

Added to the fact that Russia has only one seaport that is accessible year round, Russia is at a great disadvantage, geo-

graphically speaking.

Russia has 200 million people United States are very pessimis to the United States 170 million. Russia is having a very hard time feeding these people because her agricultural production is only 40 per cent of ours. This is probably the highest peak that Russian agriculture will ever attain, since 5/6 of the U. S. S. R. is an unproductive wasteland. It always has and al ways will be. If you will remem ber during the great famine that Russia had last year, Premier Kruschev asked the people to eat horse meat. One wonders what they will eat when all the horses are gone.

Russia's industrial output can not begin to equal that of the United States. Russia produces about 1/5 the oil, cotton textiles, and electrical power, and 1/2 the leather goods that the United States does.

The Communists tell us about the Russian working class being superior to the "American Cap italists," yet a Russian worker works 96 hours to buy a pair of shoes and an American works only eight. Also, an American works one hour to buy a cotton shirt to the average Russian's




