Texas voters of the importance of Amendment No. 1, the Committee hopes to gain adoption of the Amendment, which will help to further improve State government and its ability to meet the needs of Texas in the years ahead.
