

Knox County Accidents Are Investigated

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of February, 1975, according to Sergeant J.W.Garner, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and no persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first two months of 1975 shows a total of 12 accidents resulting in no one killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for February, 1975, shows a total of 435 accidents resulting in 12 persons killed and 199 persons injured as compared to February, 1974, with 322 accidents resulting in ten persons killed and 208 persons injured. This was 113 more accidents, two more killed, and nine less injured in 1975 at the same period of time.
