





only for the grain crop. In considering only the grain crop, October 10th to November 1st is considered a good planting time. For a fall and winter grazing crop the producer may consider his possibilities are better even by having to spray for armyworm control by planting in early September or as soon afterwards as will fit in his schedule.

Close attention should be given to small grain when it comes up as the armyworms can severly damage a stand in 2 or 3 davs



AN ACT rerecording of livestock brands rock fence, cellar, large peand marks; and declaring an emergency. 7-22-tfc.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State, In all the counties, each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six

months after this Act takes effect, have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks 9-23-ltp. have been previously recorded

or not (b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and WHERE can you find BOYS' brand the longest shall have NEW LONG SLEEVE KNIT the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name. After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act, all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force of effect and after the expiration

of six months, only the records made after this Acttakes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Actshall be reregistered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this act.

Of all diseases, tuberculosis is probably man's oldest and Texans' thoughts turn to the oughta remember how cold it most puzzling enemy. It remains a major public health maybe watermellon, vacations, try to remember how much problem in many states today, including Texas.

"Texas is recorded as having the third largest total of new, active tuberculosis cases in the nation last year," says Dr. James E. Peavy, Texas Commissioner of Health.

Today, with careful diagnosis and conscientious drug treatment, the chances of curing tuberculosis are very good, no matter what the stage of the disease. Great advances in treatment have brought TB under medical control. But don't get the idea that TB is now a rare disease. It isn't.

Tuberculosis affects 37,000 new patients each year and kills over 5,000 people. In 1970, Texas recorded 2,889 new cases of the disease, placing behind only New York and California in the mber of new cases reported. At the beginning of 1971, there were nearly 20,000 cases on the TB register in Texas being kept under surveillance. Today, over 300,000 people in the United States are under medical care or supervision for TB. More than 100,000 of these have active cases of the disease. 'That's why medical and health authorities view the situation with concern," Dr. Peavy said. Actually, the high rate of new TB cases in Texas is due to the Health Department's intensive new program of seraching out new program of searching out and diagnosing cases of tuber culosis. Progress is being made in reducing the rate of occurrence. The number of cases recorded in 1970 actually fell almost 100 cases from the number reported in 1969 and was over 300 cases down from the umber reported in 1968, The highest incidence of new ases in Texas occurred in the very large cities and in areas near the southern border. TB can be cured, but it is a long, tedious process, Recovery from tuberculosis, unlike many other diseases, takes months or sometimes years. Although other drugs have been useful the past, the Texas Health bepartment is optimistic that a ew oral anti-tuberculosis drug omises to be a significant levelopment in tuberculosis therapy, Known as "rifampin," drug was developed by a team of Italian scientists, and has been available in this county since last May,


