Geo. Dennington Dies Tuesday Of Heart Attack

Funeral services for George Dennington, 78, were held at the Knox City Foursquare Church Wednesday at 3:00 p. m. with Rev. Floyd V. Bailey, pastor of the church, officiating. He was assisted by Rev. Nettie Wilcox, pastor of the Full Gospel Mission.

Mr. Dennington died of a heart attack at his home here Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock.

A retired farmer, Mr. Dennington had been a resident of the Knox City area 47 years. He was born in Erath County March 28, 1877, and married Miss Josie Hudson of Eastland in 1897. They moved to Knox City in 1908.

Survivors include his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Alma Swearingen; two sons, Jessie and Hamilton; nine grandchildren and several great-grandchildren.

Rice Springs Roundup Scheduled at Haskell

Area rodeo fans have been invited to attend the second annual Rice Springs Roundup, to be held May 12, 13 and 14 at the Saddle Tramp Rodeo grounds in Haskell.

The three-day event will be the first major rodeo program of the season in this section, and from the number of advance inquiries received, it is expected to attract some of the outstanding rodeo talent of the Southwest.

Cash awards of more than \$2,000 will be paid winners in the various events. In addition, a handmade saddle will be awarded the champion roper.

The Roundup will be presented under auspices of the Saddle Tramp Riding Club, and rodeo stock will be furnished by Pitner & Foreman of Denton. They have advised sponsors that some of the wildest stock they have ever assembled will be used in the Haskell show.

Six events will be presented nightly, including bronc riding, calf roping, Brahma bull riding, cutting horse contest, double mugging, and cowgirls' clover-leaf barrel race.

In addition to rodeo events, other entertainment features are planned. Outstanding opening day feature will be a colorful parade at 4 p. m. Wednesday, May 12, in which a score or more riding clubs will participate.

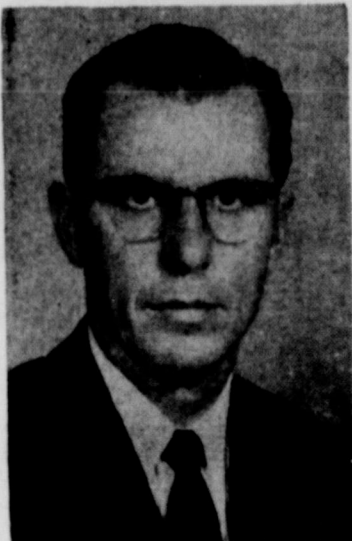
Special music was furnished by the little band and an orchestra composed of Wyndoll, Bobby and Donald Tankersley, Bettye Hooker and Bobby Morris.

BECKER RESIGNS PASTORATE HERE; WILL GO TO STEPHENVILLE



Rev. Emil V. Becker resigned Sunday as pastor of the Knox City Baptist Church, effective after Sunday, May 1.

He will be pastor of the First Baptist Church in Stephenville. During Rev. Becker's four and a half year as pastor here there have been 145 baptisms and 272 additions by letter. Claud Reed, clerk, said. The average Sunday School attendance has increased from 140 to 251, the 1954 average; and the Woman's Missionary Society has increased from one circle to four active circles. There was no Training Union in 1950, and the average attendance in 1954 was 84.

For the coming year the church has a budget of \$20,000 Mr. Reed said. Last year a new \$20,000 educational building was added to the church, and gifts throughout the cooperative program have doubled since Rev. Becker has been pastor.

The Stephenville Church has a membership of 1,488, an average Sunday School attendance of 611 and average Training Union attendance of 180. The church budget is more than \$54,000.

Rev. Becker was a student at Southwestern Theological Seminary in Ft. Worth and student pastor at Pooleville in 1950 when he came to Knox City, his first pastorate where he lived on the field.

In announcing his resignation Rev. Becker expressed his regret at leaving Knox City. "Both Mrs. Becker and I have enjoyed our associations here," he said, "and will always think of Knox City as home. We feel it our duty, however, to move to the greater field of service."

Three employees of the Humble Oil & Refining Co., employed on the Bateman lease in King County, were injured Friday night when a treater on a Humble well exploded.

The farm boss, A. A. Proctor, 53, was critically burned and was a patient in the Knox County Hospital until Sunday, when he was transferred to a Houston hospital. Attending physicians said second and third degree burns cover 65 to 70 percent of his body.

All bids must conform to and embody the provisions of the order of the Board of Directors which

are set forth in figures substantially as follows:

(a) All bids must be sealed and delivered to the President of the Board of Directors prior to 7:00 o'clock P. M., on the 10th day of May, 1955, at which time all bids so received shall be opened.

(b) All bids submitted must state the rate of interest offered on funds of said District for the period of time beginning the 10th day of May, 1955, and ending the 10th day of May, 1956.

(c) All bids must be accompanied by a certified check for \$2,000.00, payable to the order of the District as guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder that if said bid be accepted the bidder will enter into the bond required by law as such depository of Knox County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1.

Paymaster 54 was also highest in the 1954 test in Wichita County, producing 618 pounds of lint cotton per acre.

Paymaster also averaged the earliest maturity date with 93 per cent of the crop matured in 116 days.

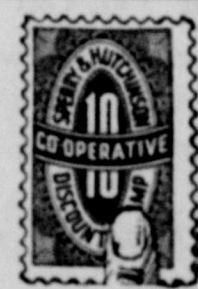
